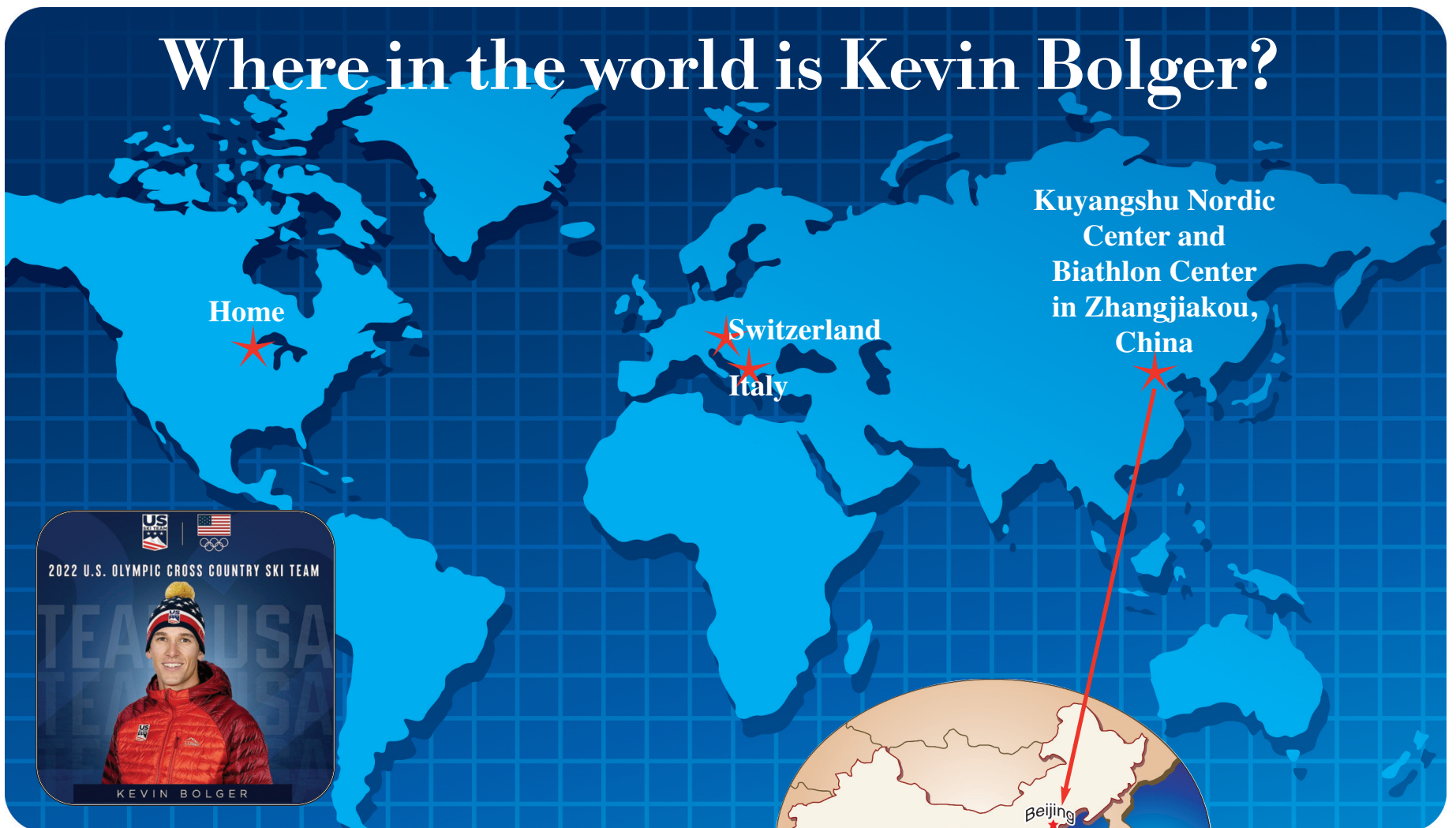


Where in the world is Kevin Bolger?

