Valders runners storm Wisconsin Rapids with power

Girls make statement to earn runner-up trophy

The Valders High School girls cross country team has arrived on the state scene.

It's been 20 years since the Lady Vikes have run on the big stage, and on Saturday this group of mostly underclassmen made a statement by finishing second in Division 3 at the WIAA state cross country meet at The Ridges Golf Course in Wisconsin Rapids.

"The girls have been watching this race (state) for a long time," said coach Bill Dietrich. "They raced really hard."

Valders was a distant second to Boscobel, but edged Oshkosh Lourdes by two points to earn the silver trophy.

Freshman Hannah Welch earned a spot on the podium as the fourth-place individual. Her time was 19:53.

She got boxed in early and was in 14th place at the mile mark. She moved up eight spots in the second mile and another four as she headed to the finish.

"It's definitely hard to break through when you're in a large group," Welch said. "Definitely being strategic,

like surging on the hills and having good position around the flags is what really helped me get out of that pack."

Dietrich said they talked about strategy.

"I told Hannah to stay calm and get her race going," the

"The real story is Elizabeth [Backus]. She moved from like 50th to 30th to 18th and beat the No. 1 Lourdes girl. That's really racing hard."

Backus, the team's No. 2, finished 18th overall and ninth for team scoring in 20:34.


"In the beginning I got locked in so I kind of cut out and surged closer to the front," Backus said. "I really tried to use the downhills."

No. 3 runner Brooke Lau followed a similar track. In 53rd place after a mile, she moved up to 38th by the two mile and placed 39th overall and 17th for team scoring in

"I think I really did run my race today," she said.

No. 4 Alexis Alfson finished 66th overall and 32nd for scoring purposes in 21:42, a personal best.

Champions again! Boys claim state title

Shane Griepentrog led from start to finish, Clay Taylor surged to finish second and the Valders High School boys cross country team wrapped up its fourth state championship in five years.

It couldn't have been a better day Saturday for Valders at the WIAA state meet in Division 3 at The Ridges Golf Course in Wisconsin Rapids.

Oh, but yes it did get bet-

The Valders girls team, competing at state for the first time in 20 years, came on strong during the final race of the day for a runner-up

"Two trophies-wow!" said coach Bill Dietrich. "I don't know what to say. I'm speech-

The boys team held off

Grantsburg, which finished in second place seven points behind the Vikings.

It's the sixth overall state championship for the Valders program. The Vikes moved down to Division 3 this year, but that didn't diminish the accomplishment.

"We just had that feeling that we were going to go kick some butt today," said team leader Shane Griepentrog.

Griepentrog ran the table this season, winning every race. The school's only other state individual champion, Michael Evans, did the same in 2010.

Griepentrog's winning time of 15:38 was the fastest of the day among all divisions.

"That's notable, very notable," Dietrich said of his senior standout. "He just ran, ran, ran.'

Coming in as a heavy favorite, Griepentrog still had to deal with defending champion Parker Schneider of Durand. He settled that issue early on.

"He was on my shoulder a bit early on, but I think that first mile took it out of him," Griepentrog said.

The start was a little faster than Griepentrog said he had intended-4:43 at the mile mark-adding that he was feeling it later on.

'I gutted it out that third mile, which held." Griepentrog

Taylor scored his own victory in getting on the medal stand right next to his teammate. His second-place time was 16:14.

"It's the best feeling in the world," the senior said. "We've been side by side for six years, and this has been our goal all along.

"To make this happen, I'm just over the moon.'

In fifth place after a mile, Taylor moved up to third at two miles. Then, he took on Schneider from Durand.

"As soon as I saw his form go to crap I knew I had a really good shot of passing him," Taylor said. "I made sure to make it a convincing pass. He was done from there."

The one-two finish of Griepentrog and Taylor set the Vikings up in a good position, but the rest of the team had to pull through, too.

No. 3 runner Mitchell Braun finished 30th overall and 12th for team scoring in 17:37.

"It's a tough course, but knowing it was a huge advantage to me," the senior

No. 4 runner Brayden Sabel came in 51st overall and 21st in team scoring in 18:01. He did slip 12 places after the two-mile mark.

Grothman gets tough on fentanyl

U.S. Rep. Glenn Grothman, R-Glenbeulah, has introduced the Fentanyl Penalties Parity Act, a bill to reduce the threshold for mandatory minimum penalties for fentanyl-related offenses, putting it on par with quantity thresholds for other opiate offenses, like heroin.

Grothman represents this area's 6th Congressional District.

Currently, to trigger a 10year mandatory minimum sentence under the Controlled Substances Act, an offense must involve 400 or more grams of a mixture or substance containing fentanyl.

Because the average lethal dose of fentanyl is 2 milligrams, the offense would need to contain roughly 200,000 lethal doses in order to trigger the 10-year mandatory minimum.

"We recently exceeded 90,000 deaths from illegal drug use in this country in one year, largely driven by the use of fentanyl," Grothman said. "This is a large-scale epidemic in need of immediate attention."


