Crandon controls Three Lakes in Northern Lakes hoops battle

A well-rested Three Lakes girls varsity basketball was up against a tough 14-1 Crandon team Friday night, falling 62-22 in a game where the Jays struggled to score putting up 13 points in the first half and just nine points in the

At the same time their offense sputtered, so too did their defense which struggled to contain the Cardinals' offense who scored at ease in the 40-point win.

The loss puts the Bluejays back at the .500 mark where they have hovered for several games, having lost three of their last four. The latest streak comes after winning five of their previous six. They now stand alone in fourth place in the Northern Lakes Conference with a 3-4 record, trailing Florence by a half game for the third place position. Overall, the Bluejays are 8-8 on the year.

"This was certainly not the outcome we were hoping for or expecting," said co-head coach Michele Brown. "It was disappointing for sure. The girls did not play up to their potential whatsoever. We just had too many turnovers, many unforced, which created easy point opportunities for Crandon. We were beaten and outplayed in all aspects of the game.'

Brown gave credit to Crandon who played well and are 14-1 overall for good reason.

"But, we have to control the ball better against good teams like this if we want to

remain competitive," she said. "We also have to work harder on our offense where we shot just 40% on two-point shots, going 9 of 22 and we really struggled from behind the arc where we were 0 of 9 which made a significant difference in the game."

The Bluejays were also shorthanded to some extent due to a foot injury of freshman starter Kailyn Fogerty as she played limited minutes and was only able to score a single point as she went 1 of 2 from the free throw line. Fogerty did not even attempt a field goal in the game.

Karlee Weavers led the Bluejays in scoring as she was 5 of 7 for 10 points. Has added six boards also. Kallie Volk scored eight points to match her eight rebounds while also grabbing three steals and posting two blocked shots. Kaya Szews scored three points to go with her two rebounds and four assists

Libby Eppler did not score, but according to her coaches played a good game with two rebounds, two assists and a

Outside of the 5 of 7 field goal shooting by Weavers, the team was just 4 of 25 from the field overall.

Co-head coach Tony Pharo was disappointed in the loss, and was hoping that the Bluejays would improve on the previous performance against Crandon where the Cardinals dominated by 37 points.


"We have been playing well lately and I was hoping to have better luck against Crandon than in our prior matchup," he said. "Unfortunately the Cardinals came out

shooting extremely hot and built on their lead throughout the game. I thought that we did a good job on running our inbound plays and I was happy to see Karlee Weavers step up and lead the team in scoring.

The Bluejays will next host Elcho this Friday in a 6 p.m. contest. This game will be special because it will mark 100 years of high school basketball in Three Lakes.

Elcho has lost seven of their last nine games including a 55-20 loss to the Jays in mid-December.

Following this contest, the team will be on the road for four consecutive games before hosting their final regular season home game against Goodman-Pembine, Feb. 17.

Packers need to address Aaron Rodgers situation

I am a spoiled Green Bay Packers fan.

I am just old enough to remember Don Majkowski limping to the bench with an ankle injury as some young gunslinging quarterback by the name of Brett Favre ran onto the field just minutes before firing the first of his hundreds of touchdown passes.

Years later, when Favre handed the reigns to Rodgers, I was headed for another hand in the cookie jar as we again witnessed, for nearly two decades, one of the best to ever do it in the business.

So where I sit now is an uneasy, yet somewhat exciting place in time, as the Green Bay Packers are fumbling around the idea of moving on from their highest paid player ever, in hopes that Jordan Love can somewhat create the same buzz around Lambeau Field as has been the case the last three decades.

I am not sure what is necessarily the right direction, but the wrong one seems to be letting the national media spin the situation around the wash cycle for a few months while good-hearted, honest fans like many of us sit in the cheap seats just wondering who will be under center next season.

Do I think Rodgers can return and win a Super Bowl? I do.

Do I think they can do it with the same roster around him? I do not.

Do I think they can win a Super Bowl next year with Jordan Love? I do not.

Do I think they can win one down the road with him as the quarterback? Yes, I do.

Green Bay must make a move of some sort if they want to keep in the relevant conversation when it comes to NFC North Division title, playoffs and beyond.

That means deciding if they are going to cut some cap space by dealing Aaron Jones, along with figuring out if they're going to reinvest in guys like Randall Cobb, Allan Lazard and Robert Tonyan, who are likely to be key reasons for Rodgers returning or for him leav-

Lots of folks seem convinced Rodgers is heading to the New York Jets, especially after news broke last week of the AFC East team naming Nathaniel Hackett as their offensive coordinator. Hackett, of course, is who Rodgers won his last two NFL MVP awards under, as he was in the same position with the Packers organization from 2019 to 2021.

Regardless of how the situation plays out, it won't work in the Packers favor to wait. Fans, especially this one, will respect whatever decision they decide to make, so long as it's sooner and not later.

Stephenson, Sterne separate atop USSA **ProStar standings**

Just three races into the USSA ProStar Cup Tour season Blaine Stephenson of Hutchinson, Minn., and Gunnar Sterne of West Chicago, Ill., are separating themselves from the field following racing action at the 525 Racing Complex in Wausau this past weekend.

Stephenson, coming off a perfect three rounds of heats and a win in the final at Eagle River, was near perfect once more in Wausau atop his No. 102 Wahl Bros.' Polaris, winning two of his three heat races and collecting a win in the final Saturday after Justin Peterson of Campbellsport slipped through the snow dust with less than two laps remaining.

Peterson was aboard a fast Ski-Doo all weekend, and after winning two of his three heat races looked poised to take the championship race and 100 points toward the year-end standings when he came out of turn two high and got washed into the ice shavings which gave Stephenson the opening he needed to secure the top spot.