The 2022 Winter Olympics in Beijing are underway. And with that, Minocqua-native Kevin Bolger begins his Olympic journey.

Bolger ended up being in three countries in four days. It all started in Livigno, Italy where he trained and prepared for the Olympics. He also had a negative COVID-19 test in Italy.

After that, Bolger flew to Zürich, Switzerland on Jan. 30. He again had another negative COVID-19 test be-

fore he prepared to fly out to Beijing.

Finally on Feb. 1, Bolger took a flight to Beijing, China beginning his Olympic quest towards the podium.

"Once they get there then the nerves happen cause they have a four-hour either car ride or bus ride or if they end up taking a train a one-hour ride," Kevin's mother Sandy Bolger said. "The venue for skiing is four hours north of Beijing."

Upon arriving in Beijing, Bolger traveled north to Zhangjiakou to the Kuyangshu Nordic Center

and Biathlon Center where the skiing will take place.

"From what we understand this venue for Nordic and alpine and biathlon will be on all man-made snow," Sandy Bolger said.

There Bolger met his roommate and teammate Gus Schumacher.

The Opening Ceremony took place yesterday. With Bolger in Zhangjiakou, he was unable to partake in the ceremony. Instead, skiers and other athletes had their own ceremony.

"The bubble is so tight...

the testing for COVID-19 is actually tighter (in China) than it is (in the United States)," Sandy Bolger said. "They're really trying to keep themselves to their bubbles. They're gonna do a mini opening ceremony for all the alpine... the snow sport athletes in their village."

Bolger is set to compete Tuesday, Feb. 8 in the freestyle sprint. Until then, he will train and prep for

his first competition. "He'll just have some workouts, normal workouts leading up to it. And then it's eat, sleep and recover and stay healthy," Kevin's father Mike Bolger said. "They'll ski every day."

In days, Bolger will have his first Olympic competition.

"(Kevin) made a comment to us he goes "now on the plane — this is real," Sandy Bolger said. "This is real and it's really exciting."

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Two teams, two conference champions

Lakeland Nordic ski teams win Northern Conference

It was a big four days for the Lakeland Nordic ski team. From Junior National qualifiers to the Badger State Games to conference, Lakeland showed their strength.

The Lakeland Nordic ski boys and girls won the Northern Conference title Tuesday in Cable. Seven skiers participated in Junior National qualifiers in Houghton, Mich. Jan. 29-30. The rest of the team

skied at the Badger State Games in Wausau Jan. 29.

Northern Conference Meet

This is the first time both the boys and girls have won conference since 2020. The meet was a 7K individual start at Birkebeiner Trailhead in Cable.

"It just shows we're continuing our strength at least in the Northern Conference and overall," coach Erich Kern said. "They all raced well."

The Lakeland boys won with seven points. Chippewa Valley came in second with 14. The Lakeland girls won with nine points. Chippewa Valley again had the runner-up finish with 12

points.

The Lakeland boys went one-two-four Tuesday afternoon. The top three skiers account towards points. Casey Van Hefty took first with a time of 18:33.51, becoming a conference champion.

Jakob Craig had the second place finish at 19:30. Leo Rotar finished fourth overall with a time of 20:39.31.

"(Casey and Jakob) are fun to watch and it is amazing," coach Kern said. "We have two of the top skiers in the state."

Chippewa Valley's Jack Dahlby placed third with a time of 19:51.1. Chippewa Valley had the third, fifth and sixth fastest skiers.

Lakeland's Nathan Zoch took 13th overall with a time of 23:23.9. Connor Simpson finished 15th with a time of 23:33.02.

Sylvia Meza had the fastest time for the Lakeland girls who went two-three-four. Sylvia Meza skied a 22:57.21 for second place overall.

Kiera Rotar finished third with a time of 23:06.53. Stella Meza skied a 23:25.79 time, good for fourth overall.

