

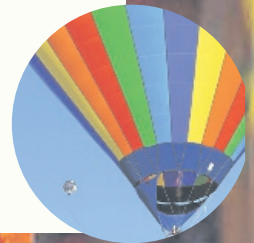

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Up, up and away at Waterford Balloonfest

WATERFORD — If the skies above Waterford are clear and calm, with light winds, on Saturday, Kate Brown will be very happy.

She's one of the board members who organized the Waterford Balloonfest, open from noon to 9:30 p.m. Saturday, July 16.

The one-day festival takes place on the Waterford High School, Evergreen and Fox River school properties on Main Street.

Admission is free. Parking is \$10 (cash only).

Organizers are hoping to have about 15 hot air balloons at the festival.

There are two "launch windows," during which the balloons will take to the sky (weather permitting): 6 to 7:30 a.m. and 6 to 7:30 p.m.

"We're really encouraging the public to come to the evening launch window," Brown said.

A huge attraction is the festival's "evening glow," from 8:30 to 9:15 p.m.

"The balloons stay on the ground and light up, looking like glowing bulbs," Brown said. "It's really spectacular to see."

The festival also features:

- Children's games from noon to 3 p.m.

"The National Guard is coming," Brown said, "with a few bouncy houses and a football toss game, chalk drawing and other activities."

- A craft fair from noon to 6 p.m.

- Helicopter rides from noon to 6 p.m.

The cost is \$60 (cash) or \$62 (credit card), offering an aerial view of the balloons, from Lakeshore Helicopter.

- Drone races from noon to 8 p.m. in the soccer fields. "This is a new event," Brown

said. "I've never seen it in person, but I've heard it's amazing and that the drones fly at these crazy speeds."

- A car show from 2:30 to 4 p.m., featuring a local car club.

■ "Dog time" from 2 to 4 p.m., with dog-related vendors and dog activities. "People were asking if we're dog friendly," Brown said. "So we added some dog-related events."

- Live music from 3 to 6 p.m. with the band Depot Express.

- A Kids' Bubble Launch from 4 to 4:20 p.m.

"We will also have food vendors and craft beers," Brown said. "This is a great event and brings people to Waterford."

This is Waterford's first balloon festival since 2018, and Brown is "hoping to get people excited about it. We started small this year with a one-day event and will hopefully expand it."

This year, members of the public are not able to take tethered balloon rides, but the committee is hoping to add the rides in 2023, Brown said.

Racine Concert Band performs Sunday

RACINE — See if you can guess which instrument soloist Eric Weiss will be playing Sunday night with the Racine concert Band.

The name of the piece is “Love That Trumpet!” by William Curnow.

If you said “trumpet,” that’s correct. Weiss is the featured trumpet soloist as part of the band’s program on July 17 at the Racine Zoo, 2131 N. Main St.

Weiss, a longtime member of the band’s trumpet section, is a retired Racine Unified School District instrumental music instructor and is a frequent performer in the Parkside Reunion Big Band, Belle City Brassworks and Kenosha Pops Concert Band.

The vocalist Sunday is Allison Hull, making her 13th appearance as a guest artist with the Racine Concert Band.

A graduate of Lawrence University and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee, she’s a frequent performer on professional stages, including roles at the Milwaukee Opera Theater, the Skylight Opera and the Florentine Opera. She is also an associate lecturer in the music department at UW-Parkside.

Hull is performing two opera pieces — “O del mio amato ben” by Stephen Donaudy and “Habenera,” an aria in “Carmen” by Georges Bizet. This aria is so popular, it’s been featured on the soundtracks of numerous movies from all genres, including, Pixar’s “Up,” “The Bad News Bears,” “Bad Santa” and “Trainspotting.”

Hull will also perform the Victorian parlor song “Love’s Old Sweet Song” by James Malloy and “All the

Things You Are” by Jerome Kern and Oscar Hammerstein. The Kern/Hammerstein song was written for the 1939 musical “Very Warm for May” and has been recorded by several artists over the years, from Ella Fitzgerald in 1963 to Carly Simon in 2005.

