#### Oregon, Brooklyn set official Halloween hours

The Villages of Oregon and Brooklyn discussed and set aside official time for 2022 Halloween celebrations at their respective Village Board meetings on Monday, Sept. 12. Oregon approved Trick-or-Treating hours from 5-8 p.m. and Brooklyn approved hours from 4:30-7:30 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 31.

Board members at both meetings noted that the pandemic caused an

inconsistency in what their communities could expect from Halloween. Both Villages decided to draft resolutions that would aim to promote a more uniform celebration schedule in years to come.

"I'd be in favor of putting something in writing so this doesn't keep coming forward every year, Trustee Derek Below said. "Historically, it's been on Halloween, from five to eight, since I was a kid... If we could put that in writing, that would be alright with

### **Tensions rise over** the future of TORC

#### Town considers ending garbage collection at recycling center

Accusations of misinformation and aggression budget shortfalls. Fred flew at the Town of Oregon Clark Jr.-a member of the Board Meeting on Tuesday, newly formed Solid Waste Sept. 6 during discussion of and Recycling Committeethe Town of Oregon Recycling Center's (TORC) future. Tensions over the potentially shutting-down of its garbage collection services continued to rise despite no formal decision yet being made.

In previous board and

committee meetings, Oregon officials have debated over whether to continue using TORC or to switch to curbside garbage pick-up services provided by Pellitteri in an effort to address explained in their June 30 meeting that TORC has lost the town \$13,000 since the beginning of the year.