Stephenson never looked back and was able to wash away some of the disappointment from last Sunday where a late-race caution flag crippled his drive for a fifth World Championship at the Eagle River race.

"It kind of just panned out for us," said Stephenson after the race. "This class is so dang competitive so to win any race is good. Dang good points today. Justin drove one hell of a race. When he got motoring, boy, I was like (I don't know if we can catch them)."

Peterson said after the race that he had one of the fastest sleds at the track that day, but that may have been what inevitably bit him.

"We just got a little too aggressive and it wore me out pretty quick. The rest is history," he said. "The race was really good for about 11 laps, then a couple after that. Then it didn't go so well."

The shuffle sent Peterson to second place. He was followed by Travis McDonald of Gonner, Manitoba in third. Fourth place went to Tom Olson of Lodi who's best was yet to come Sunday where he would win the Sprint World Cup race. Sterne placed fifth which helped him lock down 87 total points on the week-

Sterne came into Wausau with a narrow 10 point lead in the season-long standings, however Stephenson overtook the top spot and now rests there with 353 points, 30 ahead of Sterne.

Rebel Jay wrestlers earn important wins at Wisconsin Dells tournament

The Three Lakes-Laona-Wabeno varsity wrestling team had a number of solid individual performances in Wisconsin Dells this week, indications of a team trying to peak just as conference championship action is set to begin Friday in Crandon.

The Wisconsin Dells Invitational was attended by 13 different high schools and more than 140 wrestlers competed. The Rebel Jays as a whole earned 19 match victories and were led once again by Ryan Roy, who went 4-0 for the event and contributed a team high 27 points and a first-place finish in his 170 lb. weight class.

One of Roy's most accomplished wins of the day came over Rylee Wanek of Riverside who came in with nearly identical match records as Roy.

The two wrestling standouts put on a very competitive performance that moved to the ultimate tiebreaker round as neither wrestler could gain a point in the one minute sudden victory.

> "Our team really seems to be finding its stride, and this is the ideal time of year for all of our guys to be reaching their peak," said head coach Seth Senter. "Ryan and Gus are performing especially well and I think they are both in a great position to advance beyond the conference championship level. We have several other wrestlers who are also finding their stride and will likely wrestle just as well as we prepare for postseason competition."

> Senter said both Roy and Fink have been team leaders this year, and understand the time for peaking in the sport.

> "Both seem to be in top form at this point," said Senter. "Their recent performances are only possible by understanding the technical aspects of the sport and by investing the appropriate time and dedication necessary to succeed. The coaching staff is proud of these guys and proud to play a role in their personal and athletic development and

Senter also pointed out that Roy is only three victories away from having a career milestone 150 match wins which he could reach at the conference championship event this Friday.

"He has finally shaken off the rust after being away from the sport earlier in the season due to injury, and is now in fine mid-season shape," said Senter. "His recent string of victories clearly demonstrates why he is a three-time state championship competitor."

Other varsity results for the Rebel Jays included Adison Romprey (138 lb.) and Noah Kincaid (145 lb.) who each had 3-2 match records during the event and each contributed nine points while Brady Shepard contributed 7.5 points to the team and also finished his day with a 3-2 record. Max Clark (106 lb.) and Levi Newman (152 lb.) collectively had three wins and contributed seven total team points. Hayden Demerath (126 lb.) and Paul Lewis (145 lb.) wrestled hard but did not score in this event.

As a team, the Rebel Jays had 75.5 points which placed them in 11th place out of 13 schools, but they competed with eight wrestlers com-

The Eagle River Falcons mens hockey team split a pair of Great Lakes Hockey League games over the weekend as they visited the Marquette Mutineers, Friday and

After opening the series with a struggle defensively, dropping the opener 12-7, the team recovered Saturday to win the second game of the matchup, 5-3.

Friday's game saw the home Mutineers jump out in front with four goals in the first which surrounded a lone Eagle River goal off the stick of Cal Laggis, assisted by Todd Koritzinsky and Mike

The Falcons looked poised to start the second as the comeback started with backto-back goals in the first three minutes from Koritzinsky which made it 4-3 Marquette with 17:32 to go in the period. Alex Kornely, Laggis, Bob McDonald and Otto all assisted on the goals.

From there the Mutineers put the pedal down scoring four unanswered, three of them in the second period from Dallas McLaughlin who ended the night with five goals in total to lead the way for the

Lucas Otto tried to car-

ry his team back to within striking distance in the third, scoring three consecutive goals which made it 8-6 Marquette with under four minutes to play. The first of the three came on the power play as Otto was assisted there by his older brother and Alex Hauswirth

Within a pair of goals with just four minutes to play, Marquette would get two goals in the next minute to increase the space, and after Mike Otto scored with 2:34 to go to make it 10-7, the Mutineers put the icing on the cake with two more goals in the final 90 seconds to take that 12-7 final.

Eagle River put 51 shots on goal to just 40 for Marquette. Richard Yeshe took the loss in goal stopping 28 shots while Jordan Nagelkirk took the win, stopping 44 shots on the night.

Both Koritzinsky and Mike Otto each had four points to lead the way for Eagle River followed by three apiece for Lucas Otto and Hauswirth. Laggis and McDonald added two while Kornely, and Jacob Robinson each had an assist.

Saturday's game was much different as the Falcons only got 30 shots on goal, they pulled off the 5-3 win as Yeshe returned to form to stop 36 of 39 Mutineers shots in picking

With 10 points on the year the Falcons rest in fourth place in the league trailing Fond du Lac (20), Portage Lake (16) and Mosinee (15). Marquette (9) rests in fifth, Calumet (6) sixth, De Pere (4) seventh and Fox Cities (0) in eighth.

we shot 1-for-13 from deep and they were all good open looks," said Pines coach Terry Klemett. "I was pleased with our patience on offense.
