Arrows rush past Mauston

LANCASTER – Behind the rushing attack of quarterback Jacob DiVall and running back Peyton Alvarado, the Lancaster Flying Arrows rushed for 340 yards last Thursday night in a 35-0 lopsided victory over visiting Mauston.

The win gives coach Jordan Rolland's squad a record of 3-1, while the Golden Eagles fell to 1-3 on

the season. This year's crossover games between teams in the Southwest Wisconsin Conference and the South Central bear the same weight as a conference game would when determining playoff eligibility.

To create running room for their top two rushers, the Lancaster coaching staff followed an age-old recipe that worked to perfection last Thursday night.

"They packed the box, so we tried to spread them out and tried to make the box light to run against,"

Rolland explained. "We made it look like we were in pass sets so we could run."

With two receivers split wide to the right, and two more split wide to the left, the Flying Arrows used four wide receiver sets to spread Mauston's defense out and prevent them from loading the box.

What that did was allow DiVall and Alvarado to

CUBA CITY – Finishing first in their last six consecutive meets, the Lancaster girls golf team took top honors again this past Monday evening when teams from the Southwest Wisconsin Conference got together at Cole Acres Country Club.

Coach Brooke Marcue's Flying Arrows cruised to the team title, shooting a 192 and finishing 14 strokes ahead of the second-place team from Darlington.

Despite continuous rain on a chilly 60-degree day, Lancaster junior Brianna Kirsch earned medalist honors with a nine-over-par round of 46 on the par-37 course.

Freshman Lynell Miller wasn't far behind Kirsch with a 48, while senior Paige Lolwing and junior Kate McWilliams finished with identical 49s. Junior Evy Dhyanchand came in with a 53.

Last Tuesday evening the Lancaster ladies were at home at the Lancaster Country Club, where they finished first with a team score of 183, which was 17 strokes better than the second-place team from Southwestern/Cuba City/Benton.

Kirsch took medalist honors on her home course, shooting a two-over-par round of 38, followed by McWilliams with a 44, Dhyanchand with a 48, Lolwing a 53 and Miller a 54.

This Thursday evening the Lancaster ladies will again be on their home course, beginning at 4 p.m.. They will then be at Trappers Turn Golf Club in Wisconsin Dells on Tuesday, Sept. 20.

LANCASTER – With a 3-1 loss to visiting Dodgeville last Thursday night, the Lancaster varsity volleyball team fell to 0-2 in Southwest Wisconsin Conference play.

Just two matches into the conference schedule, Richland Center and River Valley remain the only unbeaten teams at 2-0, while

the Arrows and Blackhawks of Prairie du Chien are left looking for their first win.

Against the Dodgers, coach Carla Hentrich's squad suffered losses of 25-10 and 25-9 in the first two sets, but avoided the sweep with a 25-21 victory in the third set.

Potosi/Cassville bottles up Pointers

MINERAL POINT – In a very physical back-and-forth non-conference football contest that saw three lead changes and one tie, coach Mark Siegert's Potosi/Cassville co-op squad pulled out a 34-27 victory over the host Pointers last Friday night.

With the win, coach Siegert's Chieftains improved to 3-1 on the season, while Mineral Point fell to 1-3 with the loss. Keep in mind that this year's crossover games between teams in the Southwest Wisconsin Activities League and the Six Rivers conference bear the same weight as a conference game would when determining playoff eligibility.

In a close contest such as this one, it's easy to overlook the importance of special teams, which often times can be the deciding factor. The importance of special teams was certainly not lost on coach Siegert.

"I thought our special teams played really well," he said. "I thought we flipped the field a few times that was really important."

Junior running back Eli Adams garners a lot of attention for his big plays and value to the rushing attack, but as a punter last Friday night, he averaged 46.5 yards on four punts.

Fellow junior Braden Fishnick is also a valuable weapon for the Chieftain offense, but as a kick returner he averaged 19.3 yards on three touches last Friday night against the Pointers.

