Cropp quiets ghosts of the past with game-winning catch

Returning baseball diamond this spring wasn't easy for Samuel Cropp.

The memory the way the 2021 season had ended still weighed heavily on Cropp's mind and continued to do so well into 2022.

In last year's sectional finals, Cropp and the Bangor Cardinals suffered a 4-2 loss to Southwestern to fall agonizingly short of a trip to state. A Southwestern rally in the bottom of the fifth proved to be the difference, featuring the

pivotal play that Cropp replayed in his head countless times since.

With the bases loaded and two outs in a 1-1 game, Southwestern's Colson Splinter laced a ball toward right. Cropp raced in and managed to get a glove on it, but the ball popped free and the Wildcats scored three runs on the play en route to the eventual

Southwestern moved on to the state tournament, while Bangor was left to wonder what could have been. For Cropp, that missed opportunity in Blanchardville haunted him and lingered in his mind.

"I made a mistake last year in a big game and, for the last year, it's been in my head," Cropp said. "Halfway through this season, I put it behind me."

Bangor head coach Todd Grant stressed that what happened to Cropp last year was not an error, noting that he was the only kid on the team who could've closed in fast enough to make a play on the ball at all.


"He's the only kid on our team that would've even gotten to that ball," said Bangor head coach Todd Grant. "I know he's been holding





When Bangor bowed out in a 4-2 sectional final loss to Southwestern last year, Evan Wolfe could do nothing but sit by and watch everything unfold as a

spectator.

Wolfe had previously suffered a hip fracture in the Cardinals' 8-5 regional final win over De Soto, leaving him sidelined for sectionals. Bangor eked out a 1-0 win over Scenic Bluffs rival Royall in the sectional semifinals but fell a win short of state with that loss to the Wildcats.

'It really sucked sitting in the dugout watching them work hard in the sectional games, but there was nothing I could've done about it," Wolfe said. "I just tried to regroup and come into this year working


Luckily for Wolfe, he still had one year of high school left and got to play a pivotal role for this Bangor team that wound up as the Division 4 state runner-up.

Once the Cardinals got to state, Wolfe did not let the opportunity go to waste and gave the team strong production out of the leadoff spot.

Wolfe went 2 for 4 with a walk, two RBIs and a run scored in Bangor's 9-8 state semifinal win over Columbus Catholic. He also finished 1 for 4 in the Cardinals' 12-3 state championship game defeat at the hands of Eau Claire Regis.

Though Bangor fell a win short of its ultimate goal. it was still a hell of a run for the program as it made its first state appearance in 26 years. Given the way the previous season ended for him, the whole experience was an understandably cathartic way for Wolfe to cap off his Bangor baseball career.

This year at sectionals, we definitely had a goal and a grudge on our shoulders to get (to state)," Wolfe said. "It just means a lot being here with the team."

Bangor's Reader enjoys measure of revenge in win over Columbus

Bangor senior Will Reader's first taste of a state tournament came back in 2019 when he was a freshman riding the bench with the Bangor boys' basketball team.

The Cardinals were defending Division 5 state champions and had made it back to the Kohl Center for a second straight state trip.
In those 2019 state semifinals, Bangor

suffered a brutal 69-66 loss after Columbus Catholic's Tom Nystrom buried the gamewinning three — his first points of the game – at the buzzer to send the Dons on to the

state championship game.
"Anytime we go up against Columbus Catholic, I think about that shot," Reader said. "That just really brings out a different level of energy and drive — not wanting them to get another win like that on us.'

In an odd bit of coincidence, it was once again the familiar Dons from Marshfield who awaited the Cardinals when they punched their ticket to their first state baseball tournament since 1996.

In a fitting sequel of sorts to that 2019 boys' basketball state semifinal, the Bangor-Columbus Catholic state semifinal in baseball this year came right down to the wire with a final play making all the difference.

It took a sliding catch from Samuel Cropp with the tying run at third and the winning run at first for Columbus Catholic in the bottom of the seventh to put the finishing touches on a 9-8 win for the Cardinals
