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# **COVID** was a challenge but hospital employees are 'pretty darn good'

(Editor's note: The second and final part of this story continues with more interviews with staff from Hayward Area Memorial Hospital & Water's Edge about their experiences, both professional and personal, between March 2020 and March 2022 as they worked during the COVID pandemic. Between March 2020 and March 2022 the hospital had 200 inpatients with COVID. There were 14 deaths.) Linda Waystedt, CNA Inpatient Nursing, spoke about the enormous demand for personal protective equipment (PPE) and the fact that Hayward Area Memorial Hospital saw it right away.

"We never ran out of PPE," she said.

She said they had to recreate their jobs — going into the room, writing down everything they needed, giving the list to someone else to go get it, or giving it to the next shift, depending on the time. She said they were accustomed to going into patients' rooms at least once an hour, but with the pandemic they only went in when necessary. She said some staff got COVID, including herself.

Hospital morale was a challenge, and some people were short-fused and stressed; some quit. But others pulled together and lifted each other up.


She said it wasn't even COVID that bothered them the most, it was the differing opinions of getting a shot or not getting a shot; to vaccinate or not. "Our patients were afraid and lonely. Sometimes we had to stop and not only be their caregiver, but their spiritual caregiver, friend and family."

She recalled one lady who told her she needed to talk to someone. She was afraid to be transferred. She wanted a pastor. Waystedt pulled up a devotional on her phone and proceeded to pray with her. The woman told her she could not know how much that meant to her.

# 'School safety is our top priority,' says school superintendent

"Making sure kids are safe is our top priority," said Hayward Community Schools Supt. Craig OIson.

The *Record* asked Olson to comment about local school safety in the wake of the May 24 incident at an elementary school in Uvalde, Texas, where an 18-year-old gunman entered the building and fatally shot 19 students and two teachers.

Olson said the Hayward Community Schools' violence prevention and response protocol has been in place and updated at least since 2018, when the school district had an internal security audit. "We had undercover people come in, and from those recommendations we made our safety plan," he said. The school district received a \$275,000 safety grant to update school security cameras, to tie in with Sawyer County sheriff's department dispatch, Olson said. All schools have locked doors, with one-point entrances where visitors are monitored and must be "buzzed in" during the school day to enter the building. The staff, along with students, do regular drills known as ALICE drills, Olson said. ALICE stands for "Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate." Students and staff can choose to lock down and barricade the room that they are in if they determine that it is not safe to evacuate. School administrators have bi-monthly meetings to do table-top exercises with local law enforcement, and "this summer we're going to go through a full walk-through," Olson said. "Our strongest point is making sure our teachers have great relationships with kids, that if students hear or see something, rumors, that they feel comfortable with saying something," Olson said. "We take that very seriously. Within five minutes a complete investigation is going on in cooperation with local law enforcement."