With a 54-yard passing score from senior quarterback Raz Okey to senior tight end Brayden Edge midway through the opening quarter, the Chieftains and Pointers were knotted up at 6-6 going into the second.

The Chieftains scored twice in the second quarter to take an 18-13 lead into the locker room, getting a two-yard TD run from Adams and a 32-yard TD pass from Okey to Sam Udelhofen.

Coach Siegert's squad took its largest lead of the game with 6:22 to play in the third quarter, on a one-yard TD plunge from Okey, followed by a two-point conversion pass to Dayton Udelhofen.

When Mineral Point made it a one-score game on a touchdown run late in the third quarter, Potosi/Cassville answered early in the fourth with a three-yard TD run by Adams to make it a two-score lead again.

The Pointers managed another score with 4:54 to play in the contest, pulling to within 34-27, but the Chieftains were able to close out the win in the final minutes.

"They have a nice squad, they're solid and have some nice players," Siegert said of Mineral Point. "We played real physical up front, which is always good."

Using a balanced offensive attack, Potosi/Cassville rushed for 114 yards and three touchdowns on 47 attempts, while passing for 173 yards and two TDs on 8-of-13 completions.

Okey, who threw an

interception on his very first pass attempt of the night, went on to complete 8-of-11 passes for 173 yards and two TDs.

Sam Udelhofen led the Chieftain receivers with two catches for 78 yards, including a 32-yard TD reception, while Adams led the rushers with 96 yards and two TDs on 26 carries. Fellow junior Roman Friederick carried the ball 14 times for 36 yards.

"There weren't any easy yards coming on Friday, at least not on the ground that's for sure," said Siegert.

Mineral Point concluded the contest with 124 yards rushing on 34 attempts, and 189 yards passing on 17-of-31 completions.

Senior linebacker Nick Hampton recorded a team-high 14 tackles to go along with half a sack and one interception, while Roman Friederick was in on 10 tackles and Raz Okey had eight to go along with one sack and one interception. Fishnick also had an interception for the Chieftains.

This Friday night Potosi/Cassville (3-1) will take to the road against Benton/Scales Mound/Shullsburg (3-1) at Benton.

T-Wolves ground and pound at Fennimore

FENNIMORE – A well-balanced rushing attack and a disciplined defensive effort, proved to be the winning formula for the River Ridge Timberwolves last Friday night, who defeated host Fennimore, 28-7, in a non-conference football contest.

Coach Wade Winkers' squad improved to 4-0 on the season with their latest win, as they embark on a five-week conference schedule starting this Friday night against visiting Pecatonica/Argyle.

Against Fennimore, the Timberwolves had a

good balance on offense with inside and outside running plays, while the defense kept the Golden Eagles in check the entire night.

Behind their sophomore workhorse fullback Andrew Nies, River Ridge rushed for 243 yards and three touchdowns on 49 total attempts.

Nies carried the bulk of the load, finishing with 97 yards on 22 carries for an average of 4.4 yards per attempt.

With Nies gaining yards up the middle, the outside running attack was divided amongst a plethora of capable rushers, who combined for 146 yards and three TDs on 27 attempts.

Senior Braden Crubel rushed four times

for 60 yards, including a 33-yard touchdown midway through the fourth quarter.

Junior quarterback Matthew Nies had the second-most carries on the team with eight, going for 29 yards, including an eight-yard TD plunge on River Ridge's first possession of the game.

Fellow junior Brady Bunge also got into the scoring act with a 16-yard touchdown in the opening quarter, and finished with 28 yards on five rushing attempts.

Of course no one gains any yards up the middle or around the edges unless the offensive line is able to occupy defenders, and make the

necessary holes needed to run through.

Doing the job up front for River Ridge Friday night were senior center Brody Kielle, sophomore left guard Peyton Aulwes, freshman right guard Eli Hamilton, senior right tackle Anthony Davis and senior left tackle Levi Wehrle.