"Grace is still struggling with some breathing issues," coach Kern said referring to his daughter. "The other girls stepped up and had great races."

Grace Kern did not count towards Lakeland's score. She finished

seventh with a time of 24:07.97. Elsa Shockley took 10th with a time of 26:26.85.

Chippewa Valley did have the fastest skier for the girls. Fran Peterson took first overall with a time of 22:19.01. Chippewa Valley had the fifth and sixth fastest skiers as well.

Badger State Games

Shockley finished runner-up with a time of 20:41.5. Northern Kettle Moraine Nordic's Abby Moore took the win with a time of 19:29.9.

Noley Guthrie finished 31st with a time of 25:16.1. Maye Maclean skied a 25:37.5 for 32nd and Kristiana Clay 33rd with a time of 26:56.

Carson Tegland also

had a second place finish at the Badger State Games. He finished with a time of 17:46.4. Northern Kettle Moraine Nordic's Logan Murphy won with a time of 17:31.5.

"Super fun. I think (Elsa and Carson) both won their age category at Badger State. Really fun day for them, give those kids an opportunity, all good skiers," coach Kern said. "Give them an opportunity to get hardware on the podium, more relaxed atmosphere."

Lakeland had two others in the top 10. Connor Simpson finished seventh with a time of

Victory at long last

Tigers win first game of the season

All season long, the Mercer boys' basketball team has searched for that coveted first victory. It finally came Monday with a strong second half performance.

The Tigers won 56-50 over non-conference Bessemer, Mich. It was the first victory in coach Mike Guild's basketball career.

"I told them at the beginning of the season — when we win games, it's not how I coached you, it's how you guys played. And that's absolutely what happened," Guild said. "To have them out there playing hard from start to finish was unbelievable. I'm very proud of them."

Kyler Breunig (15 points) got Mercer going with five straight points. The first came on a Ryan Losh assist and the other on a 3-pointer from the wings.

Losh (24 points) then scored two technical free throws as the Speedboys had too many players on the

court. Losh scored two on a post move as well.

"Feels great to finally get one. We've been close on a few, but it feels really good," Losh said.

The Tigers led 11-4 at the 12-minute mark.

Bessemer's Jack Matrella hit a 3-pointer on a second chance opportunity. Jack Nyquist also nailed a floater as the Speedboys started to get into a rhythm.

Losh scored back-to-back buckets, the assists to Josh Klopatek. After a Bessemer timeout, Klopatek then connected on a triple from deep.

Mercer now had an 18-9 lead with eight minutes left in the first half.

Breunig scored on a mid-range jumper and Losh collected an offensive rebound score off a missed free throw.

Then the Speedboys went on a run. Daniel Lis hit a 3-pointer from the corner. The Tigers called a timeout.

Nyquist showed his impact on the game. Nyquist scored two on quick steal and then a jumper.

The Bessemer run continued. Nyquist nailed a 3-pointer and then got the Speedboys the lead on a jumper. Matrella got a steal for two more points.

The Tigers called another timeout. An 18-5 Bessemer run gave them a 27-23 halftime lead.

"I told them at the end of the first half the only reason that we got behind was mental errors and they corrected them after halftime and came out swinging so very proud," Guild said.

It was a back-and-forth game in the second half. Klopatek (11 points) hit two straight triples to tie the game up at 31-31.

Later in the game, Lis had a 3-pointer from the wings. Zach Huybrecht answered him with a triple from the corner.

"It was a team game," Huybrecht said. "We just had to play a good team game and we have it."

The Tigers led 37-36 with 12 minutes to go in the game.

A momentum change happened when Guild got called for a technical foul. Nyquist made one of his two free throw attempts. Next, Matrella made two free throws to give Bessemer the lead.

"I got a technical and had to sit down for the last five minutes which was the most difficult thing in my life," Guild said.

The Speedboys led 39-37 with eight minutes to

go in the game.

