I owe a lot to Mrs. Nommensen, my fondly-remembered kindergarten teacher at Milwaukee's Salem Lutheran School.

More than half a century later, I still remember the lyrics and lilting score of the traditional nursery rhyme mnemonic memory verse that unlocked the mysteries of the 12-month Gregorian calendar for my 5-year-old classmates and I.

In 9.58 seconds — I just timed it on my iPhone — I can still come up with the length of any month of the year on a dime.

Thankfully, she spared us the 1577 version: "Thirty dayes hath Nouember, Aprill, Iune and September; Twentie and eyght hath February alone. And all the rest thirty and one, but in the leape ye must adde one."

Mrs. Nommensen also kindly spared us the rigors of the Latin version: "Junius Aprilis September et ipse November. Dant triginta dies reliquis supadditur unus. De quorum numero Februarius excipiatur."

Neither one exactly trips off the tongue, although I imagine, matey, that the 1577 version might work with a few frothy pints of olde English "bere" in a lively pirate-voiced drinking song, putting on my com-

### Tennis club sets Roaring '20s fundraiser

The Greater Eagle River Tennis Association (GERTA) has announced "the swankiest bootleg party of the season for a great cause" to take place Saturday, Nov. 6, from 7 to 11 p.m. at Eagle Waters Resort in Eagle River.

GERTA President Sue Richmond said the event is a fun, fall fundraising effort to benefit the reconstruction of Eagle River's 46-year-old tennis courts, located adjacent to the Vilas County Fairgrounds. These are the only tennis courts open to the public in the Eagle River area.

Tickets to the Roaring '20s and prohibition-themed party include two drinks, Eagle Waters' appetizers, and live music by the popular rock n' roll and country band Bogfoot out of Sugar Camp.

In addition to entertainment, the evening will feature extensive and valuable raffle baskets from local merchants and individuals, a 50-50, wine/booze pull and more, said Richmond.

Costumes from the 1920s Prohibition Era are optional but a prize will be given for the best costume of the evening.

Tickets cost \$50 before Oct. 31, then will be available at the door for \$60. All funds directly benefit the reconstruction.

#### **Fundraising in effect**

GERTA maintained the courts for Vilas County, completing maintenance and repairs over the last 25 years until October 2020 when the county board passed a resolution to quit claim the tennis court parcel to the association.

With the transfer of the property, GERTA began its extensive \$250,000 fundraising effort to reconstruct and rebuild the aging courts. Efforts have raised more than \$200,000 and reconstruction of the courts should be completed in late spring of 2022, according to Richmond.

"A complete reconstruction assures long-lasting use into the future, making these courts available to new generations of recreational tennis players in our community as well as to our numerous summer residents, tourists and guests," said Richmond.