"As a group they're getting better and they're communicating better," coach Wade Winkers said of the O'line. "None of them are playing in the spot that they played in last year, so we've had our growing pains. I think there is a lot of

Timberwolves improve to 15-0

River Ridge stands alone atop Six Rivers standings

PATCH GROVE – Coach Dianne Langmeier and her River Ridge varsity volleyball team have most certainly answered the call early in the 2022 season, having gone a perfect 15-0 overall and off to a 5-0 start in Six Rivers West conference action.

Most recently, the Timberwolves knocked off the defending conference champs from Highland in a thrilling five-set contest played this past Monday evening at Highland.

With constant momentum swings, the Timberwolves overcame a 25-14 loss in the first set by winning the second, 25-21. They then lost the third set, 25-21, but sent the match into a fifth with a 25-23 victory in the fourth.

In the fifth and deciding set that goes to 15, the Wolves were on the verge of victory with a 14-10 lead before the Cardinals made a late run to pull within 14-13.

A Shayna Graf kill with an Alli Wagner assist put the game away, giving River Ridge the top spot in the conference standings.

“Highland’s servers really pushed our passing to get off target in games two and four right away at the start of those sets,” explained coach Langmeier. “But in the fifth game, the girls did a nice job not letting that happen.”

Leading River Ridge to victory was senior Payton Millin, who put down a team-high 19 kills to go along with seven blocks and 21 digs. Fellow senior Madelyn Thornton added nine kills and six blocks, while Wagner dished out a team-high 26 assists. Alivia Polodna led the team with 36 total digs.

Last week, coach Langmeier’s squad collected conference wins over Cassville and Benton, beating the Comets, 3-0, last Tuesday night, and Benton, 3-2, on the following Thursday.

Against the Comets, Millin put down 14 kills to go along with three aces, while Thornton had six kills and two blocks in the win.

Wagner dished out 20 assists and served up six aces, while Polodna had 12 digs and Payton Kaufman eight.

“The team played well. Cassville was very scrappy and played pretty evenly with us in the first game,” Langmeier said. “Alli’s serving was a turning point in a couple of matches for us. They had trouble getting her serve up and that gave us momentum to take the set. That momentum carried into the second set with our hitting and attacks.”

Against Benton on the following Thursday night, the Timberwolves got 31 kills and seven blocks from Millin, along with 10 kills and 10 blocks from Thornton.

Wagner had 30 assists and Polodna 23 digs in a five-set match that saw River Ridge win the fifth, 15-10.

“The difference in the match came down to our blocking really stepping up in the last two games,” said Langmeier. “We also made our serves when we needed to by missing only five as a team in the whole match.”

Last Saturday, the Timberwolves participated in the Lancaster Invite, where they went 5-0 on the day to claim the team title.

In pool play, the Timberwolves swept through the competition, beating Kickapoo, Black Hawk and Lancaster.

In divisional play, River Ridge matched up against Viroqua, who took the T-Wolves to three sets.

After claiming a 25-19 victory in the first set, the Timberwolves suffered a 20-25 loss in the second.

Things didn’t exactly start off well for River Ridge in the third set, falling behind, 0-5 to the Blackhawks. Trailing later in the set, 8-10, the Timberwolves got a huge lift from Millin at the service stripe, who led her team to a 15-11 victory.

“I was proud of how the girls showed some true grit and came back in that match to earn the right to play Lancaster for the championship match,” said coach Langmeier. “It was a total team effort from the passers to our setter and then also to our blockers and hitters.”

The Timberwolves went on to sweep the host Arrows in the championship match by scores of 25-17 and 25-14.

On the day, Millin put down 52 total kills to go along with 19 blocks and nine service aces.

Thornton finished the day with 22 kills and 19 blocks, while Wagner dished out 65 total assists and served up 11 aces. Polodna came up with 88 total digs and Kaufman had 54.

