Chargers can't maintain fast start in loss

Hamilton falls in four sets

TOWN OF LISBON -Germantown weathered Hamilton's early homecourt energy surge and the state-ranked Warhawks bounced back to win three straight sets en route to a Greater Metro Conference boys volleyball match victory Wednesday night.

Hamilton won the opener 25-22, but the Warhawks recovered to win 25-22 and 25-21 before closing out the victory 25-11.

"Not happy giving up a lead in the first set, but I'm happy with how we came out the second, third and fourth," Germantown coach Brian Rushmer said. "I think in general, it takes a while to get acclimated."

In the critical third set, Hamilton rallied from a 17-11 deficit to pull within 22-21, but Germantown blockers Spencer Van Engen and Nate Vaupal rejected consecutive attacks by sophomore outside hitter Matteo Morgano for a 24-21 lead.

"We've been working on that. Vaupal's been on varsity for three years, blocking is his forte," Rushmer said. "But to have Spencer start to come along as to where to actually set the block, that's something that's big for us."

In the opener, Hamilton pulled away from a 20-20 tie to surprise the Warhawks. Morgano registered a kill to put the Chargers up 23-20.

In the second set, Hamilton rallied from a 15-5 deficit to it at 18-18. Germantown scored the next two points and was able to maintain the lead. Brady Pichler's tap down at the net put Germantown up 24-21.

After seeing Germantown close out the hardfought third game, the Chargers ran out of energy in the fourth set. The Warhawks used a 6-0 run to open a 14-5 lead.

"There was a lot of energy in the building tonight," Hamilton coach Brandon Nelsen said. "It's a conference match and we just saw the new rankings that Germantown was ranked No. 10 in the state, and I think our guys really competed well against that.

"Something we always like to do is play good teams and my team

Last Friday was probably a foot-9, 165-pound senior finished record-setting night for Waukesha County football teams. On a very wet and windy night, when it should've been difficult to score points, no less than eight teams exploded for all kinds of points and all kinds of big plays.

The biggest game of the night, played in heavy rain, saw host Muskego out-slug Arrowhead in a Classic 8 Conference showdown, 53-49. The lead changed hands seven times and the Warriors finally won the game when Carson Holmen scored on a 1-yard run with 33 seconds to play for the final points of the night.

In that game there were eight touchdowns scored on plays of 54 yards or longer. By the time the game ended, the two offenses scored 50 points in the fourth quarter and combined for 1,125 yards. On over 100 plays from scrimmage the two teams averaged 11 yards per play.

Individually, Arrowhead running back Alijah Maher-Parr might have put up some of the best numbers in county history. The 5-

with a school-record 391 yards rushing on 30 carries. He scored all seven of his team's touchdowns, a school record and probably a county record. When you add in kickoff returns and receptions, he finished the night with 492 total yards. That's a good season in itself.

Hamilton also lit up the scoreboard. The first-place Chargers, looking to win their first conference championship since 2011, improved to a league-leading 4-0 in the Greater Metro Conference under coach Justin Gumm with a lopsided 50-8 win over host West Allis Hale. In that game, the talented Hamilton offense scored six touchdowns of 29 yards or longer.

Undefeated and top-ranked Catholic Memorial came up big in the rain as it smashed Wauwatosa West in a Parkland Conference game, 35-8. Talk about big plays. The Crusaders scored four touchdowns of 48 yards or longer, getting three from sophomore running back Corey Smith.
