Oshkosh fights off Warhawks

Two 10-0 runs lift Titans into WIAC championship game

OSHKOSH

Every time the UW-Whitewater men's basketball team went on a run Thursday night, UW-Oshkosh answered.

A 10-0 run midway through the second half and a late flurry made all the difference as the top-seeded Titans knocked the Warhawks out of the Wisconsin Intercollegiate Athletic Conference tournament with an 86-77 victory.

The loss ended the season for coach Pat Miller's Warhawks (15-12), who entered the tournament with the No. 4 seeding.

Oshkosh (22-3), ranked third nationally, will play host to UW-Platteville (21-4) in the tournament final at 5 p.m. Saturday. It will be the Titans' fifth appearance in the tournament championship game in the last eight years.

The tournament champion will earn the WIAC's automatic berth to the NCAA Division III national tournament.

Derek Gray totaled 15 points and 10 rebounds, Gage Malensek added 14 points and Carter Capstran scored 10 points for the

Brewers in market for DH

If union OKs rule change, GM Stearns will face decision

If the designated hitter is added to the National League in 2022—owners have agreed to do so but the players union has to sign off on it as well—the Milwaukee Brewers will have a decision to make.

They'll have to decide if they can handle that big change from within, or if they should seek another bat from outside.

Player transactions have been frozen since Dec. 2 due to management's lockout of the players without a new labor deal.

So we don't know what president of baseball operations David Stearns might have done (or not done) to further improve an offense that went quiet too often in an otherwise banner 2021 season—including the disappointing four-game loss to eventual World Series champion Atlanta in the National League Divisional Series.

It was an up-and-down day for area wrestlers on Day 1 of the WIAA state individual tournament at the Kohl Center in Madison.

Of the 11 area wrestlers competing in Division 1, only Milton's Aeden Sinclair and Matt Haldiman went 2-0 on the day to advance to tonight's semifinals.

Sinclair, a sophomore and the top-ranked

wrestler at 170 pounds, won both his matches Thursday by technical fall and will take a 46-1 record into his semifinal match against Ben Otto (39-2) of Brookfield Central.

The junior Haldiman won both matches Thursday by decision and takes a 41-7 record into a semifinal match against Aiden Crawley (38-6) of Brookfield Central.

Milton's Royce Nilo (145) and Aiden Slama won opening-round

quarterfinals to enter the consolation bracket.

Janesville Craig senior Hunter Kliez (138) and Janesville Parker sophomore Cayden Brandenburg (152) lost opening-round matches.

Weisbrod does it for Dad

Senior scores 36 as DeForest stuns Milton in overtime

In 23 years as the DeForest High boys basketball coach, Craig Weisbrod had never won a Badger Conference title.

His son made sure he got one for him in this, Craig's final season at the helm.

Max Weisbrod scored 36 points—including the game-winning basket with six seconds left—to lift DeForest to a thrilling 74-73 overtime win against a stunned Milton team in the Badger East Conference championship game Thursday.

The Red Hawks had a 73-70 lead with 34 seconds left and had a chance to win the game in the final seconds, but Jack Campion's jumper in the lane rattled in and out as the buzzer sounded.

Weisbrod and Campion, two of the top seniors in the state, put on a dazzling display offensively. Weisbrod scored 23 of his 36 points in the second half and overtime. Campion finished with 25 points, 11 assists and three steals.

Weisbrod said losing was not an option.

"With this my dad's last year of coaching, there was no way I was going to lose this game," said Weisbrod, who has committed to NCAA Division II Northern Michigan University.

Shooting lifts Craig past Beloit in overtime

The Janesville Craig boys basketball team wrapped up the regular season with a victory Thursday night.

Da'Marcus DeValk scored 21 points and the Cougars made 12 3-point baskets in a 73-67 overtime victory over Beloit Memorial on Bob Suter Court.

Craig finished the regular

season 8-16 and 6-12 in the Big Eight Conference.

"It was a good win for us," Craig coach Ben McCormick said. "We still have a lot of work to do, especially on the boards, but it's nice to go into the post-season with a win."

