Germain wins triple jump, Hodag girls 6th at GNCs

ANTIGO — The Rhinelander High School girls' track team wound up sixth in a competitive Great Northern Conference field Tuesday in Antigo.

Emma Germain defended her title in the triple jump and the Hodags had four other all-conference performances in a tightly contested meet.

Mosinee won the meet going away, with 198 1/2 points. Less than 22 points separated third-place Lakeland from last-place Northland Pines.

"I'm very proud of the way we responded," Hodag coach Aaron Kraemer said. "They came in tonight and had a few issues. We had a couple of thigh issues and things we are working through."

Germain, a senior, was the top seed in the triple jump after a leap of 33 feet, 1 3/4 inches in the preliminaries rounds. She upped that mark to 33-10 in the finals to beat Mosinee's Kate Fitzgerald by nine inches for the victory.

"Emma, all she wanted to do was win the conference in the triple jump," Kraemer said. "She wanted to make sure she was the one standing on the pedestal at the end and, ultimately, she is. I'm excited for her. Once she truly gets over this now and says, 'I'm the conference champ,' and goes into next week and says, 'I can be here with these girls and deserve to go to sectionals and state,' I think she'll do it."

BACK ON TOP

Hodag boys reclaim GNC track title, Worrall runner of the year

ANTIGO — The Rhinelander High School boys' track team went 52 years between conference championships before it won the Great Northern Conference title in 2019. The wait for another conference title was not nearly as long for the Hodags, though one could not blame them if it felt like another half century.

COVID-19 canceled the 2020 season and prevented a talent-rich Hodag squad from defending its title. Last year, a couple of missed chances and Mosinee's all-in strategy in the sprints and the jumps left the Hodags five points short of the championship.

Finally, Tuesday afternoon, everything fell into place and the Hodags were once again back on top of the GNC.

The Hodags won five events, including three by senior Cole Worrall, as they held off Lakeland by 18 points for

the conference championship at Antigo's Listle Field.

"It feels really, really good to be a conference champion again," Hodag coach Aaron Kraemer said. "Last year,

to have it end the way that it did under the circumstances, I really felt like we needed this redemption tonight."

Hodag golfers take 2nd in final GNC meet

The Rhinelander High School olf team finished the Great No.

golf team finished the Great Northern Conference season with a flourish on Tuesday. The Hodags shot 323 as a team and took second in the conference finale at Bass Lake Golf Club in Deerbrook.

The performance came on the

The performance came on the heels of a fourth-place finish with a solid round of 342 Monday in Eagle River. Overall, the Hodags finished third in the final GNC standings.

Tuesday's performance at Bass Lake was a breakout event, however. It marked the first time Rhinelander had all five of its players break 90 in a meet this season. Freshman Brody Kowieski and senior Koldyn Gechas each shot in the 70s to secure second-team all-conference recognition.

"The boys really played really well," Hodag coach Adam Schmidt said. "Everybody played good. It just worked out today. Brody, Cal (Laggis) and Andrew (Henrichs) said they had no penalties today. That's the big thing, just keeping the ball in play."

Kowieski fired a career-low round of 4-over 75 on Tuesday that included a hole-out eagle from roughly 80 yards on Bass Lake's par-4 14th hole. That was good enough to finish in a three-way tie for second on the day.

"Brody just played awesome all the way through. Brody was all excited, he did the Mrs. Zierden," Schmidt said, referencing a celebration by Hodag junior varsity golf coach Carole Zierden. "She got an eagle a couple of years ago out on 17 (at Northwood Golf Club) and she threw her club up in the air and jumped up and down. That's what Brody did. He said, "I did the Mrs. Zierden!" He was super excited."

Hodag baseball can't keep up with No. 2 Mosinee

Heading into Monday's home contest against Great Northern Conference-leading and second-ranked Mosinee, Rhinelander skipper Joe Waksmonski said his team would have to bring its Agame in order to compete.

The Hodags didn't on Monday and it was reflected in the result. The Indians scored in every inning but the fourth and Rhinelander aided the effort with six errors in an 11-0 loss at Stafford Field.

The miscues led to five unearned runs, and Mosinee (19-2, 10-1 Great Northern) stung starter Jacksen Smith for nine runs on seven hits over five innings. On the flip side, the

Hodags (7-5, 6-5 Great Northern) managed only two hits off Mosinee's Keagen Jirschele as they were shut out for the second time this season.

