

In talking to numerous athletes this season, that's one of the things they're most excited about – not having to wear a mask while playing.

What will this season look like?

The three combined to score almost 42 points per game last season as juniors.

The Red Devils should be competing for a Bay Conference title this year.

I don't want to count anybody out, but for the girls, it should be a two-horse race with De Pere and Notre Dame.

The Tritons are the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Division 2 defending state champs and should be right there again this season.

Head Coach Sara Rohde, another "Yooper," played her college ball at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay.

Like Winchester, she's intense and stresses hardnosed defense.

The Redbirds also return tons of talent from last year's 23-4 team.

Led by Jordan Meulemans, a Division I commit to Butler University, De Pere also has other options.

Meulemans, who's averaging about 30 points per game so far this season, is fun to watch.

If you haven't noticed, she and Kinziger are on the front cover.

After those two teams, everyone else will be fighting for position.

Ashwaubenon is young, Bay Port returns some good talent, West De Pere is also young, but the Phantoms beat Pulaski to start the season.

Green Bay Preble has a new coach in Lyndsey Seela, who takes over for Jim Doell.

On a sad note, Green Bay West won't field a varsity team because of a lack of numbers.


With things fairly back to normal this season, get out and watch your favorite teams and players.

Ashwaubenon searching for more after regional championship

ASHWAUBENON - The Ashwaubenon boys' basketball team enjoyed a stellar season in 2020-21.

Midway through the campaign, the Jaguars won 16 straight games, including victories over Bay Port, De Pere and Notre Dame Acad-

Ashwaubenon closed the regular season with wins victories over Menominee and Homestead and carried the momentum into the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Division 2 playoffs, where it defeated Notre Dame in a regional final before losing to Seymour in the sectionals.

"The kids bought in and understood their roles," Ashwaubenon Head Coach Mark Tomashek said. "We started slow but played better basketball toward the end of the season. They started to believe and got tougher."

This year's squad will look much the same in the backcourt but different in the frontcourt.

If the Jaguars are to compete for a Fox River Classic Conference Championship (FRCC), it most likely will have to get production from its big men.

As juniors, Marcus Tomashek and Matt Imig pumped in more than 38 points per game combined.

Their leadership as seniors will be leaned upon because small forward Boone Kirst is the only other player

returning who saw significant playing time last year.

"We're looking to do more than we did last year," Imig said. "I want to get better as a player but also make my teammates better. We need to get out of the blocks ear-

Imig said Bay Port, De Pere and Notre Dame are his biggest three rivals and said his step-back triple is his favorite move in crunch time.

With Kyle Krueger graduated and Eli Zollar out with an injury, Ashwaubenon could be dealt a tough hand in the frontcourt early unless numerous newcomers make an impact.

"When you have to replace (Krueger) and other seniors (such as Brady Wittig), it's a huge loss," Tomashek said. "You don't replace their production. You must find other ways to get it done. You have to find guys to plug in, step

up and do their job." Seniors Cayden Walton and Max Huguet are two players who have stayed with the program through limited playing time.

Both will be counted on down low.

Junior Zach Kelly is an undersized post who will

also be in the hunt to mix it up in the paint.

"They all want to be successful," Tomashek said. "They want to put the work

The Jaguars' pecking order in the FRCC could hinge on whether four sophomores can contribute to the lineup.

Drew Tomashek, Eason Hurd, Jayden Schoen and Jackson Sims were all behind upperclassmen last season and most played junior varsity basketball to get stronger.

However, the quartet has shown glimpses at the lowerlevel scene, which may indicate contributions from the start.

High school basketball has been a year-round sport for many years now.

AAU (Amateur Athletic Union) programs have been increasing, and the number of sports academies is growing in Wisconsin and across the country.

"If you don't stay in touch with the kids, you're losing out," Tomashek said. "In our day and age, you have to have a complete love for the game as a coach. You must be a gym rat. It's not an easy job, but it's a very rewarding

Jaguars looking toward youth to jolt program

ASHWAUBENON - The Ashwaubenon girls' basketball team is looking to eradicate a three-vear losing streak that dates back to the 2017-18 season.

The Jaguars have gone 24-42 during the span and have broken in many young players in the process.

