Gunner Dunbar walks it off to conclude 60th season

The 60th snowshoe baseball season ended with some fun on Monday night. Newswatch 12 came to town and together with the Snowhawks, the two teams mixed it up for a game that came down to one swing.

Team Weller defeated Team Betti 10-9 in eight innings on a walk-off home run by Gunner Dunbar.

"I thought it was an awesome game," player-coach Jeff Smith said. "After (I wrote the lineups), I looked at the two teams and said to myself, 'I think I've got one lopsided'. As it turned out, it was perfect."

Just a seven-inning game, it ended up going eight innings when it was all tied up at 9-9 after the seventh inning.

"We wanted to play seven innings, these games last longer anyway and it ended up going eight," Smith said. "Couldn't ask for anything better than that."

Up 3-1 in the second, Derek Young hit an insidethe-park homer to deep left that rolled all the way to the wall. That put Team Betti up 4-1.

Team Weller had their big inning in the third. Liz Taylor reached base on a dropped ball. Then, Adam

Magdiak hit an RBI double to give Team Weller a 5-4 lead. Geoff Weller also con-

tributed an RBI to center. Now, Team Weller led 6-4 after three innings in front of a large crowd for the last game.

"That's the biggest lastgame-of-the-season crowd we've ever had," Smith said. "People walked away happy and that's a building block for the next year."

Ryan Schowalter provided the power in the next half inning. He hit an insidethe-park home run to deep left center to get one run back. It was a 6-5 ballgame now.

Team Betti tied the game up at 6-6 in the top of the fifth. Rachel Eyler and Nate Meihak both reached on singles. Then, a run scored off the bat of Todd Niemuth. It was a 6-6 game now.

Three runs came to score from Team Weller in the bottom half of inning number five. Donny Moore tripled home two runs and then he tried to score himself. He was called out at home plate and settled for the triple. Team Weller led 9-6.

Team Betti had a fight in them in the top of the seventh, the last inning. Dave Nance, Young and Cole Punches got hits. Justin Betti scored a run with a hit, as did Meihak. All of a sudden, the game was tied at 9-9.

"They got into a situation where they got guys on base and Newswatch 12 hit the ball around," Smith said. "One hit after another. That was a great inning and that was when the crowd really started getting into it. When that happened, I knew it was going to be a barn burner at the end."

It came down to the bottom of the eighth. Lefthanded hitting Dunbar came to the plate as the leadoff batter for Team Weller. He smoked one to right field and ended the game and season with a walk-off home run.

"I'm glad it happened to him. That was an awesome shot, no doubt about that," Smith said. "That put the game away quick."

The home run ended a great 60th snowshoe base-ball season.

"It's been a great season," Smith said. We had a lot of dry weather which set up the field normally really well. We had a good nucleus on the team. (From the) girls in the press box and announcers, we just have a lot of fun. The way the team battled back, this is a year to remember. After a year of being cancelled, I couldn't be happier with how this unfolded."

Axe week Lakeland football plays at Rhinelander tonight at 7 p.m

It's Axe week. And with that comes a rivalry game between the Lakeland Thunderbirds and the Rhinelander Hodags.

"This is a great rivalry game. Many of our players play other sports and whether it's in football or other sports, they have competed against each other for the majority of their lives," coach Dan Barutha said. "Our kids know their kids and vise-versa. When they're the closest community to ours and in the same conference, it is very clear this is a rivalry game. The Northwoods Axe is at stake and our guys are excited.' It's the third straight year that Lakeland will travel down to Rhinelander for the game. The teams were set to meet last year in Minocqua, but a COVID-19 outbreak on Lakeland cancelled

last year's game. "It's quite unique that we're playing them for the third straight time down in Rhinelander. Last year's regular season game was cancelled because of COVID and then they had the higher playoff seed in our region, so that s why we traveled back there," Barutha said. "They have a good atmosphere at their games and our fans travel well because of the close proximity of the contest so it will be a great environment for a high school football game." Now back to their regular season rotation, the Hodags come into the game 2-0. They beat Tomahawk 32-0 on the road in their opener on Aug. 20 and then defeated Milwaukee Riverside 50-22 in Rhinelander on Aug. 27.

We need to read our keys, attack and maximize our pursuit to the ball." There's a new quarterback in Rhinelander. Jacksen Smith is running the offense and he's been efficient thus far. He's completed 10/13 passes for 205 yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions. He's completed 76.9% of his passes with a rating of 157.9. "Their new quarterback throws the ball well, especially off of

The Hodags are headlined by their two running backs Cayden Neri and Caleb Olcikas. Max Masayesva returns an interception for a touchdown with help from Jerry Goselin (13) against Tomahawk on Friday, Aug. 27 at Hatchet Field in Tomahawk.

Neri rushed 11 times for 234 yards and five touchdowns against Milwaukee Riverside. That's an average of 21.3 yards per carry. "For our defense, we need to align properly to their formations first and foremost. You cannot stop or limit anyone if you don't align correctly," Barutha said. "The second thing is for our guys to execute their job exactly the way it's been coached throughout practice this week and the beginning of

Ever since an opening tie with Three Lakes, the Lakeland boys' soccer team has been rolling. That continued with a big win over Antigo Tuesday night.

The Thunderbirds defeated the Red Robins 9-0.

"The instructions were basically see how well we can establish our own game," coach Ihor Myshchyshyn said. "So the emphasis was trying to play short, long passes, movement of the ball up and down the lines... dropping the ball down to the defense to keep up our heads up to see the passing lanes. Stick with our game basically."

Yaroslav Myshchyshyn got the scoring started for Lakeland with a touch-in goal at 5:21. Bo Peterson crossed the ball in for the assist.