"They came as advertised and when you start trying to do too

much, that's when the mistakes happen," Waksmonski said of Mosinee, which clinched a share of the GNC title with the victory. "You start forcing the issue. We did a little bit too much of that tonight."

Mistakes loomed large from the start of the game as Jirschele singled, moved from first to third on a hit and run groundout and scored on a wild pitch. Davin Stoffel singled and the Hodags misfired on a chance to retire him at second on a grounder by Tanner Unertl. Both Stoffel and Unertl scored when Gavin Obremski hit a single to left and the Hodags mismanaged the relay back to the infield, giving Mosinee a quick 3-0 lead.

Stoffel hit a two-run double in the second and Obremski tripled in a run in the third before his courtesy runner, Seann Bryant, scored on a Drake Grod grounder.

Trevor Garski was hit by a pitch in the fifth and scored when Obremski's single to right got by the outfielders. Obremski wound up at third on the play and Bryant, running for him again, scored moments later on a Grod sacrifice fly.

In all Smith allowed six earned runs, struck out four and walked two as he fell to 2-3 on the season.

"There were just a couple of mistake pitches that we made and Mosinee just stung the ball and made us pay for those couple of mistake pitches,' Waksmonski said. "For the most part, he got a lot of pop ups off their front foot. He induced some ground balls as well. I thought he did a nice job keeping them off balance. There were a couple of pitches here and there, but with hitters like that, a couple of mistake pitches are a couple too many with

Hodag tennis closes out dual meet season with wins over Shawano, Wausau West

The Rhinelander High School boys' tennis team used its final two dual meets of the season on Monday to better position itself for WIAA tournament play, which begins next week.

The Hodags knocked off two teams in their subsectional, Shawano and Wausau West, by matching 7-0 scores in a triangular at the RHS tennis courts. The Hodags completed dual meet play 15-4 overall and now have wins over four of the teams it will see this coming Monday when they host a WIAA Division 1 subsectional.

"Two 7-0 victories is nice going into that, especially when we think about seeds," Hodag coach Matt Nichols said. "West had a wonky lineup but, with Shawano, it looked like their standard lineup, so it was nice to get wins across the board and it's another school we have comparables when we look at some of the other subsectional teams."

Rhinelander cruised against the Hawks, winning all seven flight in straight sets. Luke Ring, Elijah Evers, Dalton Fritz and Nicholas Lesch swept singles play. Fritz and Lesch bumped up to the Nos. 3 and 4 flights with John Currie unavailable for Monday's play.

"We saw Nick get another varsity start and he's really worked hard over last summer and this winter. It was nice to see all his strokes come to fruition and get a varsity win," Nichols noted.

In doubles, the pairings of Joey Belanger/Layne Roeser, Leo Losch/Charlie Heck and Eli Lundt/Dawson Pontell all cruised to victory.

against Wausau West. Evers was pushed by Ethan Steinbach at No. 2 singles, but won a first set tiebreaker and went on to take a 7-6 (5), 6-2 victory. Ring and Fritz won handily in straight sets while Lesch won unopposed at No. 4 singles.

"Elijah was hitting more consistent and it looks like he's a little more comfortable, getting into the groove of singles versus doubles, which he played earlier this year," Nichols said. "Dalton was really strong. Luke was playing strong, finishing a lot of shots, developing a lot of points."

Rhinelander combined to drop a total of eight games in the three doubles matches against the Warriors.

"I think our doubles are really starting to click, especially No. 2 doubles, they had a lot of very nice angled shots from the net," Nichols noted. "No. 1 doubles, they've worked really on two up, and that was nice to see, both of them coming to the net and finishing points together as a unit. They're really starting to play well together and their chemistry is just growing each and every match."

The Hodags were set to take part in the GNC tournament in Antigo on Thursday and entered the tournament with a 32-point lead in the conference standings over Antigo, which defeated Medford 5-2 on Monday. Play concluded after press time for today's edition as the Hodags needed only 12 points to lock up their seventh straight GNC title.

Rhinelander will host Bay Port, D.C. Everest, Green Bay West, Pulaski, Shawano, Wausau East and Wausau West in an eight-team subsectional Monday at the RHS tennis courts. Prior to the start of the season, Nichols said one of the team goals was to repeat last year's postseason performance and advance all seven flights through to next Wednesday's sectional round at Wausau West.