Following this past Tuesday night’s home match against visiting Potosi, the Timberwolves are off until next Thursday night (Sept. 22) when they travel to Belmont.

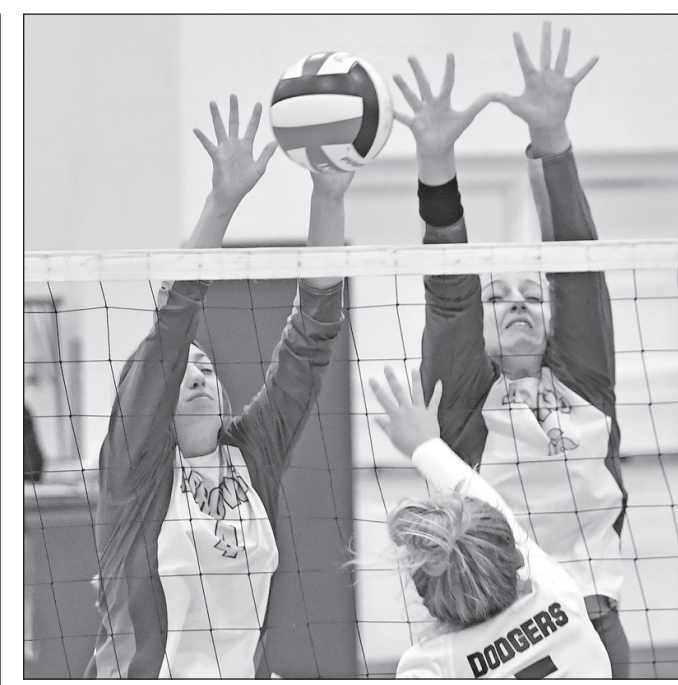

to exploit the middle of Mauston's defense, combining for 335 yards rushing and four touchdowns on 34 carries for a gaudy 9.85-yard average.

DiVall led all rushers with 241 yards and three TDs on 23 attempts, scoring from 1, 8 and 22 yards out. He also completed 7-of-16 passing attempts for 90 yards, throwing two interceptions and no touchdowns.

Alvarado gained 94 yards on 11 rushing attempts, his only touchdown coming from one-yard out early in the fourth quarter. The 5'7" dynamo also had a team-high 40 yards receiving on two receptions, while Brady Oyen was close behind with three receptions for 36 yards.

"DiVall and Alvarado ran pretty hard, and it took more than one tackler to bring them down, which was encouraging," coach Rolland said.

With touchdown runs of 1 and 8 yards in the second quarter, along with a 26-yard field goal from Michael Murphy, the Arrows held an 18-0 lead over the Golden Eagles at the half.

Another 22-yard TD run by DiVall, and a 33-yard field goal by Murphy, gave Lancaster a 28-0 advantage heading into

the fourth quarter.

Alvarado scored his only touchdown of the game early in the fourth from one yard out, which was followed by the extra-point kick by Murphy to end the scoring.

Defensively, the Arrows pitched their second shutout of the season, limiting Mauston to 12 yards rushing on 25 attempts, and to 42 yards passing on 8-of-23 completions.

The strength of Lancaster's defensive unit continues to be their team speed, which proved

really good stuff happening, and I think there's a lot of better stuff to happen. We just need to work on the fine details."

Against the Golden Eagles, the offensive line, specifically, had to adjust and learn on the fly, if the Timberwolves were going to move the ball on the ground.

"They did a lot of things just to take away the fullback, where they were barrel rolling, monkey rolling or bush hogging, however you want to say it, trying to take our guards out and take away the crease," Winkers said of the Fennimore's defense.

"I think they were all a little surprised on Friday with the bush-hog stuff because we hadn't seen that from anybody yet, especially our young guards," Winkers added. "So some seniors had to help them through that and find a way to move some bigger kids."