The band, continuing its landmark 100th season, will also perform “Bravura,” a 1918 march by Charles

Duble (who played trombone for 23 years in circus bands); “Ancient Airs and Dances,” a set of three orchestral suites by Italian composer Ottorino Respighi; and “The Little Red Schoolhouse,” a 1967 piece by William Grant Still. He was the first American composer to have an opera produced by the New York City Opera and was a pioneering Black composer who wrote nearly 200 works, including five symphonies, four ballets, nine operas and more than 30 choral works.

The band also performs “The Belles” by James Albino, “Allsports March” by Robert Farnon, ballet music from “Harlequin’s Millions” by Riccardo Drigo, Leroy Anderson’s huge 1951 hit “Blue Tango” and John Philip Sousa’s “George Washington Bicentennial March.”

Mark Eichner, celebrating his 20th season as the band’s music director, will conduct the program. Don Rosen, a professional radio

Sweden's **Outshine** will be the dark draw for what should be a good crowd. Having performed since the early 2000s, Outshine has had a ton of turmoil, but they put the experience to use in shows. The Racine stop is part of the band's eighth U.S. tour, nestled among many European tours.

The dark, melancholy goth-metal band has gathered much love and respect for their toughness and survival skills. According to Outshine's website, this tour "will be different, more of a Sisters of Mercy/Type O Negative feel to it and with a darker, melancholy." Racine punk metal band **Venganza** will open things up. Tickets for this international

show are only \$10.

Outshine and Venganza perform starting at 8:30 Friday night, July 15, at McAuliffe's Pub, 3700 Meachem Road in Racine.

KENOSHA — The Kenosha Pops Concert Band heads to "The Final Frontier" for its July 20 performance.

The free Wednesday night concert continues the band's landmark 100th season and starts at 7 p.m. on the band shell in Pennoyer Park.

Audience members will hear music from the '70s and '80s, as the band continues its "through the decades" theme this summer.

The band's Wednesday night outdoor concerts are celebrating the band's first 100 years by highlighting tunes from the band's first century.

The season opening June 15 program featured songs from the 1920s, June 22 visited the 1930s, June 29 focused on the 1940s, July 13 rocked out with the '50s and '60s — and now it's time for the 1980s and '90s to shine. The July 20 program in-

cludes space-related tunes including the medley "Star Trek: Through the Years," "Star Wars: The Marches" by John Williams, the "Jupiter" movement from Gustav Holst's "The Planets" and "Fly Me to the Moon" by Bart Howard.

The band's guest artist Wednesday night is tuba player Marty Erickson.

Over a career spanning more than 50 years, Erickson was principal solo tubist with the United States Navy Band in Washington, D.C., where he served for 26 years. He is in his 17th year as instructor of tuba, euphonium

and chamber music at the Conservatory of Music at Lawrence University in Appleton — where one of his students was Kenosha Pops Musical Director Craig Gall.

Erickson is also the principal tuba player with the Fox Valley Symphony Orchestra and performs with Rodney Marsalis and his "Philadelphia Big Brass."

During a February 2016 visit with local high school band students, Erickson, who started playing the tuba in sixth grade, said he "liked the sound" of the tuba and "being the backbone of the band."

"When I started playing solo," he told the students, "I started doing more than just 'oompa.' For instance, I just played concertos for every instrument on the tuba: flute, violin, bassoon"

Note: Bench seating is provided at the band shell. Audience members may also bring lawn chairs and/or blankets. Because the weather can change rapidly, dressing in layers is recommended. Pennoyer Park is located at 35th Street and Seventh Avenue at Kenosha's lakefront.

There are plenty of folks who suit up in their personal set of armor or don their finest Elizabethan gowns to enjoy the Bristol Renaissance Faire every weekend.

You know who you are, and we wish you a full two months of role-playing nirvana.

But for the rest of us casual visitors, who might visit a Renaissance faire every few years or when out-of-town visitors are in need of entertaining, there are several ways to enjoy the local Ren Faire action without going full street beggar:

If you like live performances

The Bristol Renaissance Faire is a great venue for seeing all sorts of performers, from the how-can-they-bend-that-way? moves of the “Barely Balanced” acrobats to the bawdy musical shows.