Breunig took it himself for two points to regain the Tigers the lead. Then, Bessemer's Teddy Wittla-Sprague hit a 3-pointer to re-take the lead.

A Mercer run ended up deciding the game. Ryan Losh made an acrobatic two points to tie the game at 42-42 with 5:45 left.

Conrad LaBarge made an entry pass to Losh who scored again. Breunig nailed a corner 3-pointer.

The Tigers led 47-42 with four minutes to go in the game. Bessemer called a timeout.

Matrella made two more free throws for the Speedboys. It wouldn't be enough as the Tiger defense clamped down.

Nyquist, who had 17 first half points, had just one in the second half.

"We did make a defensive adjustment at half to try to get (Nyquist) to stop scoring because we noticed he's an excellent player, excellent athlete," Guild said. "And we made an adjustment and it worked. I don't think he shot the ball very much in the second half from start to finish."

Three players netted the Tigers three points. Losh got an offensive rebound. The ball found Klopatek who had a look at a 3-pointer. He made the extra pass to a wide open Breunig who nailed a triple.

Losh came down the paint to make it 52-44, Mercer's lead. Klopatek

added in a layup to increase the Tiger lead.

Matrella (22 points) added in a couple of late baskets to his total. LaBarge sealed the win with two paint points by pump faking and getting two Speedboy players in the air.

"It feels so good — finally," Huybrecht said. "Onto Butternut for win number two. Good game all around."

The Tigers outscored the Speedboys 33-23 in the second half.

Up next, the Tigers (1-14, 0-11) seek their second straight win when they play at Butternut tonight starting at 7 p.m.

The Mercer girls' basketball team has been faced with injuries, close games and tough breaks. Things finally went their way when a former conference foe came to town Monday night.

The Tigers defeated Bessemer, Mich. 54-36. It was the Tigers first win since Dec. 13 as they snapped their eight-game losing streak. It also was a season high in points for Mercer.

"Feels very good because we expected to be a lot better this season and we had a lot of injuries in a lot of our girls. So we were missing a lot of girls," junior KD Knipp said. "It just felt good having our whole team back, besides Nina (Doi), but it felt good having them in."

"We really needed it," junior April Klopatek said. "We were really getting down on ourselves and it was really nice to get a win."

It was a low-scoring game at 5-2 Tigers lead six minutes into the game. Then, the Tigers started to get hot from the field, including three straight possessions of baskets.

Jenny Klopatek scored two with a foul in the lane. Knipp scored a jumper on a bank shot. Next time down the floor, Jenny Klopatek saved the ball to Adrienne Konneker who hit a short jumper. After that, Knipp went coast-to-coast for two points.

Bessemer's Laura Uribes passed to Natalie Stone for a layup. Still, they were down 13-4 with eight minutes left in the first half.

Knipp scored the Tigers next seven points. She did it with jumpers, free throws and a steal.

The defense of the Tigers stifled the Speedgirls. The Speedgirls had just 11 first half points.

"We played very hard on defense. Usually we don't do a 55 man-to-man, and we do a zone defense, but we've been running man and it's working very good and we're all working together and stuff. We did get tired in the second half though," Knipp said.

Amber Eith came off the bench and provided a spark. She grabbed an offensive rebound and went up for a shot, getting fouled. She sunk both of her free throws.

"It was awesome. Amber played tough at South Shore, getting more minutes. She's our best free throw shooter so she knocked down some free throws, and she had a drive to the basket and made a bucket which was awesome," coach Adam Miller said.

Knipp scored a basket with a foul towards the end of the half, making the free throw. April Klopatek got the assist. Eith then assisted Knipp for two in the paint.

The Tigers led the Speed-

girls 27-11 at the half.

"It was a lot of emotions because we've just had so many tough games. We had two games from Ironwood and Butternut that we lost by two. We're playing better," Miller said. "The girls come to practice every single day and they work hard and just once in a while you deserve one."

Early in the second half, Jenny Klopatek picked up her fourth foul. The Speedgirls started the half on a 5-0 run. Stone made a running hook shot, followed by a free throw by Patience Prochnow.

