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All fan, part owner

■ Like so many, Howards Grove graduate Bohman buys Packers' stock

On a scale of 1 to 10, with 10 being the best Packers' fan in the world, Marcus Bohman gives himself an 11.

The 2015 Howards Grove graduate who lives near Cocoa Beach in Florida says he's been a fan his whole life and his favorite color is green.

"I even remember in high school I had some coaches that called me Mr. Green," he said. So of course Bohman

jumped at the opportunity to purchase stock, at \$300 a share, when the Green Bay franchise offered it for the sixth time in team history.
"When I heard about it, I

was at work," he said. "So I was telling people I'm definitely buying this and got some crazy looks. It's fine, they don't understand. They don't have to."

After waiting some three hours online the first day it was offered because demand was so high – the team sold more than \$41 million worth of stock the

first week - Bohman bought one to replace his previous most prized sports possession: a football signed by Randall Cobb and William Henderson.

Two weeks later, he got a notification on his phone the stock was about to be delivered.

"I was basically refreshing it every second to see when it came so I could just grab it when it got here," Bohman said.

He opened his mailbox to find a Packer folder with the words "Legacy is yours" on the front. All that was needed was

a picture frame to hang it up in.


"I'm not going to get rid of it anytime soon – or ever," Bohman said.

"Obviously I know I don't make decisions or anything like that for the team. So when I say to people, 'yeah, I'm an NFL owner,' obviously that's a joke. But I guess you could say I'm a little cocky about it because they can't say it at all. I take pride in owning the stock.

Bohman, who says it is "Super Bowl or bust" this year, was asked how he would handle the Aaron Rodgers situation next season since he's owner.

'You've got to keep him," he said. "You've got to do everything in your power to keep him and Davante Adams. Because we saw that Jordan Love was not ready, so you've got to do what you've got to do to make that guy happy. He's got at least three or four years left in the tank it seems like. He's playing at an MVP level.'

Eigenberger enjoying her time

Olivia Eigenberger could have complained, or even quit, last season. But the Plymouth senior stuck with it.

"She's just not that type of person," basketball coach Brad Shutter said. "Which just goes to show what a good kid she is. Last year she accepted her role but probably wasn't happy about it – but who would be?

'Like we always say, when the opportunity comes you can try and take advantage and prove to us you deserve to be playing more. She did."

Eigenberger has started every contest but one this season after averaging what she estimates a minute or two per game as a junior.

"Ĭ wasn't totally happy with it, I just kind of got past it," Eigenberger said. "I was like, you know. this isn't going to be my year. I can still do what I can to try work to get bet-



I would still be coming out for my senior year. I've been playing for as long as I can remember. So to just give it up for not playing for one year out of all the years of practice, I didn't want to do that.

So Eigenberger cheered on her teammates and remained positive while sitting on the bench. She scored a total of nine points and grabbed six rebounds in 13 games.

This past summer, she prac-

ticed in her driveway as much as she could. There were open and summer-league games, too.

And when it was time for Shutter to sit down with each player to go over their role for this season, Eigenberger was

told she would be playing a lot.
"When I heard that, I was really excited," she said. "Especially it being my senior year. I was ready to be on the floor and do what I can to be the best player I can be.'

Shutter saw what Eigenberger could do at a scrimmage at Oshkosh North, and then she scored her varsity-best seven points in the first game of the season. The following game, she got her most rebounds in a game (nine).

"She's got the size and she

makes things difficult for post players just because she's so long," Shutter said. "It's hard for people to score over the top of her, so she uses that to her advantage. She plays hard and for sure she's taking advantage of those opportunities.'

The 6-foot-0 Eigenberger has been playing in the post and is averaging 3.5 points to go with 4.3 rebounds. She likes both ends of the court, but if she had to pick one, it's defense.

'The sensation I get when getting a nice, clean block is just so fun, and the crowd gets so loud," Eigenberger said.

Added her coach: "She

makes life really difficult for post players," he said. "Because if you don't shot-fake on her or get some space, she's going to swat it away from you.
