

Tremper scores surprise upset, Wilmot, Central tout defense


on't let its record fool you, please. The Shoreland Lutheran football team (0-2) is not that bad.

Honestly, the Pacers were only

down 10-3 late in the third quarter and seemed to be driving, but a holding penalty thwarted an otherwise promising drive.

"It was really nice to be able to keep Catholic Central and St. Joe's on our schedule," Hagedorn said recently. "Coach Aldrich (CC) knows football, and it's always fun to coach against someone like that."

"It's week to week since I'm the new coach. We want to see what's going to work each week against each opponent. Overall, I'm very happy with where we're at with the kids and knowing what they should do. The next step is not just knowing it but making it successful."

Hagedorn says "success" is implementing things slowly the first two weeks and staying healthy.

Despite the 0-2 start, the Pacers can feel good about bat tling both St. Joe's and Catholic Central before eventually losing by double digits.

Brewers feeling plenty hapless

Cubs' only have two hits, but both are tworun homers by Happ

MILWAUKEE – Ian Happ had Happ the only hits for the Chicago Cubs - just enough to hinder the Milwaukee Brewers' playoff push.

Happ hit two two-run homers to account for Chicago's two hits, and the Cubs beat the Brewers 14, 1985, when Jody Davis and 4-3 in 10 innings on Friday night.

Happ hit a drive off Matt Bush in the seventh and a tiebreaking shot against All-Star Devin tied the game with a leadoff Williams (4-3) in the 10th. Both homer in the ninth off Brandon homers sailed over the rightfield wall.

Sure, it was 12-7 Broncos early, but then the Tremper train came through and couldn't be stopped.

Thirty-six unanswered points later, and the Grove is 0-2 and Tremper sits at 1-1 after winning only three games last year.

Tremper outgained the Grove, 398-158, behind 222 passing yards and three touchdowns and another 83 yards rushing from quarterback Mason Prozanski.

The Cubs are 10-7 against the Brewers this season after losing 15 of 19 meetings in last year's season series. Nine of the matchups have been decided by one run, and the Cubs are 7-2 in those games.

Milwaukee has slid out of playoff position after leading the NL Central for much of the year in part because of its struggles against the bottom three teams in the division. The Brewers are 3-12 in their last 15 matchups with the Cubs, Cincinnati Reds and Pittsburgh Pirates.

The news wasn't all good for the Cubs.

Justin Steele, one of the NL's hottest pitchers, left with lower back tightness after retiring Renfroe on a fly to the warning track to start the bottom of the sixth. Steele struck out six, walked four and allowed four hits, including a Tyrone Taylor homer in the fifth.

"It's still a little bit tight, but it definitely got better once we started working on it a little bit and stuff, Steele said. "We'll see how it feels tomorrow."

In his last six starts, Steele has allowed just three earned runs over 31 2/3 innings. He entered Friday's game with a 1.47 ERA since June 29 to lead all NL starters over that stretch.