With four entries advancing to sectionals out of the No. 1 flights and two entries advancing out of the rest, Nichols said, the Hodags have done as much as they can to put themselves in position for favorable draws despite being the lone GNC team in the field.

"I think our lower flights are vying for the No. 1 spot — No. 4 singles, No. 2 doubles, No. 3 doubles," he said. "No. 3 singles, we're looking at a top two. No. 1 singles, we'll probably sit behind Everest at that flight, probably getting the two seed. No. 2 singles, it really depends on how Thursday goes, but we're probably going to get a lower one there and then No. 1 doubles, there's solid teams there and it's probably going to come to a lot of debate and votes and we'll just see how it goes but, hopefully, get the No. 1 seed there.

"Seeds are great but, at the end of the day, it's who plays the best that day. We'll work for the seeds that we deserve but then it's up to the boys to finish the matches and move on. I'm looking forward to it. I think today really brought some more drive and energy into it, looking at some of these (subsectional) teams and making the dream more of a reality."

Hodag soccer needs PKs to take down Pines

The Rhinelander High School girls' soccer team ultimately came out victorious Tuesday afternoon on the road, but it proved to be a victory that put the Hodags in more a precarious position as they fight for the Great Northern Conference title.

Northland Pines benefited from an own goal as it drew with Rhinelander 1-1 in regulation in Eagle River. The Hodags won the penalty kick shootout 3-1 to earn two conference points instead of one, but the win lessened Rhinelander's margin of error in the GNC title fight.

Rhinelander (12-5-1, 7-0-1-0 Great Northern) led Lakeland by five points in the conference standings entering Thursday's rematch between the two sides in Minocqua and put the Hodags in a position that, if they were to lose that game in regulation, they would no longer control their own destiny in the GNC.

"It's just one of those games. I can't say the girls played a bad game, because they didn't play a bad game," Hodag coach Nathan Bates said. "They did everything they were supposed to be doing, it's just the shots weren't going where they were supposed to unfortunately tonight."

Rhinelander dominated play, outshooting Northland Pines 37-5 in the match. The Eagles had only three shots on goal, and their score was not even of their own doing.

The Eagles scored off a corner kick in the 30th minute when Rhinelander defender Audrey Schiek tried to clear the ball inside the box and inadvertently deflected it into her own goal.

"It's just a scramble in there. Audrey was where she was supposed to be, it was just a mishap where she went to clear the ball, it went off the side of her foot wrong and it went into our goal. Just something that happens," Bates said. "Audrey went for the ball and it was a bad spin back into the net. It hit off her foot wrong and it went in."

McKenna Brown leveled the match for Rhinelander scoring on a pass from Aubrey Younker in the 51st minute, but that was the only score the Hodags could muster in regulation. Of the Hodags' 37 shots, only 16 finished on target.

Worrall took home conference runner of the year honors as he not only swept the 110 and 300-meter hurdles, but added a win in the 200-meter dash as well. Caleb Olcikas won the 100 and finished second to Worrall in the

It all came full circle for Worrall, Olcikas and the rest of the Hodags' senior class. The entered as champions their freshman year and they will go out as champions again their senior year.

"Last year, we had some unfinished business," Olcikas said. "This year we came in with the mentality that we knew we could win if we did our best. Coach always says 'your best is good enough.' Today, our best was good enough and we took home that dub."

This year's meet did not have nearly the tension of last year's, when Rhinelander and Mosinee were neck and neck the whole way. Mosinee was in contention early, but faded to fifth. By the time the Hodags took three of the top five spots in the 100, they had a lead they would never relinquish.

Rhinelander all but clinched the championship in the 200 with Worrall and Olcikas' 1-2 performance. That put the Hodags 32 points ahead with three events left to score. Freshman Greyson Gremban's sixth-place finish in the 3,200 was enough to put the Hodags over the top and mathematically clinch the title.

Going into the meet, Kraemer said there would be plenty of weight on the shoulders of his former state qualifiers, Worrall and Olcikas. They delivered the maximum 58 points they could score in their six events.

"They're the guys that needed to score points when we needed them," Kraemer said.

Going into the meet, the question seemed to be whether Worrall would run the 200 or the 300 hurdles to go along with his signature event, the 110 hurdles. He ended up doing all three, dusting the field in every race.