Included in that record, Ashwaubenon finished 5-13 overall last year and 3-12 in the Fox River Classic Conference (FRCC).

'We've had lots of success off the floor," Ashwaubenon Head Coach Nicky Van-Laanen said. "The first thing we stress is to be a good person. We have quality and unselfish kids. They are steady and want to succeed. It's what brings me back every year."

Ashwaubenon has been to two state tournaments - one in 2004 (lost in quarterfinals) and another in 2006 where it hoisted the gold ball.

The green and yellow had a difficult time putting the ball through the hoop scoring 50-plus points in only four games last season.

"We couldn't move kids up and down last year because of COVID-19 restrictions," VanLaanen said. "Half of my girls would have benefited from another season of junior varsity basketball. The rest of the group embraced the challenge and did what

they could with a reduced season and limited contact. We took some lumps, which will benefit us this year. I believe we'll be able to consistently hit more shots from the perimeter."

Ashwaubenon lost three seniors from last year's squad, but the main core of scorers and contributors re-

The formidable frontcourt duo of Senior Nvia Marohl and Junior Hannah Hutto returns after averaging more than 17 points and 10 rebounds combined.

"I'm excited this year for the season," Marohl said. "It was a struggle at times to get my shot off the way I wanted. With the addition of some quality talent, it will give the older players some rest in the games and put less pressure

In addition, Bri Lambrecht, Abby Holford and Avery Amenson saw significant time in the backcourt and increased their totals as the season wore on.

"Our two seniors, (Lambrecht) and (Marohl), are due for breakout seasons," Van-Laanen said. "(Lambrecht) was our starting point guard and is capable of taking over a game. (Marohl) is an allconference performer."

The potential is there for an increased rotation and better results as Ashwaubenon welcomes in three freshmen (Gianna Guarascio, Addy

Phipps and Bella Dahl) and sophomores (Lauren Mader, Ella Senger and Sophia Zabel) who are all competing to see the floor and potentially

"I feel like the upperclassmen and underclassmen will mesh well this season," Van-Laanen said. "We had to go with a zone defense much of last year because we didn't feel confident to play manto-man in one of the best conferences (FRCC) in the state. Offensively, we are a motion team that uses a few sets. We'll mix it up more this season."

Pirates look to rebound from rocky season

SUAMICO - After making it to the Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Division 1 State Tournament in 2020, the Bay Port girls' basketball team took a step back last

The Pirates, who finished 6-14 in 2020-21, are hoping to return to glory this season under second-year Head Coach Dennis Gladwell.

"I finally feel like the team is mine," Gladwell laughed. "I feel lots more comfortable because I was able to work with the girls more and put more emphasis into what I wanted to do. We had a normal offseason, which helped. I have lots of confidence in this team. We can play with teams and won't be an easy cakewalk."

Gladwell took over last season for the departed Kati Coleman and was hired about a week before the season.

"I had already been with the program (as an assistant coach under Coleman), so that helped," Gladwell said. "I don't have anyone back from the previous coaching regime, so I can finally say this team is truly mine."

Bay Port started last season 2-10 but won four of its last eight games.

"It was an up-and-down season," Gladwell said. "We started poorly, then won four straight and then lost four in a row. We're looking for more consistency this year. We had a bunch of youth that never played

varsity basketball before. We didn't have a true point guard – I had to put players in positions they weren't used to playing. It's what we had to do."

Gladwell said last season's schedule was "extremely difficult" in playing Kimberly, Hortonville, De Pere and Notre Dame Acad-

"Ultimately, our tough schedule last season will help us this year," he said.

Gladwell said veteran senior Emma Krueger decided not to go out this year because she's concentrating on softball.

Krueger recently committed to Rock Valley College in Rockford, Ill., to play softball.

She was a part of the girls' basketball state championship squad in 2019 as a freshman.

Hendricks nailed 36 triples to lead the team.

"Those three girls will need to step up their games from a scoring standpoint," Gladwell said. "With being only a freshman last season, (McDermid) got better as the season wore on."

Gladwell said 6-foot se-

nior Maggie Luedke, who has battled a foot injury most of her high school career, is back.

"I'm excited to get (Luedke) back on the court," he said. "She's stronger than what she's been in the past."