"The game was kind of back and forth until the overtime (until) Denver Hughes made a big basket to give us the lead and then Keegan Clark scored

our last four points."

Craig held Beloit (6-18, 2-16) scoreless in overtime to complete a regular-season sweep of the Purple Knights.

Carson McCormick added 14 points for Craig and Clark chipped in 13.

Craig will open WIAA Division 1 tournament play March 4 at Mukwonago.

"We've proven we can play with the good teams,"

McCormick said. "We just have to work harder on the boards and minimize our mistakes."

Packers restructure Jones' contract

GREEN BAY—The Green Bay Packers continue to reduce their 2022 salary obligations through the restructuring of player contracts.

On Thursday, they used running back Aaron Jones' contract to reduce their salary cap by another \$3.1 million, leaving them roughly \$39 million over the expected \$208.2 million limit. The Packers have until March 16 to get under the limit.

The Packers took Jones' \$3.75 million roster bonus and \$65,000 of his base salary and converted it to a signing bonus. They added two voidable years, which allowed them to reduce Jones' cap number from \$8.9 million to \$5.9 million.

On Wednesday, the Packers converted \$14.65 million of nose tackle Kenny Clark's deal and spread it out over five years, which they were able to do after adding two voidable years. They reduced his salary cap charge from \$20.9 million to \$9.65 million.

UW-W wrestlers seek NCAA berths

The UW-Whitewater wrestling team will compete today and Saturday in the NCAA Division III Upper Midwest Regional at UW-Eau Claire.

The top three finishers in each of 10 weight classes will advance to the national tournament, set for March 11-12 in Cedar Rapids, Iowa.

Leading the Warhawks will be Jaritt Shinoster, ranked fifth at 184 pounds and seeking the third national berth in his career. Jake Burford is ranked ninth at 149 points and Cadin Koeppel is ranked 10th at 285.

Still little progress in MLB talks

JUPITER, Fla.—Another Major League Baseball negotiating session produced only minor movement and no proposals on big-money issues Thursday, four days from management's Monday night deadline for a deal to salvage opening day and a 162-game season.

Both sides appeared to be in a you-make-the-next-move staredown on central economic issues of the lock-out—such as luxury tax thresholds and rates, the minimum salary and the proposed bonus pool for pre-arbitration players.

Given those stances, it appeared the earliest movement on the main issues would be in the hours before management says it will carry through on its threat to start canceling games and costing players salary.

Clubs say the union hasn't altered its luxury tax plan since November; players say they are waiting because management told the union luxury tax usually is among the last items addressed.

Players also want to reduce revenue sharing and expand salary arbitration eligibility, and teams say they will not agree to either proposal.

Aikman jumps Fox ship to join ESPN

NFL free agency doesn't begin for a few more weeks. But business is about to pick up when it comes to shuffling among the network broadcast teams.

Troy Aikman is expected to become the lead analyst on ESPN's "Monday Night Football" after 22 years with Fox. Aikman is expected to sign a five-year deal that would rival the \$17.5 million per year Tony Romo is making at CBS.

ESPN and Fox had no comment on Aikman's future. Aikman has been with Joe Buck on Fox's top crew since 2002, but there have been rumblings the past couple of months that the Hall of Fame quarterback had been looking to move on.

Many thought that Aikman would join Al Michaels at Amazon, which takes over "Thursday Night Football" next season.

Kitayama shoots 64 at PGA event

PALM BEACH GARDENS, Fla.—Kurt Kitayama came into the Honda Classic with 25 previous appearances on the PGA Tour, most of them ending by missing the cut.

He's on track to do a bit better this week in the Honda Classic.

Kitayama—ranked No. 289 in the world—was nearly flawless at PGA National on Thursday, shooting a 6-under 64 to take a one-shot lead over Daniel Berger, Chris Kirk and Rory Sabbatini. It was Kitayama's best score in 69 rounds on the PGA Tour, fueled by a career-best run of four consecutive birdies on his second nine.

Peter Uihlein and Danny Willett were among the group at 67. Brooks Koepka, a Palm Beach County native basically playing a home game this week, was in a group at 68.