Worrall went 15.69 seconds in the 110s to beat Northland Pines' Andrew Hartwig by 0.53 seconds, He beat Hartwig again by 0.87 seconds to win the 300 hurdles (41.95). With only a short break to catch his breath, Worrall went 22.72 in the 200 a few minutes later. He and Olcikas (22.92) were the only runners in the field to break the 23-second mark.

"At first, it was a little tiring but, if you get the proper rest that you need,

you can do any event," Worrall said. "Overall, I'm happy with how I performed in the 110, looking to break 15 again this year. Other than that, the other two races were not that bad."

Olcikas ran away with the 100 meters, posting a time of 11.49 seconds to beat Mosinee's Kyle Miller by 0.17 seconds.

"The 100's my event. I knew if I did my best, or close to my best, I could take the victory," Olcikas said, taking the 100 after finishing second in a photo finish to Mosinee's Cyle Kowalski last year.

"Caleb, champion in the 100, that to me is the ultimate champion," Kraemer said. "If you're the champion in the 100, you're the big man on campus. You walk around with your chest popped out and you know you're the fastest person in the school, fastest person in our area. Very, very proud of him and he did everything I asked of him after last year. He was hungry with Cyle Kowalski beating him out last year."

Overall, it was a great day for the Hodags in the sprints. Senior Beau Howard was third in the 100, junior Brenden Eckrich was fifth. Those two, along with Olcikas, teamed with Payton Campbell to win the 4x100 (45.72). Eckrich, Campbell, Howard and Arik Beske added a runner-up showing in the 4x200.

"That's a big part of our program. We're a 'feed the cats' program. We want the fastest kids to be in our program, and to make sure they're happy and healthy," Kraemer said. "We've had some of the fastest sprinters in the GNC. A lot of it is genetics. They are fast but, at the same time, we've seen a lot of improvement with our kids too. That's something they buy into. It has nothing to do with me. I'm not making them any faster, other than working on their form and small things. It's them that run faster. They do it because they like being at practice."

Tuesday's meet provided some redemption in the throwing events for senior Brock Snyder, who was the top seed in the discus last year but failed to make the finals after not getting any of his preliminary throws in bounds. That wasn't the case this year. He popped off a big throw of 131 feet, 1 inch in the preliminaries to easily make it into the final nine. While he could throw no farther in the finals, that mark held up for a runner-up finish in the event. He added a fourth-place effort in the shot put and teammate Conner Jensen finished third in the discus.

"Any person that should be holding

the trophy and saying to themselves they redeemed themselves is Brock,' Kraemer said. "Last year he put a lot of pressure on himself and then took it really, really hard at the end because of what happened it the disc. I told him to go out and have fun tonight, to not even worry about it. I was there for his big throw. It was awesome. He's in the 130s, that's great. Hopefully, next week we get into the 140s for him so that he can keep his season going. This means a lot to him. This is what he does. I'm just really proud that he was able to get some redemption."

Rhinelander had strong performances across the board on Tuesday, scoring points in every event except the 800-meter run. Freshman Truman Lamers took second in the triple jump with a leap of 39-10 3/4, Jaden Beske cleared 6 feet in the high jump for the first time this season to finish second in the event and Kaleb Winter was second in the pole vault, clearing 11 feet

Rhinelander ended up with all-conference recognition in all four relay races. Ty Welk, Cody Ruetz, Jack De-Namur and Gremban took third in the 4x800. Jaden Beske, Welk, Winter and Ruetz were third in the 4x400.

"This team has put a lot of work in," Worrall said. "We might not have the best athletes but we have a lot of decent athletes. That's what we need to win these. Everyone's been putting in as much as they could this year. I'm very proud of everybody."

In addition to Worrall's wins, the Hodags racked up additional points in the hurdles. Peter Danh was fourth in the 300 and fifth in the 110s while Abe Barlog finished sixth in both events. Shane Petrick, out for the team for only a couple of weeks, busted off a jump of 18-9 3/4 in his last attempt to take fourth in the long jump. Welk was fifth in the pole vault and eighth in the 400, Ruetz was sixth in the 400 and Gremban added a seventh-place finish in the 1,600.

"We scored in the events that we needed to score in," Kraemer said. "Would we have liked some better performances? Of course, but that's what happens in meets like this. The tension gets high. Some people overperform. Some people underperform and the team has to pick each other up. I'm very proud of the way we responded."

