"We have a lot of issues with jet skis too close to shore, too close to other watercraft," Minocqua police chief Dave Jaeger said. "There a lot of individuals out there operating without their boating safety certificate."

According to state law, anyone born on or after Jan. 1, 1989, is to have a boating safety certificate.

Jaeger said many of the calls that have come through regarding boating issues are related to people from outside the area.

Tomlanovich files open records request with Manitowish Waters

At issue is whether or not there's a master trail plan for the town

Vilas County supervisor Holly Tomlanovich, the chair of an ad hoc committee formed by former Vilas County board chairman Ron De Bruyne in late January of this year, has filed an open records request with the town of Manitowish Waters.

She made that announcement during a meeting Monday of the ad hoc committee at the Vilas County courthouse in Eagle River.

Tomlanovich's request is with regard to a master trail plan the town has that essentially outlines a possible route for all terrain vehicles (ATVs) and utility task vehicles (UTV) that would connect to other routes and be a way for ATV/UTV enthusiasts to get to Iron County and ultimately, into the upper peninsula of Michigan.

The Manitowish Waters town board is one of four, the others being Boulder Junction, Plum Lake and Winchester, that have been against any attempt by Vilas County to open stretches of county roads going through their towns.