Besides De Pere and Notre Dame, Gladwell said Pulaski, Green Bay South-

"During summer play, we played against both teams and held our own," he said. "Preble has a new coach, so you never know there. Sheboygan North has a great coach and is always tough."

Gladwell said there are 16 freshmen in the program as well, which should bode well for the future.

SUAMICO - The Bay Port boys' basketball team doesn't rebuild - they simply reload.

Using that same philosophy, the Pirates return plenty of talent from a team that finished 15-7 during the 2020-21 COV-ID-19 season.

"We always seem to have enough bodies and athletes to be competitive every year," Bay Port Head Coach Nate Rykal said. "You always worry about what you've lost, but then you look at your roster and know you'll be okay. It's an advantage to having a large school with good athletes and interest at the lower level. The guvs who didn't play as much during the previous vear are one vear older and have seen their bodies mature."

The Pirates lost three solid scorers in Gunnar DeCleene (13.7 points per game), Isiah Harris (10.1) and Brock Freeman (6.8) to graduation.

Those guys scored at a good clip and will be hard to replace," Rykal said. "But, we have lots of guys who didn't get lots of play-

De Pere boys preseason-ranked No. 1

DE PERE - Every year, writer/editor Mark Miller releases Wisconsin Basketball Yearbook, which dives into the season ahead for high school boys' basketball in the state.

Miller releases preseason top-10 rankings for every di-

To no one's surprise, De Pere made the list in Divi-

But where the Redbirds fell in the rankings might have surprised a few southern Wisconsin hoops follow-

De Pere was ranked No. 1 following a solid 2020-21 campaign where it fell short of state by one game.

It returns a ton of talent and depth along with two Division I recruits.

Led by junior John Kinziger, the Redbirds could be in store for a storybook season.

"It puts more pressure on our team, which is good because it makes you want to hold that number 1," Kinziger said. "To us, it doesn't mean much, except the fact we have to hold it

De Pere Head Coach Brian Winchester, in his 15th season, joked that getting top ranking means nothing.

"We've barely talked about it," he said. "Somebody thought highly of you, and they paid you a nice compliment, but outside of that, it doesn't mean anything in terms of our season. It's a nice compliment,

but that's it."

The Redbird players are a close-knit group who are competitive with high basketball IQs, said Winchester.

De Pere is coming off a 22-4 season where it lost at River Falls 53-52 in a sectional final.

Two starters graduated from that team: Will Dehn (11.2 points per game) and Maddax Shinners (7.6 points, 3.9 rebounds, 2.2 assists).

The Redbirds will also be without another starter for the season, Max Donaldson (8.3 points), who tore his ACL during the offseason.

Kinziger was named first-team Fox River Classic Conference (FRCC) for the second straight year and led his team in scoring at 22.5 points per game as a sopho-

The point guard knocked

down 73 3-pointers and also averaged 4.3 rebounds, 3.7 assists and 2.0 steals in each contest.

Entering the season, Kinziger is 17 points shy of reaching 1.000 for his career.

Once he hits that plateau, he'll be the 12th player in program history to do so.

The other starter back is second-team all-conference guard Jack Jorgensen. As a junior, he was third

10.8 points per game. He led the team in rebounding (5.3) and was sec-

on the team in scoring at

ond in assists (2.7). Junior Gabe Herman came off the bench last year and chipped in 6.5 points and 3.5 rebounds per game.

Known as the team's primary defensive stopper, he slides into the starting lineup and will be more of an offensive threat this season.

Winchester said he talked to Herman about him "probably being guarded by a lesser defender from many teams.'

"Teams are going to pay attention to (Kinziger), Will Hornseth and Jorgensen," he said.

De Pere averaged 70.8 points per game a season ago, but what it didn't have in that high-potent offense was a true post player.

Cue Will Hornseth.

The 6-foot-8 sophomore, who's already receiving Division I offers, is strong in the post, but can also shoot from the outside and handle the ball well.

"He's talented, but we're going to make sure we put him in positions to be successful," Winchester said. "We're excited about him like we're excited about all our guys. We have lots of

Besides Zach Kinziger, Noah Gehin, a junior, is a strong, physical player who should help on the inside. Junior guard Hogan De-

movsky provides the Redbirds with a reliable guard who can spell John Kinziger when he needs a breather.

