#### Saturday, Aug. 27 High 74, low 56

We are staying at the Hiawatha Motel and our outing is two days of fishing and at night we hang out together in a picnic style setting and also in the game room where pool, ping, pong and darts are free. My fishing partner is Jeff Moll and although we really try hard to win either the musky or northern pike award, we have a history of totally sucking, and I mean pathetic. We do excel in being the last men standing each night and we make sure that there is

## MI-TRALE offers seniors fall color trail ride Sept. 29

ONTONAGON COUNTY — Senior citizens wishing to enjoy a great view of the changing leaves should mark their calendars for Sept. 29 when members of MITRALE will take two groups of people out on side-by-side ORVs to see fall color at its

MI-TRALE, which stands for the Michigan Trails and Recreation Alliance of Land and the Environment, is offering the opportunity for the 13th time this year.

"The ride we've chosen — that particular ride is very pretty," said Dave Bishop, treasurer of MI-TRALE. "We go over the

triple trestles, and the view is spectacular."
"It's free and it includes a pasty lunch," said Pat Bishop, who is Dave's wife.

However, reservations are due before Sept. 19, so persons wishing to participate should call Dave at 906-884-6617 by the end of this week.

"The reason we do it is many of them

don't have this opportunity," said Dave of seniors in a recent phone call.

He said that each ORV seats at least two people, with some seating four or five.

Persons, wishing to drive their own

Persons wishing to drive their own ORVs are welcome to attend, but they also should register.

The two tours planned for Sept. 29 will leave at separate times, with the first tour ending with lunch and the second tour starting with lunch. The meal will be at Twin Lakes State Park.

"We will all meet at Twin Lakes and eat at the same time," said Pat, adding that the meal takes place within a shelter.

"Typically, we've had 100 lunches," said Dave, noting that the number includes both participants and volunteers.

He said the tour was cancelled in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic and that it occurred only on a smaller scale in

All times noted in relation to the tour are in the Eastern Time Zone.

Members of the first tour should arrive by 9:15 a.m. at Cane Court in Ontonagon, where they will be taken by bus at 9:30 a.m. to the Ontonagon County Fairgrounds in Greenland. They also may choose to meet the group at the fairgrounds.

From the fairgrounds, they will be taken on an ORV ride to see the fall leaves, and they then will eat lunch at the park. After lunch, they again will travel by bus to their choice of the fairgrounds or Cane Court, where they will take their own transportation home.

The second group should arrive by 10:45 a.m. at the fairgrounds, where members will be taken by bus to the park to eat lunch. After lunch, they will be taken by ORVs to view the fall leaves and will end their tour back at the fairgrounds, where they will need their own transportation home.

Note that the second tour does not include the Cane Court location.


Dave advises dressing appropriately for what could be varying weather conditions. In the case of fully inclement weather, he said the event will be cancelled, but ORV roofs will protect participants from smaller problems. "If it's just a light rain we're gonna go, he said. "If it's cold, we'll just issue blankets."

Dave said that many people are involved in making the event a success. He added that about four people organize it, whereas, "The day of the ride, there could be as many as 25."

In addition, one facility supplies the pasty lunch while several other businesses donate the use of ORVs.

MI-TRALE is an all-volunteer community trails organization based in the western U.P. It maintains trails that include the Ottawa National Forest and that are earmarked for a variety of uses, including ATVs, equine, water, hiking/running and multi-use
