#### **Verona's Naisha Nagpal scores** big as high school freshman

erona freshman Naisha Nagpal keeps a notebook she writes in before every match. She likes to write down her opponents' weaknesses and strengths.

"I'm taking those mental notes," Nagpal said. "Sometimes I write it on my phone or in my notebook.'

She has become an instant force since she took the court for the Wildcats this season.

Nagpal (30-4) enters the WIAA Division I state girls tennis tournament as the eighth seed in the No. 1 singles bracket, earning a first-round bye. She will play the winner of Madison West sophomore Grace Qian (20-13) and Oconomowoc senior Juliet Hussey (12-20) in a second-round match on Thursday, Oct. 14, at Nielsen Tennis Stadium at the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

She has eight years of tennis notes built up since she first started the sport. She recalls her father watching tennis and getting her involved.

Nagpal started playing tennis when she was 7. She started competing in USTA tournaments at 8.

"My dad really wanted me to get into tennis," Nagpal said. "He's the only reason I'm here right now.'

Early on, she received tutelage from her father and later her brother.

Nagpal and her family have a tennis connection. Her father plays tennis. Her older brother, Kush Nagpal, a 2020 Verona Area High School graduate, played

Nagpal said her father has helped her get tennis lessons and paid for her to attend academies in Florida.

"He's just really dedicated for me and tells me to go have fun, try your best and ignore the other players no matter how good they are," Nagpal said.

Nagpal travels across the Midwest playing USTA tournaments in Chicago, Indianapolis and across Ohio.

"High school tennis is so much more fun because you have a team to cheer you on," she said.
Nagpal said she doesn't like

being at home.

"I get really bored and tennis is really fun because I get

to talk to friends," she said. "It keeps my mind off of things and it's fun to play competitive because you can always get better. There is no perfect player. Even (Novak) Djokovic can get

better at things."
Nagpal has found a home at No. 1 sin-gles for the Wildcats. Verona coach Mark Happel said Nagpal is always calm, cerebral and a student of the game.

"She gets into the mind of her opponent and knows what she has to do to win," Happel said. "She moves her feet well and has great awareness.'

## Verona trio all make Verona looking to knock off No. 2-ranked Sun Prairie

#### Wildcats might earn top four seed, home playoff game with victory

The Verona football team can't win a Big Eight Conference championship, but they can earn a top four seed and a potential home game in the Division 1 Level 1 playoffs next week.

Verona (6-2, 4-2 Big Eight) hosts Sun Prairie (8-0, 6-0 Big Eight) in the regular-season finale on Friday, Oct. 15, at Verona Area High School. With a win, the Wildcats could spoil the Cardinals' chances of winning a conference title outright. Sun Prairie defeated Middleton 26-21 Oct. 8 to clinch at least a share of the Big Eight title.

Verona's game against Madison East

last week was canceled. This is the final year Sun Prairie is in the Big Eight Conference. Next year, when the new Sun Prairie West High School opens both Sun Prairie East and

The Wildcat boys collected 81 points. Wauwatosa East finished first with 46 points. Kenosha Indian Trail took second with 70 points.

Sophomore Lexi Remiker paced the girls with a time of 20:45.9, good for 13th out of 108 runners.

New Berlin Eisenhower freshman Faith Wehrman won the race with a time of 18:16.1. Middleton had second, third and fourth finishers.

Verona junior Sotera Boado clocked in at 21:05.7 to take 21st. Senior Payette Neess placed 25th with a time of 21:14.9. The Wildcats were rounded out with senior Emma Petta's 21:38.9 and junior Hannah Dohnal's 21:53.

## VA/MH takes second at Beloit Memorial

#### Wildcats win 10 of 11 events in dual with Beloit Memorial

Sophomore Isabella Gnewuch of the Verona Area/Mount Horeb girls swimming team set a meet record in the 100-yard butterfly in the Beloit Memorial Invitational on Saturday, Oct. 9, in Beloit.

The Wildcats finished second in the 15-team invitational, racking up 581 points. Top-ranked Middelton won the team title with 752 points.

The performance came one day after VA/MH won 10 events en route to rolling to a 130-40 Big Eight Conference dual meet win over Beloit Memorial.

"I was trying to make relays that were competitive because they swim faster when there is a close race." Verona Area/Mount Horeb coach Bill Wuerger said. "We definitely have more depth than we have had the last couple of years. It's not too tough to put together multiple fast relays to push each other. We will have some tough decisions to make at the end of the year."

Verona Area/Mount Horeb senior Tola Klabough always looks forward to the chance to compete in the pool.

"It's always good to race even if vou don't feel your best," Klabough said. "It's good to get up and see where you are at."

The Wildcats are three weeks away from the Big Eight Conference meet. Klabough is aware her time of competing in the pool is dwindling.

"It's crazy it (senior year) has come so fast," Klabough said. "I've had a good time on the team so far and I want to keep working hard like I always have and just enjoy it because I know it's almost over.'

#### **Beloit Memorial Invitational**

The Wildcats turned in 11 topfive finishes in the Beloit Memorial Invitational Oct. 9, in Beloit.
