up for auction this week, you may have easily drawn the wrong conclusion.

City of Beloit Director of Parks & Recreation Matt Amundson says renovation of the facility is currently underway, which included the removal of the old Snappers references as well as removal of parts of the ballpark which had fallen into disrepair  $since \, the \, Snappers \, moved \, to \,$ ABC Supply Stadium in August,

'We're trying to make it a viable, safe facility for the public to be at," Amundson said. "We also wanted to put up signage rebranding the ballpark as a City of Beloit facility."

That's why the Snapper paraphernalia had to go.

"There was a bunch of stuff I had suggested we just throw away, but instead we took it to Beloit Auction Service and hopefully selling it will help pay for some of the improvements in the renovation process," Amundson said.

Cassioppi was one of the first 15 to join the Hawkeyes.

"I think there will be a lot more," she said. "They'll keep recruiting and they'll have a pretty big team when they're done."

The fourth-ranked 164-pound woman wrestler in the nation, Rose was always expected to follow her older brother Tony's footsteps to Iowa. A former Hononegah state champion, Tony Cassioppi placed third at the Big Ten Championships and fourth at the recent NCAA championships. The heavyweight as another year of eligibility there.

"Oh, Kam had the confidence when she went up there," winning pitcher Ryleigh Rose said. "I knew when I saw that look in her eye, that she was going to get a hit. And she hit it right in between where she needed to hit it. I knew as soon as it came off the bat that she had it down."

Rose had to share that unwavering calmness that Clark exhibited throughout her eight innings of work.



### **New Beloit Memorial** softball coach hopes to build ranks

BELOIT -While firstyear head softball coach Chad Davis wishes he had several more players out for the sport at Beloit Memorial this spring, he likes what he sees in practice so far.

"After scrimmaging with Turner (Tuesday) I'm very excited about how fundamentally sound the girls were," Davis said. "They also swung the bats well. Everybody was making contact."

The Purple Knights will have to wait to get their season underway. They had their Big Eight Conference and season opener against Sun Prairie West postponed by expected inclement weather.

'The conference won't allow games to be played if it is 40 degrees or colder," he said.

That will just give the Knights a little more

time to prepare. Davis has 17 players in the program, including four freshmen, so Beloit won't field a jayvee team this spring.

"It's going to take some time to rebuild the program," the coach said. "I think we have a number of freshmen coming in next year to get the numbers back up to where they should be."

Davis said the Knights will rely on senior pitcher Emma Middleton to be the team's ace with junior Chesney Bishop the team's No. 2.

"That's the extent of the pitching depth so we're really going to be counting on those two," the coach said.

Catching them will be junior Allie Gustafson, who earned All-Big Eight Second Team honors a year ago when the Knights were 8-10 in conference and tied for sixth place in the 10-team league.

After winning a state title in the first all-girls IHSA state tournament in 2022, she elected to spend what would have been her senior year at Hononegah instead training in Colorado Springs with the Elite Accelerator Program at the Olympic Training Center.

"I miss my family and some of the other wrestlers back home, but this is definitely the best decision I could have made," she said. "I love it here. The environment is great. Everyone wants to be here and work hard. I have great partners and coaches. I'm in

an awesome program where I feel I am getting stronger and better every day."

She already has all sorts of impressive credentials, including being a three-time Fargo All-American.

Rose is looking forward to having her younger sister Angelina visit her next week. The Hononegah sophomore recently won her second straight IHSA state wrestling title.

"She is on spring break this weekend and then hang out next week when she is on spring break," Rose said. "I plan on getting her in the wrestling room and maybe I can beat up on her a little."

Pohlman Field will continue to be home to the Beloit Memorial High School baseball team after the City Council approved a three-year agreement with the school district on Monday. The City also has an agreement with Rockford University to play its varsity and varsity reserve home baseball games at Pohlman this spring.

"We have spent a lot of time trying to get the field up to or close to the playing standards when the Snappers played there," Amundson said. "Both school district and city staffhave been working on that."

Some improvements are simply addition by subtraction. Sections of the old bleachers beyond first base and beyond third base were removed as well as the party decks down both lines. Those areas were considered unsafe.

Some of the sprucing up is as simple as a coat of paint.

"We removed all the outfield signage and uncovered the actual fence," Amundson said. "When the weather gets nicer we hope we can paint it one consistent color."

Other aspects to the facelift will be a bit more costly.

"We turned on the lights and there are 12 lights

out, but no more than two per tower," Amundson said. "It's not an immediate need for Beloit Memorial or Rockford, which will have weekend doubleheaders starting at noon. But at some point, we will want to use them. We have an estimate at what it would cost to bring the equipment in to replace those and how many man hours it will require. It's not a budgeted item so we are going to have to figure out how we're going to address that."

The future use of the main building, which included the Snappers offices, clubhouses and batting cages hasn't been determined. The Beloit Memorial baseball and softball teams are able to currently use the club-

"We will have discussions," Amundson said of use the available space. "One of my suggestions will be to convert that toa small community center where you could have some classroom spaces. I'd like to see that (building) used year-round."

In addition to the Knights and Rockford University, the local youth baseball program Ben $nie\,Elite\,will\,use\,Pohlman$ Field as a practice site over the summer.

"Pohlman Field has been one of the gems of our parks system and now it has been sitting pretty much vacant for the better part of 18 months, probablylonger," Amundson said. "I want to see it be a viable baseball facility. The more use we have, the more justification I have to look at further expenditures there."

Telfer Park's history dates back to 1960 when lands was purchased by the city for \$30,000. Originally called Greenfield Park, it was changed to A.D. Telfer Park in 1964 in honor of Archie Telfer, Beloit's city manager for nearly 25 years, and a baseball diamond was added that year.

Countless high school, Legion and Beloit Blues games were played there before the ballpark underwent a major upgrade and became home to the Class A Midwest League Beloit Brewers in 1982.

Renamed Pohlman Field after Beloit's "Mr. Baseball" Harry C. Pohlman, the stadium was improved again and again, but minor-league ballpark standards were finally impossible to meet there and ABC Supply Stadium became the answer to the franchise's prayers.

 $Now it looks \, like \, the \, old \,$ ballpark has a reprieve and baseball games will continue being played there into the future.

### **Bears sign free-agent LB Cole**


Cole caught 10 passes for 141 yards and a touchdown last season. He previously played for the

"It's Bryson's first year doing competitive wrestling, and he just comes in and works so hard. He doesn't complain or get down; he has been level headed all the way through."






