

BLANCHARDVILLE – Despite having just 22 players available for last Friday night's football game, the River Ridge Timberwolves cruised to a 46-8 Six Rivers conference victory over host Pecatonica/

The shutout by the River Ridge defense was broken when the Vikings found the end zone with just 40 seconds remaining in the contest, also getting a two-point conversion run for the final tally. With five different offensive linemen playing in new spots, the Timberwolves still managed 325 yards and five touchdowns on just 16 rushing attempts.

"If we could do that every week I'd be a happy guy," said coach Winkers. Five different players for River Ridge carried the ball Fridgy might, with no one having more than five carries.

Leading the way with 161 yards and two TDs on just four carries was quarterback Logan Drone, while Cooley carried the ball five times for 82 yards and two TDs.