Russia won't host soccer final

UEFA will no longer hold the Champions League final in St. Petersburg, Russia, after the nation launched a wide-ranging attack on Ukraine on Thursday.

A special meeting of the UEFA executive committee will be held today to discuss the geopolitical crisis and to confirm taking the May 28 showpiece game out of Russia.

UEFA publicly rebuked Russia and said it was dealing with the "situation with the utmost seriousness and urgency."

Medvedev unseats Djokovic as No. 1

DUBAI, United Arab Emirates—Novak Djokovic will fall from No. 1 in the ATP rankings and be replaced by Daniil Medvedev after losing 6-4, 7-6 (4) to Czech qualifier Jiri Vesely in the quarterfinals of the Dubai Championships on Thursday.

Djokovic's latest stay atop the rankings began on Feb. 3, 2020, and his total of 361 weeks there are the most for any man since the tour's computerized rankings began in 1973.

On Monday, Medvedev will move up from No. 2 for the first time and become the 27th man to reach No. 1. He won the U.S. Open last September and was the Australian Open runner-up each of the past two years.

Djokovic congratulated Medvedev on Twitter, saying the Russian was "very deserving" of the No. 1 spot.

Medvedev is the first man other than Djokovic, Roger Federer, Rafael Nadal or Andy Murray to be No. 1 since Feb. 1, 2004.

lineup for any given night. That group includes Kyle Schwarber, Jorge Soler, Joc Pederson, Nick Castellanos, Eddie Rosario and even Nelson Cruz, who belted 32 home runs last season at age 40 while playing for Minnesota and Tampa Bay.

None of the aforementioned sluggers would come cheaply, however, and with 10 arbitration cases pending, the Brewers' projected payroll already is headed for a season-opening high for the franchise. The previous high was \$123 million in 2019.

The Brewers have worked out creative contracts in the past, however, including one last spring with the since-traded Jackie Bradley Jr. that was back-loaded with deferred money.

Instead, the Brewers could shop for another first baseman, such as free agent Anthony Rizzo, or make a trade for one, such as the New York Yankees' Luke Voit. Then they could move slugger Rowdy Tellez into more of a DH role.

After Stearns traded for Boston rightfielder Hunter Renfroe in a

deal that included the disappointing Bradley, the Brewers' puzzle was reduced to settling on a plan at first base before the DH entered the picture.

If the Brewers decide to find their DH from the current roster, they have four viable options:

■ **Keston Hiura**—After signing Gold Glove second baseman Koltan Wong to a two-year deal with an option prior to the 2021 season, the Brewers decided to move Hiura to first base, a position he never had played. Unfortunately, Hiura hit only .168 in 61 games with a .301 slugging percentage and 77 strikeouts in 173 at-bats and was sent down to Class AAA Nashville.

Hiura has been retooling his hitting mechanics over the winter with a personal coach. He's only 25 and if he finds something that clicks, he has shown in the past how much damage he can do when making consistent contact (.938 OPS in 84 games as a rookie in '19).

■ **Lorenzo Cain**—Centerfielder Lorenzo Cain had trouble keeping his legs healthy last season, spending two lengthy stints on the injured list

and playing in only 78 games. Cain is at the end of his five-year, \$80 million free-agent deal and turns 36 in April. Moving to DH would keep him healthy and productive over as many games as possible. The improving Tyrone Taylor could take over in the outfield.

■ **Rowdy Tellez**—Tellez handles himself OK at first base for a big man (6-foot-4, 255 pounds) but he isn't in there for his defense. It's his light-tower power from the left side—a tool that plays very well in American Family Field—that makes him valuable. So putting him in the DH role on a consistent basis makes lots of sense.

■ **A revolving door**—Counsel loves to give everyone in the "position player group" ample opportunity to play, and should Hiura not get on track or another bat is not acquired from the outside, the DH could be a revolving door that allows rest as well as the best nightly hitter-pitcher matchups. The Brewers loved the offensive contributions last year from jack-of-all-trades Jace Peterson and could take a look at versatile infielder Mike Brosseau.
