Downs attended Potosi High School and fell in love with North Carolina around the same

Martell was attending Peshtigo when Duke became a favorite. In fact, he still has fond memories when the Blue Devils halted UNLV's 44-game winning streak in the 1991 national semifinal game.

Martell did not do the same thing, however, when the Blue Devils defeated Wisconsin seven years ago for the champion-

ship.
"I'm a big-time Badgers fan," he said. "But I knew it was going to be a win-win, because if Wisconsin lost and Duke won, I still won in my mind. But Badgers are first.

Duke is not too far behind though.

Martell's wife even surprised him on Christmas with tickets to attend a Blue Devils game in early January, but he came down with COVID-19 and was

ing to go with Downs to witness their teams play each other in the Final Four.

'Once we knew it was Duke-North Carolina, it was, 'how do we make this happen,'" Martell said.

"We've always wanted to do a Duke-North Carolina game. And then a Duke-North Carolina game in the Final Four, the first time in NCAA tournament history that they faced each other?

"It was a little wild to start the trip," said Martell on Tues-day morning. "But I think it should be smooth sailing and the temperatures will just be dropping."

Smooth sailing, especially for Downs because his team beat his friend's team.

"It would've been hard not to gloat the whole way carrying the championship back home to Plymouth," he said. "But knowing that I had that over Aaron helped a little bit."