"We still were able to get some yards there and we were able to get our halfbacks going. I wouldn't say that we were balanced, because our fullback got 22 carries, but as a group we kind of spread it out a little bit with a lot of people having some yards here and there."

While River Ridge's offense was churning up yards on the ground and owning the possession clock, the defense was keeping a potentially potent Fennimore offense in check.

Holding the Golden Eagles scoreless for three quarters, the Timberwolves gave up their only score early in the fourth, which was set up by a River Ridge turnover on Fennimore's 11-yard line.

Limited to just seven points,

Fennimore managed just 38 yards rushing on 16 attempts, while completing 10-of-20 passing attempts for 92 yards and two interceptions.

"They have a very potent offense that throws the ball a lot," Winkers said of Fennimore. "It's always tough to stop a team that's going to throw it 30 to 40 times a game, because eventually they're going to pop something. Overall, I think we only gave up three plays that were over 15 yards, but otherwise we played really well on the edge taking away their bubbles and their flat stuff that we were really worried about."

Leading the River Ridge defense with nine tackles was Brandon Davis, while Andrew Nies and Ricardo Barrita each had five. Carter Cosey and Ty Adrian each had interceptions for the Timberwolves, while Matthew Nies, Anthony Davis and Brody Kielley each had a sack.

"We're a good team, but if we want to be a really good team or maybe even a great team, there's no plays off and no two-second efforts. It's got to be five-second efforts and things like that," Winkers

Cross Country action heats up

SPRING GREEN – With a team score of 61, the Lancaster girls cross country team took top honors at last Saturday's River Valley Invitational among the nine teams competing in the small school division.

Coach Taylor Reynolds' girls squad finished 15 points ahead of the second-place team from Darlington, and 17 points ahead of the third-place team from Brookwood.

Lancaster's top five runners all finished among the top 25 overall, in a field that had 78 total runners competing.

Finishing fifth overall with a time of 20:33.5 was junior Mallory Olmstead, who was followed by her freshman sister, Kylie, who finished ninth with a time of 21:23.1.

Finishing 13th with a time of 22:14.3 was freshman Sara McWilliams, while

sophomore Carly Vesperman was 23rd (22:57.3) and senior Mikayla Smith was 24th (22:58.3).

Also competing at Saturday's meet were the Timberwolves of River Ridge, who saw senior Jessica Patterson finish 14th overall with a time of 22:15.8, and sophomore Lydia Mason finish 63rd (28:06.2).

On the boys' side, Lancaster finished ninth of 15 competing teams with a score of 265, while River Ridge was 12th at 310. Claiming the boys title with a score of 59 was Iowa-Grant, while Fennimore (81) was a distant second.

For the Lancaster boys, junior Brady Sperle led the charge with a time of 20:10.1 and a 45th place, while sophomore Will Schindler finished 49th (20:28.9), freshman Brady Mack 51st (20:33.4), sophomore Logan Harding 53rd (20:37.9) and sophomore Jayden Johnson 85th (22:40.6).

The River Ridge boys were paced by sophomore Luke Patterson who finished 27th overall (18:56.6), and was followed by fellow sophomore Colton Moris in 62nd (21:17.7), freshman Mason Pecinovsky in 72nd (21:40.6), junior Brady Burmeister in 84th (22:37.0) and junior Rylan Linder in 89th (22:55.4).

Coach Shane Sperle's Timberwolves also competed in the Ryan Zimpel Invite at Boscobel last Tuesday evening, where the boys finished 12th of 13 teams with a score of 280.

Patterson finished 16th overall with a time of 18:32.5, and was followed by Moris in 61st (21:37.6), Pecinovsky in 67th (22:25.0), Burmeister in 74th (23:06.4) and Linder in 77th (23:13.0).

For the River Ridge ladies, Jessica Patterson finished 17th overall with a time of 22:59.9, while Mason was 54th at 30:27.6.
