## Area ski parks offer snow tubing lanes for participants of all ages

For fans of winter sports, snow tubing offers a universal brand of fun.

Parks around southeast Wisconsin provide a wealth of places to tube, while area ski hills offer a full downhill experience.

Sunburst Ski Hill caters specifically to tubing fans, in addition to skiers and snowboarders.

The Kewaskum-based hill offers "the largest and best tubing hill in the world," according to CEO Rob Friedl.

He said the operation is running at "full tilt."

"We've made great snow," said Friedl, who said Sunburst is seeing strong attendance numbers this year, with returning skiers and snowboarders from last year.

With the high-quality winter clothing now available, he added that cold temperatures need not be a deterrent.

"You can get outside and spend a half an hour or an hour and go inside and warm up a little bit," Friedl said.

Sunburst offers e-commerce sales for those looking to head out to ski, snowboard or tube, through its website.

"It's super simple to do," Friedl said, adding that walk-up business is welcome, too.

Sunburst is open with tubing hours seven days a week. The location offers over 40 chutes for tubing, including a quarter-mile run with a 90-foot drop, according to the website.

"Speeds of up to 30 miles per hour. Not one, but two Magic Carpet lifts that pull you back to the top so you can keep going," the site said.

And tubing is a winter sport that doesn't require special expertise.

"The best thing about snow tubing is that just about everyone can do it, no lessons required," the Sunburst website said.

At The Rock Snowpark in Franklin, Riley May agreed.

like a pro.' It appeals to all ages, kids and families," said May, general manager at The Rock.

At The Rock, there are 19 tubing lanes along with a Magic Carpet conveyor, according to the park website.

Participants must be 36 inches or taller. The Rock Snowpark provides a tube for each tuber and the rules require one person per tube on the runs, according to May.

At Sunburst, participants must be 42 inches tall and the same rule of one person per tube applies. The Kewaskum-based location also includes a tube for use with purchase of a ticket.

At The Rock, May said tubers as well as skiers and snowboarders attend from around Milwaukee as well as the Chicago area.

The Rock is open seven days a week for tubing and May recommends purchasing tickets online ahead of time, especially for weekend dates because the park tends to sell out on Saturdays and Sundays.

Celebrations large and small planned throughout southeast Wisconsin

The season of Oktoberfest celebrations has commenced. Food, drink and dancing in the German tradition can be found at a host of events across the area.

a sauerkraut eating contest and a best lederhosen and dirndl contest.

"We have a lot of different entertainment," she said, noting the Pommersche Tanzdeel Dancers, Tuba Dan, the Alte Kameraden Band, D'Lustig'n Wendlstoana Dancers, River City Blaskapelle and the Cedarburg Civic Band are on the list of performers.

There is a wooden dance floor for polka enthusiasts and a live Glockenspiel Show is planned, according to the event website.

Homayouni said organizers expect around 15,000 visitors to the festival over the two days.

"We get a good crowd," she said, adding that the ethnic component to the festival is part of the draw.

"I think it's because it's a German festival. There's that whole ambiance. Also, we have a very large German community" in the area, Homayouni said.

Admission is free and the event is open to all ages. The area's two-hour parking limit is lifted during the festival.

Food and drink are purchased on site and there also will be vendors at the event with wares available for purchase, Homayouni said.

Other upcoming Oktoberfest celebrations include "a taste of Deutschland in the heart of Waukesha," according to the city website.

The Waukesha event will be held from 5 to 11 p.m. Friday, Sept. 24 and noon to 11 p.m. Saturday, Sept. 25 at Frame Park. The festival will include an entertainment lineup along with food and drink for sale, the site said.

Also slated for the week-

end is a run around Frame Park to celebrate the city's 125th anniversary, an Oktoberfest Das Bags Tourney and more.

Some area businesses are offering Oktoberfests of their own.

At Sahale Ale Works in Grafton, "Ein Kleines Oktoberfest" returns from noon to 9 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 2.

The brewery will host a festival with beer, music and

food, the website said.

Beers served will include the brewery's Luftkuss Oktoberfest, Shot in The Dunkel (Munich Dunkel) and Wisconsinade (Sumac Gose) and more.

The event does not require reservations and offers "tons of outdoor seating and plan most of it to be outside, so we're hoping for great weather," according to the brewery.

And those preferring to celebrate at home this year are not alone.

Overseas, the official Oktoberfest in Munich, which bills itself as the largest folk festival in the world, has been canceled for the second straight year due to uncertain conditions related to the coronavirus pandemic, a press release said.

It was a difficult decision, according to Lord Mayor Dieter Reiter, but organizers eventually decided Oktoberfest should take place completely or not at all.

"Or, in one Bavarian sentence: 'So a bissel Wiesn geht ned,'" the release said, meaning "There's no thing like a little bit of Wiesn" or Oktoberfest.

Those in southeast Wisconsin marking Oktoberfest at home can read up on the history of the festival https://www.oktoberfest.de/en. (Note: it all started with a wedding.)

And a variety of Wisconsin breweries offer a selection of their own Oktoberfest brews that can be purchased at area stores. In a lineup of fall favorites from around the state, Travel Wisconsin noted both the Oktoberfest brews by Leimenkugel and New Glarus Brewing Company as popular selections.

## Area farmers markets bring in shoppers at peak time

For those looking for farm-to-table food, a variety of area farmers markets are up and running and late summer is a good time to shop.

Across smaller local markets to larger regional operations, organizers say fresh produce is in abundance.

In New Berlin, the market is open from 8 a.m. to noon on Saturdays.

"We are a makers market. We have 21 full-time vendors who are there every week," said Tina Conley, president and CEO of the New Berlin Chamber of Commerce & Visitors Bureau. A makers market features quality, hand-crafted goods.

A few of the market vendors are part time, rotating each week, but Conley said market organizers encourage as many full-time vendors as possible so shoppers know what to expect.

Some vendors bring enough supply to fill multiple stalls, according to Conley.

"We also try to make sure the vendors have enough stock so they don't run out.

We want them to try to stay all the way through," she said.

Located on National Avenue, the market is in a high-traffic area and Conley said it is well-attended.

"We have a lot of returning vendors who seem to be happy with traffic and sales," she said.

Market organizers also aim to include vendors with different items for sale to ensure a variety of offerings.

The New Berlin market includes a weekly exercise class with offerings like Zumba, yoga and others.

"Every week is something different," said Conley, adding the next few weeks of the market will offer entertainment, including the Muckey 4-H Cloggers.

In West Bend, this year's

downtown market includes the incorporation of the Women, Infants and Children program, allowing WIC participants to purchase fresh produce, according to Wendy Schneider, events coordinator with the Downtown West Bend Association.

"Also, there are some educational elements we added to our market," she said, noting that representatives from the West Bend Community Memorial Library, UW-Madison, Roots and Branch-

es, and Bee's Boutiques all present at the market.

The West Bend Farmers Market includes over 90 farmers and vendors this year, Schneider said.

"The majority of them are local," she said, noting many are from Washington and Ozaukee counties.
