Cassidy Cleveland grabbed an offensive rebound to assist Julianna Ouimette for two points. Then, Julianna Ouimette grabbed an offensive board to score two more.

"Just different concepts and I'm really trying to crash the boards more cause I always feel like that's been our weakness," coach Ouimette said.