The Tigers called a timeout. Bessemer's Brooke Stanislawski scored on a putback.

Eiley Schoeneman, who scored just three first half points, got the Tigers back in the scoring column with two on an offensive rebound at 13:25.

Prochnow responded with a fadeaway shot. Uribes went coast-to-coast with a euro step at the end. The Tigers called another timeout. The Speedgirls had cut the Tiger lead to under 10 points at 29-20.

Schoeneman (13 points) went back to the paint for two points. Shortly after, Jenny Klopatek picked up her fifth and final foul, sending her to the bench.

Knipp scored her first points of the half due to a Schoeneman pass. Schoeneman scored two more in the paint and Knipp grabbed an offensive rebound for two.

The Tigers led 38-23 with

eight minutes to go.

"I think it was our defense and the way we played on offense," April Klopatek said about the win. "We really used our post players."

The Speedgirls had one more run in them. Stone made a long jumper and then Amaya Casiano knocked down a 3-pointer. It was 40-31, Tigers lead.

It was a total team effort to get the Tigers next basket. Konneker got an offensive rebound. Knipp then made a sharp pass to April Klopatek who used a floater with glass to score.

Eith drove to the rim for two points. Then, Knipp got to her spot for a jumper, the assist to Konneker.

The Tigers comfortably led 49-33 with 3:40 left in the game.

Knipp put an exclamation point on the win with a half court buzzer beater. The long 3-pointer gave Knipp 28 points, leading all scorers.

"I (shoot half-court) at every practice before the beginning of practice," Knipp said. "Sometimes it goes in, sometimes it doesn't. And it went in tonight."

Stone led the Speedgirls with 11 points, the only Bessemer player in double figures.

Up next, the Tigers (4-11, 2-9) take the road to play Butternut tonight. Tip-off is set for 5:45 p.m.

away late with 3-pointers by Muench and Lurvey. The Eagles outscored Lakeland 34-18 in the second half. Just four Eagles scored in the game — Smith (7 points) and Griffin Stiemke (4 points) — were the other scorers.

"Aside from the blood-in-the-water moment, we went from 15 to 16 down to 11 or 12," coach Fortier said. "We were ok and then they made a lot of shots at the end to make it a bigger win."

Up next, the Thunderbirds (6-12, 2-5) play at Antigo tonight starting at 7:15 p.m.

The Lakeland girls' basketball team hit the road for a non-conference contest Monday night at Wausau West. Wausau West's strong second half netted them a win.

The Warriors beat the Thunderbirds 75-62.

"It was a great game. It was a fun game to watch, fast paced up and down the court, high-scoring game with a lot of great players on the floor," coach Melissa Ouimette said. "Wausau West is a very good team, undefeated in the (Wisconsin Val-

ley Conference) and a tall team."

The Thunderbirds were playing without starter Saylor Timmerman, out with an injury. It made a difference in the game, especially on the boards. Wausau West also used their height to their advantage.

"We found a way to score, it's just that on defense we had a hard time keeping them off the boards," coach Ouimette said. "We'd go out and try to cover those 3-pointer shooters (but it) opened up the inside for them more, trying to get rebounds."

Julianna and Kristina Ouimette both had the hot hand in the first half. Together they combined for 28 of Lakeland's 32 first half points — 13 from Julianna Ouimette and 15

from Kristina Ouimette.

Lily Fortier had the other four points of the half for Lakeland. They were the only first half scorers for Lakeland.

The Warriors had five different scorers by halftime, a balanced effort. Molly Anderson had eight points on four field goals by halftime, same as Kelly Kray. Lexi White had six points by half.

Lakeland led the Warriors 32-27 after 18 minutes of play.

Wausau West got hot in the second half, using second chance rebounds to their advantage. They also knocked down three triples.

"The second half they were getting rebounds and starting to get hot from the outside too," coach Ouimette said.