The Hodags now turn their attention to postseason competition, beginning with a WIAA Division 1 regional at Wausau West this coming Monday. The top four finishers from each event will advance to Thursday's sectional round in Marshfield. That will be easier said that done for Rhinelander, which will be the plusone in what will essentially be a re-run of the Wisconsin Valley Conference meet.

"I'd love to be going to a D2 regional but we can't control that," Kraemer said. "Being one of the smallest teams in Division 1 is always going to be tough, but we have some really great athletes. We might change some things up, We'll see. Now it's not about winning, it's about getting them to the next level."

Germain and fellow senior teammates Megan Brown and Sage Flory could not quite defend their title in the 4x100, or pull off the win in the 4x200. The three teamed with junior Gussie Gruett in the 4x200 and led going into the final exchange, but conference 100-meter champion MacKenzie Wissbroecker of Antigo ran down Flory over the final 200 meters to claim a 0.48-second victory for her squad.

It was a similar story in the 4x100 as Germain, Brown, Flory and freshman Reese Gehrig were in the mix down the stretch, but Wissbroecker turned on the after burners over the final 100 to give Antigo the win and Medford edged out Rhinelander for the runner-up spot.

"Sage has just been battling all year long. She's just trying to get herself back to last year's form and it's been tough for her. But they took second in the 4x2, third in the 4x1 against some of the

fastest girls in the conference," Kraemer said. "I can't say enough about Emma Germain. I said this about Rebecca last year and I say this about Megan and Sage a lot, if my daughter turns out like them, I've done good and I'll be very proud. They're just great kids. They're competitors."

Rivers Eagleson tied for second in the pole vault with a personal-best performance of 8 feet, putting her only three inches off of Meghan Kelley's school record set back in 2008. Junior Abby Swanson for Rhinelander's other all-conference performance, finishing third in the shot put (31-8 3/4).

The Hodags upset Lakeland, the preseason GNC favorite, 1-0 April 28 in Rhinelander.

Tuesday's game against Mosinee has been moved to the Marathon County Sports Complex in Wausau and will kick off at 7 p.m.

The two got him back to 1over on the day. He gave the strokes back with bogeys on the following two holes and dropped one more shot on the par-4 1st hole, his 17th of the day.

Tuesday's performance came on the heels of Kowieski's worst showing of the season Monday, a 91 at Eagle River Golf Course.

"He definitely bounced back. At Pines he said his back was a little sore and he just wasn't really feeling it," Schmidt said. "Just the be able to turn it around in one day, that really tells that he's a good player and he likes to play golf. He knows he's got to play it shot by shot and it worked out. He's going to be a good player."

Gechas' only real misstep Tuesday was a double bogey on the par-5 13th hole. Otherwise the senior was steady, with birdies on the par-5 fourth and par-3 17th to shoot 76 and finish tied for fourth.

"Kole just worked at it all day long," Schmidt said. "I watched him on a couple of holes and he scrambled. His short game was really good. He was getting up and down."

The result moved Gechas into a tie for eighth in the final conference point standings, allowing him to earn second-team all-conference honors for a second straight

year. He also earned honorable mention in the GNC as a freshman in 2019. The 2020 season was canceled due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Kowieski entered Tuesday's play just outside the second-team cutline, sitting in 11th place overall. His runner-up performance allowed him to vault into 10th in the standings, earning the final second-team spot.

Andrew Henrichs, Garrett Kulhanek and Cal Laggis all needed top-10 finishes Tuesday, and a little bit of help, to work into the all-conference mix. Kulhanek and Henrichs tied for 14th with rounds of 86 while Laggis was 17th with a career-best 87.

Lakeland shot 302 Tuesday following a 303 on Monday to complete the clean sweep of all seven conference events. Medford had finished runner-up in the first six conference matches, but finished fourth Tuesday behind Rhinelander and Antigo. The Hodags ended up five points behind Medford for second, and six

points ahead of Antigo for third in the GNC standings. That matched third-place showings in 2016 and 2017 as Rhinelander's best team result in conference since winning the GNC title back in 2011.

On Monday in Eagle River, Gechas and Kulhanek both shot 9-over par rounds of 81 to tie for 10th on the day. Henrichs shot 89 while Kowieski and Laggis both shot 91s as Rhinelander finished four strokes behind Antigo for third.