Winchester said 6-foot-7 sophomore Ben Willingham will provide more length.

Juniors Grant Hohol, Ethan Ramos, Caleb Dietsche, Zach Kane and Trey Plos are all in the mix to get playing time this season.

"Hopefully, we're fun to watch," Winchester said. "You're going to see a team that gets after it."

Behind talented group, De Pere ready for state run

DE PERE - If this season was a high-stakes poker game, the De Pere girls' basketball team would be all in.

The Redbirds are coming off a 23-4 campaign and lost in a Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Division 1 sectional semifinal.

De Pere graduated one key contributor — Sophia Mc-Carthy — from last year's squad.

With the 1-2 combo of Jordan Meulemans and Claire Bjorge, the Redbirds will be one of the top teams in the Fox River Classic Conference and state.

De Pere is preseason ranked No. 7 in Division 1 by WisSports.net.

"We have four girls who've played varsity since their sophomore year - (Meulemans) her freshman year - so we've got lots of experience," sixth-year De Pere Head Coach Jeremy Boileau said. "We had lots of success last year that we can bring those experiences into this season. We also have one of the better sophomores in the state, Claire Bjorge. 



As in years past, our defense will create our offense."

The talent is there, as the Red Raiders return five of their top seven scorers from last season, but Sheridan Flauger, now playing

at Division II UW-Parkside. graduated.

Ashlyn Szymanski and Brynn Egnarski anchored a backcourt that averaged close to 17 points and 11 rebounds per game on a team that won 14 games, including wins over Bay Port, Green Bay Southwest and Sheboygan North.

"I think we're going to turn some heads this year," Szymanski said. "We have a fast team. Everybody has a role. The team communicates well on the floor. We know when a pass is

coming or what to do on a screen to get open."

If Pulaski is to increase its win total, the defense will most likely have to remain stout.

Last season, the Red Raiders held teams to 40 or fewer points in 12 games. Madeline Christenson,

Olivia Kubiak, Taylor Olson and Ella Wiese all contributed on that side of the floor to make the Red Raiders one of the best in the conference.

The unanswered question going into the season is, can Pulaski get production from its frontcourt to alleviate opponents from overplaying them on the perimeter?

Sophie Majewski and Gabrielle DeCleene could fit the bill, with both pushing 6-foot and having the ability to throw their bodies around in the post.

Also in the mix is Sydney Gwidt who didn't play in 2020-21.

"Those frontcourt players have put in lots of time over the spring and summer months to be comfort-

able," McElrone said. "We still aren't going to be big compared to other conference teams. We have gained our physicality by doing cross-fit."

Unbeknownst to many, Pulaski is a community that is growing but only has a little more than 3,000 people in its incorporated area.

"I don't work at the high school," McElrone said. "However, it's cool to walk into the hallways and have kids acknowledge you. It shows lots of students are showing up to follow our games and make a difference."

Teams can now play a maximum of 24 games (per WIAA guidelines) before

the postseason begins.

It gives squads who compete in the 10-team Fox River Classic Conference the ability to schedule additional games, where in previous years, they were unable to make happen.

"I don't know if it opens anything up for our program," McElrone said. "I'm an old school coach who values practice time and teaching fundamentals to get better. With the new format, it will be important to have some depth and not just play five or six girls for an entire 36 minutes. For the kids, it's great. They want to play as many games as they can. In the end, that's what's most important.'

Seymour boys to replace most of its scoring

SEYMOUR – Last year marked the end of an era for the Seymour boys' basketball team.

Mason Dorn — the alltime leading scorer in Seymour basketball history — graduated.

Dorn, who averaged 27.5 points per game, was a part of a senior-laden group that led the Thunder boys' squad to great heights.

The team finished 21-7 and advanced to a Wisconsin Interscholastic Athletic Association Division 2 sectional final.

Dorn, second-leading scorer Logan Griesbach (11.6 points), third-leading scorer Treyton Cornell (9.2), fourth-leading scorer Caden VanHandel (5.4) and sixth-leading scorer Evan Vanden Langenberg (4.0) will all have to be replaced.