For his second goal, Yaroslav Myshchyshyn dribbled the ball himself and scored unassisted at the 13:35 mark.

Abe Evenhouse scored his second goal of the season at 20:07. Ashton Anderson crossed the ball in from the right and Evenhouse shot it in. Lakeland quickly led 3-0.

"We like (Abe's) physicality on top. Due to his presence, he maintains his positions, he doesn't get pushed off," coach Myshchyshyn said. "Nice to have him coming off as a starter or coming off the bench and sub in and give someone a break (and put) pressure at the net."

At 28:34, Leo Rotar crossed the ball from the right that hit the crossbar. Yaroslav Myshchyshyn was there to touch it in for the hat trick.

"What worked well for (Yaroslav) was basically the team performed so well," coach Myshchyshyn said. "I think what was nice in the game was the ability of our team to use our left and right midfielders to go up towards the flag and send the ball in."

The scoring barrage continued in the first half when Dominic Gironella scored his first career goal. Grady Sloan passed it to Gironella who took two touches and shot it in. Lakeland led 5-0 at the 33rd minute.

"Tremendously exciting for (Dominic)," coach Myshchyshyn said. "Now that that's in, he'll just feel a lot more that he belongs there as you always wonder when you come into high school as a younger aged player."

Chandler Savel got in the scoring column with an unassisted goal at 33:27.

Before the half ended, Yaroslav Myshchyshyn scored an unassisted goal at 36:25. He took it right to the goal and scored. The Thunderbirds led 7-0 at the break. "I think after the fifth minute we got on a roll and we were feeling it," coach Myshchyshyn said. "It was flowing. It was fun to see.' Sloan scored Lakeland's eighth goal at the 62nd minute with the assist going to Yaroslav Myshchyshyn. Sloan shot it from the 10-yard line. At 68:28, Sloan scored yet again with the assist to DJ Ratajczyk. Ratajczyk made a pass at the 10-yard line that Sloan shot in. The Thunderbirds played Medford on Thursday. Lakeland volleyball finishes quad with win over Auburndale

The Lakeland volleyball team returned to the court to play a quad at Wausau West on Tuesday. There, they won a number of sets and finished with some of their best volleyball.

The Thunderbirds fell 2-1 (25-11, 27-29, 14-25) to Wausau West, lost 2-1 (20-25, 21-25, 25-14) to Marathon and beat Auburndale 2-1 (16-25, 25-13, 25-11).

All three games were non-conference matches.

Wausau West

Meg Pfannerstill led the way with nine kills, followed by six from Callie Ullius. Megan Haggart led the team with 13 assists while Brooklyn Pesava totaled four. Haggart also had the most service aces with three.

On defense, Pfannerstill led the team with 11 digs. Ullius added in nine digs while Samantha Barton and Lily Fortier added in six digs.

"We came out ready to play. The girls played great offensively and defensively versus West," coach Jenny Quade said. "It might be a loss, but I consider it a win for us as a team to pull together like we did."

Marathon

In set three, the Thunderbirds had a wire-towire win, never letting Marathon take the lead. Early on Ullius had two aces. Haggart also had an ace herself.

Katherine Tiffany took advantage of a free ball and powered it down for a kill, forcing Marathon to take a timeout. Lakeland led 7-1 in set three.

Two of Ullius' six kills against Marathon came in back-to-back plays. Haggart got the assist on both of them with digs by Pfannerstill and Pesava.

"Marathon was everywhere. They dug up

Haggart led the team with 13 assists and 15 digs. Tiffany finished second with seven kills.

Auburndale

The Thunderbirds ended the day with back-to-back victories in sets two and three.

"Something we have been working on as a team is pulling ourselves together for a full game," Quade said. "We have shown glimmers of our strengths and our weaknesses and have not been able to overcome the weaknesses once we get down."

Auburndale led 1-0 early in set number two. Lakeland tied it up and after that, led the rest of the way.

Barton's dig led to three separate points early on. One dig led to a Pesava set to Tiffany for the kill. Auburndale took a timeout as Lakeland led 9-4.

Ullius put her stamp on the game with a kill and an ace to put the Thunderbirds up 17-11.

The Thunderbirds ended set two on an 8-2 run. A Ullius-Haggart-Pfannerstill connection scored a point late in the set.

"Our focus this year has been consistency with our serve receive. Trying to have the same girls back there and creating less confusion so we are able to get the ball to our setters more to be able to set up our hitters," Quade said. "So far it is working out great. We have three setters this year and it has been awesome to see the flexibility it is giving us."

A 6-0 run in set three gave the Thunderbirds the spark they needed to come out with a win. Within that run, Pfannerstill powered down a free ball for a kill and Haggart got an ace.

Hannah Bridgwater got an assist on a set to Pfannerstill for a kill. Pfannerstill led the team with 11 kills.

"It was great to see the girls not give up after that first game and come back to play their hardest of the night for the last two sets," Quade said. "I am hopeful that it is a mindset change."

up 11-7, the Thunderbirds went on a 10-0 run highlight by the serving of Barton. After an Auburndale timeout, Barton recorded three straight aces. Lakeland led 21-7.

The Thunderbird defense allowed just one score to Tomahawk and forced three turnovers, including a pick-six. They will look for more of the same tonight.

Rocky Wagoner scored two touchdowns against Tomahawk. That'll be a recipe for success against the Hodags as is getting quarterback Brayden Wiczek going.

Lakeland and Rhinelander play the Northwoods Axe Game tonight at Mike Webster Stadium in Rhinelander starting at 7 p.m.