Here’s a quick cheat sheet, though you can find many more shows at the Faire’s performance spaces:

Bawdy humor: Try the **Sturdy Beggars Mud Show**, the “corpse comedy” of the **Ded Bob Show** (through Aug. 21), the **Wash Well Wenches** (called a “naughty



When in doubt, wear flowers in your hair!

and tempestuous twosome”) and **Menage a Moi**, who is back with his brand of R-rated Renaissance-style humor.

Circus-style spectacles: You’ll want to catch shows by Ren Faire favorites **Adam Crack** (his “Fire Whip” show contains thrilling stunts), those “**Barely Balanced**” performers (they do juggling, balance and impossible lifts) and **Moonie the Magnificent** (his show features balance tricks, tightrope walking, juggling and comedy). Bonus: The final Barely Balanced show each day adds FIRE. Yes, fire. **The Lynx Show** is described as “a blend of magic, sword swallowing and comedy.” You don’t see people swallowing swords every day, right?

Renaissance-style action: Don’t miss one of the jousting contests. You may also enjoy “**Dirk & Guido: The Swords-men**,” with their “flashing steel, daring-do and wooing of women.” Their motto: Bold and stupid men at your service!

If you like improv

Broon returns to the Ren Faire, through July 31 and then Aug. 27-Sept. 5. He is known for interacting with audience members while juggling bowling balls and eating fire. **The Brothers Blackquill** (through July 31, plus Aug. 20-28) are on a quest to “write the greatest play ever written,” using suggestions from the audience at each show.

If you like animal acts

Cirque du Sewer — familiar to fans of “America’s Got Talent” — features trained rats and cats, all rescued from shelters. Their trainer creates complicated obstacle courses for the rats and dances with the cats. (Cirque de Sewer is at the Faire through Aug. 21.)

If you like aerial performers

Lauryn Murray performs as “**Aerial**

Silk Fantasy,” at the Faire through Aug. 7. Look up to find her, as she “floats effortlessly 30 feet above Shakespeare’s Meadow near the RenQuest encampment.”

If you want to rock

In contrast to the Faire’s gentle wandering minstrels, **The Jackdaws** perform original, contemporary and traditional Irish rock to audiences. Other Renaissance rockers include **The Langers Ball**, a two-piece Irish Folk-punk band, and **The Freestylers of Piping** (July 30-Sept. 5).

If you like day drinking

If you’re serious about sampling the

Faire’s adult beverages, join one of the daily **Pub Crawls** (buy tickets in advance online or at the Faire). Pub Crawl participants get to skip the lines at the taverns and public houses.

If you like shopping

The streets of the Bristol Renaissance Faire are lined with shops, offering items — stage combat axes, chain mail apparel — you won’t find at other summer festivals.

If you like eating your way through festivals

It’s expensive — and you really don’t want to keep track of the calories involved — but it is possible to eat non-stop from the moment you enter the Renaissance Faire until you step back outside the gates and make your way back to the 21st century.

If you do opt to focus on eating — and why not? it’s a summer festival and you’ve been so good on your diet all

week — at least try to sample some fare that differs from the usual “festival food” offerings like bratwurst and onion rings.

Renaissance Faire favorites include **giant turkey legs, mushrooms swimming in a garlic/butter sauce, shepherd’s pie, fruit/ice cream crepes and cheese fritters.**

If you have kids to entertain

Head to the **Kids’ Kingdom**, with its Castle Stage area. Family shows include **Clan Tynker** (juggling, magic, comedy, dance, more sword swallowing, fire-eating, tight-wire walking) and the all-ages pirate fun of **Thee Bluebeard** (Aug. 6-7).

If you like pretending you’re not at a Renaissance Faire

Grab a seat outside the “**Vegetable Justice**” booth next to the jousting field. People actually pay money to toss

tomatoes at the “Justice” guys, who hurl insults at fairgoers while standing behind a wooden booth. Older folks will be reminded of Don Rickles in his heyday. Now, it’s any day on Twitter.

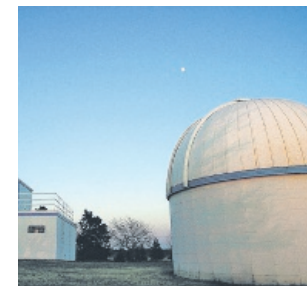