Those five accounted for 84.4% of Seymour's scoring a season ago.

"We graduated five seniors who played a ton of minutes," second-year Seymour Head Coach Bobby Kuchta said. "Late in the year, all five of them started. There are lots of

opportunities out there. We always have high expectations. We're going to have to be disciplined, which we're trying to get into the guys' heads. We can't shoot quick, challenged shots, and we can't force shots on offense because we lack size. We lack varsity experience."

Seymour's two most experienced players back are senior post Daniel Inman and sophomore point guard Tru Cornell.

Cornell was the team's fifth-leading scorer at 4.2 points per game, and Inman chipped in 3.7 points and 2.9 rebounds.

"(Inman) brings physicality and experience, which we're going to miss early," Kuchta said. "He's a garbage kind of guy—inside points, offensive

rebounds and defends the post. Points in the paint for him are going to be big, but he's got a chance to be a 10 points, 10 rebounds guy every game."

Unfortunately, Inman will be out of the lineup until early to mid-December recovering from a broken right arm.

Cornell showed glimpses of the future as a freshman, coming off the bench and making a difference.

He shot more than 50% from the field and was 18-for-35 from beyond the three-point arc.

"(Cornell's) expectations are going to multiply from last year," Kuchta said. "He was a role player for us and skilled, but now he's going to be asked to do lots — point guard, score more, shoot more and defend the best player on the other team as a sophomore."

Senior guards Gunar Weyer and Sam Daugherty will be in the starting lineup as well.

Both got playing time on varsity a season ago, with Weyer averaging 2.1 points per game and Daugherty 1.2.

After those four guys, Kuchta said he and his coaching staff are evaluating talent and looking for others to crack the starting lineup.

In the mix will be seniors Chester Baranczyk and Mason Pautz and juniors Pace Jefferson, Mark Rusch and Nate Krull.

Also, senior Dane Swenson and sophomore Braden DeBruin are injured but will earn playing time once they return.

"The role players can shoot it a little, but they're not totally confident with it," Kuchta said.

Without a 30-point-anight scorer this season, Kuchta said his team will be more balanced on offense.

During early-season practices, Kuchta was preaching the importance of defense to his players — especially this year.

Kuchta said if his guys can play solid defensively and can hold teams in the 50-point range, they will be in lots of games.

"We're working more on defense this year," he said. "It's a huge part. There's a big focus on defense because we won't have as much firepower on offense."

"(Konop) has got to fill a big role for being a post," Ninham said. "We've always played with each other, so we have good chemistry already. Katie, too, I depend on her with the ball-handling and us two working together to get shots down."

Abaray sees Konop getting inside and providing a solid post presence.

"We're going to look for that interior post presence," Abaray said. "She does a nice job of making contact and screening. We'll need her to be a good cleanup person around the rim."

West De Pere has four freshmen who Abaray is expecting to log plenty of minutes.

Ella Francois, Madisyn Berggren, Faith Walder and Ava VanEss make up a solid freshmen class.

"They're talented," Abaray said. "If they weren't ready, we wouldn't have them up."

Abaray said he's hoping Noelle Runke and Alana Noggle, both junior posts, will provide some inside help.

"We have 12 or 13 girls who we're going to be taking a hard look," he said. "It's nice because you have fouls to give. We have lots of the same kids, and they're going to have to come honest by the minutes to compete."

Abaray said he anticipates his starting lineup will evolve as the year wears on.

"We're going to have some growing pains early and often," he said. "Even defensively, we're bringing lots of girls into the mix who are expected to play at a high level. We're going to have some growing pains with that. It's going to be lots of learning on the fly. Our expectation is you ask questions, but we keep going."

Despite a young lineup, expectations for the program are still high.

"We're rebuilding, we are retooling," Abaray said. "The expectation is to compete for conference titles every year. As inexperienced as we are, we have the pieces, we're prepared and they know what they're doing. The goal is to win conference again."

Over the past three sea-

sons, West De Pere is 40-0 in the Bay Conference.

Its last league loss was Jan. 19, 2018. Xavier is coming off a run-

ner-up finish in the Bay last season at 8-3. With almost its entire roster returning, it will be a

frontrunner for the conference crown.


