Boys' hoops secure share of conference title, #1 seed in Sectional

SPRING VALLEY, WI - It was a big week for the Cardinals last week, not only did they win three straight conference games, but they also secured at least a share of the conference title, which they can win outright with a win over Elk Mound on Friday night. They also earned the number one seed in their Sectional of the WIAA Tournament that begins next week, giving them the opportunity to host the winner of #8 seed Eau Claire Regis and #9 seed Augusta next Friday, March 3.

The sweep of conference games elevated the Cardinals past Durand to first place in the Dunn-St. Croix Conference with a 12-1 record. Durand is in second place with an 11-2 conference mark. If the Cardinals beat Elk Mound tomorrow night, they will win the conference title outright, if they lose, they might share the title (depending on how Durand finishes the season). The team was brought back down to earth this past Monday (before the snows hit) with a tough loss to a very good Clear Lake team.

The regular season wraps up tomorrow with a home game, and Parent's Night, against Elk Mound. The Cardinals will then await the winner of the Regis/Augusta game to be played at home. If Valley wins at home on Friday, they would host another game on Saturday night as

Spring Valley 60, Colfax 38 - in SV - The first of the back-to-back games between the two was a battle in the first half. Both teams played a physical, pounding game inside and the Cardinals just couldn't get the separation from the Vikings they needed to get some distance.

Colfax really slowed the Cardinals

keep Valley from transition and fast breaks, which worked for a while. The two teams went into the locker room tied at 24 for halftime.

The second half is where the Cardinals exerted their dominance though, dictating the pace of the game, capitalizing on turnovers, and getting the fastbreaks they wanted.

The Cardinals pulled away from Colfax by outscoring the Vikings 36-14. The Cardinals made 46% of their shots from the floor for the game, connecting on 25-of-54 shots. Meanwhile, Valley held Colfax to 37% shooting, making just 15-of-41 shots. The Cardinals took advantage of 23 Viking miscues, turning those into 25 points.

Senior Tyler Bowman led the Cardinals with 17 points and 10 rebounds, with fellow seniors Brady Bednarek (14 points) and Connor Ducklow (10 points) helping the

Nathan Hyduckovich led the Vikings with 13 points in the losing effort.

Spring Valley 61, Colfax 48 - @ Colfax - This was the second game of the week for the two teams in an unusual re-scheduling twist, just two days later. The result, however, was the same.

It, again, was a tight game in the first half with Colfax taking the early lead only to see the Cardinals storm back to forge a 27-23 halftime lead.

Colfax closed the gap early in the second half, erasing their deficit right away, only to see the Cardinals slowly and methodically pull away.

Both teams played better, cutting down on turnovers, shooting better from the floor for the Vikings, to make it a tighter game.

Valley made 45% from the floor on 24-of-53 shots (including 5-of-20 from three-point range), while the Vikings made 40% of their shots on their home floor (20-of-50, including 0-for-5 from threepoint range).

Colfax really worked hard at rebounding better this game, pulling down more offensive (14 to 5) and defensive (23 to 19) boards than the Cardinals after losing that battle the previous game. Valley had more steals (11) and fewer turnovers (11) than Colfax (6 steals and 19 turnovers) that resulted in 24 points for the Cardinals and only 10 for Colfax.

Ducklow led the Cardinals with 19 points and six rebounds while freshman Cade Stasiek had 13 points to help the effort. Eli Entzminger (14) and Nic Jensen (10) paced the Vikings in the loss.

Spring Valley 68, Mondovi 34 -Connor Ducklow may have sealed his case as the conference player of the year with this game against the Buffaloes. The senior, and the whole team really, dominated the Buffaloes. Ducklow went 14-for-17 shooting, including 3-for-4 from three-point range, for 32 points. The team scored 42 points in the paint in the game, while limiting Mondovi to just 10.

Valley forged a 30-18 halftime lead and kept their foot down on the gas in the second half for the easy conference clinching win. The Cardinals shot 61% from the field, making 30-of-49 shots in the game (including 7-for-14 from three-point range), all while limiting Mondovi to 27% shooting (12-for-45, 3-of-16 in three's).

Mondovi really keyed on slowing Bowman in the game, which worked. But the senior had eight

assists, most of them to Ducklow. to lead the team.

Valley had 13 turnovers in the game while forcing the Buff's into 20 miscues.

Evan Gray led Mondovi with 10 points in the losing effort.

Clear Lake 68, Spring Valley 57 - This non-conference game late Monday night was a battle of two of the areas really good teams. Clear Lake has a number one Sectional seed in Division Five and the Cardinals have a number one Sectional seed in Division

The hard-fought battle saw the Cardinals have one of their worst shooting nights in a long time, final stats weren't available as of press time, however.

Clear Lake forged a 34-32 halftime lead, but the two teams battled back-and-forth throughout the game. Unfortunately for the Cardinals, the foul differential and poor shooting hurt their chances as it seemed at times, they just couldn't buy a bucket.

The Cardinals were led in scoring by sophomore Jameson Bauer with 16 points, Ducklow had 12 and Bowman had 13 to help.

Clear Lake had four players reach double-digits in scoring, led by Riley Peterson's 18 points in the paint, Karl Kobernick had 16 (four three-pointers), Will Cain had 11 and Tyson Blanchard went 10-for-10 from the free throw line for 10 points. Clear Lake had 17-of-23 free throws in the game (73%) compared to Valley just going 6-for-7 (85%) from the stripe for the biggest difference. Valley was whistled for 21 fouls in the game compared to just 11 for Clear Lake.

SAINT CROIX FALLS, WI -Spring Valley senior Max Schmitt earned the right to wrestle in Madison starting today with a Third Place finish in the WIAA Sectional here last weekend.

Schmitt, who holds a 21-12 season record, battled through the 152weight class bracket only to face a familiar foe in the Championship match.

Schmitt opened the wrestling as the lone Spring Valley-Elmwood wrestler, with a major decision win over James Braun, a junior from Phillips, with a 17-5 score to advance the semifinal match.

Cody Wagner, a junior from Mondovi, gave a good fight with Schmitt, but the Cardinal wrestler was able to outlast the Buffalo
