plans to add more grocery items and even a hot deli. The apartments on the same site are going to be a big help as they offer the business new, nearby customers and potential employees, said Colsch.

"We are trying to keep the front-end smaller so it still has the neighborhood market feel," Colsch said. "But we need a lot more behind-thescenes space.'

Prairie du Chien Mayor Dave Hemmer is proud of the number of businesses moving into the city, with at least eight receiving Main Street Bounceback grants from the WEDC. These grants provide \$10,000 to businesses and nonprofits that move into a previously vacant commercial

"They're starting to bring a little bit of life back downtown," Hemmer said. "Right now, we have just about all our storefronts either filled or talking about something going on.'

The business bounceback in Prairie du Chien also presents challenges.

"There really isn't very much housing available," said Carol Roth. "That is one of the biggest challenges for anyone trying to start or grow their businesses."

Quality, affordable workforce housing is one of the biggest issues businesses bring up to Driftless Development,

"We have hospitals, we have school districts, large businesses, small businesses, and the service industry all needing employees," Koth said. "It is difficult to grow if there is no place for the workforce to live.'

"There are jobs in Prairie du Chien," Hemmer said. "No doubt about that. Now we're going to have places for people

A developer is interested in the former Blackhawk Junction property. The Prairie du Chien Common Council has moved forward in providing for the sale of \$1.4 million in notes to temporarily meet expected financing needs, anticipating that future cash flow will repay

Multi-family housing is intended for phase one at the city-owned site, now TID (Tax Increment District) 8, or the East Gateway Redevelopment District. Phase one is projected to cost \$1.27 million, including infrastructure, site development and redevelopment and developer incentive amounts.

A project plan for the site was approved by the council and Joint Review Board in March of 2021. The project plan assumes \$4 million in new construction in 2022, and another \$1 million in new construction within a couple of years afterward.

TID revenues of 25 percent would be obliged to the developer. Through 2048, overall TID revenue is projected to be \$3,281,640. TID financing allows cities to capture incremental property tax revenue from growth in a defined area and use that revenue to benefit that area.

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


