Arrows send three seniors to sectional wrestling meet

Ryan McCartney claims regional title in thrilling fashion

MINERAL POINT – Three members of the Lancaster varsity wrestling team extended their senior season with a top-four finish at last Saturday's Mineral Point Regional, and will be competing at this Saturday's Division 3 Richland Center Sectional with hopes of advancing to the WIAA State Meet.

As head coach Brad Sturmer had expected, Lancaster seniors Bryce Galle, Ryan McCartney and Paxton Hanke all moved on from last Saturday's regional meet.

"If any of those three hadn't moved on it would have been disappointing for sure," said coach Sturmer.

McCartney, who finished first on Saturday in the 195-pound weight class, leads the trio with his third trip to sectionals and is looking to make his third trip to the state meet.

Galle, who finished third at 182 pounds, will be making his second trip to the sectional meet and is hoping

for a return trip to state, while Hanke, who finished third at 220 pounds, will be making his first trip to sectionals this year.

McCartney is no stranger to the big stage, which he commanded last Saturday with what many are calling the match of the day.

Following a first-round bye with an 11-second pin of De Soto's Lakota Webster, McCartney then defeated Mineral Point's Graham Fitzsimons in his semifinal match, 10-5.

The Lancaster senior then ran up against Brody

Brockhop of Iowa-Grant/Highland in his championship match, which had everyone in attendance on the edge of their seat.

Going into the third period, McCartney trailed Brockhop 5-2, and choosing the bottom to start the third period, got an escape to pull within 5-3.

With under 30 seconds remaining in the match, McCartney then scored two points on a takedown, sending the match into sudden victory overtime.

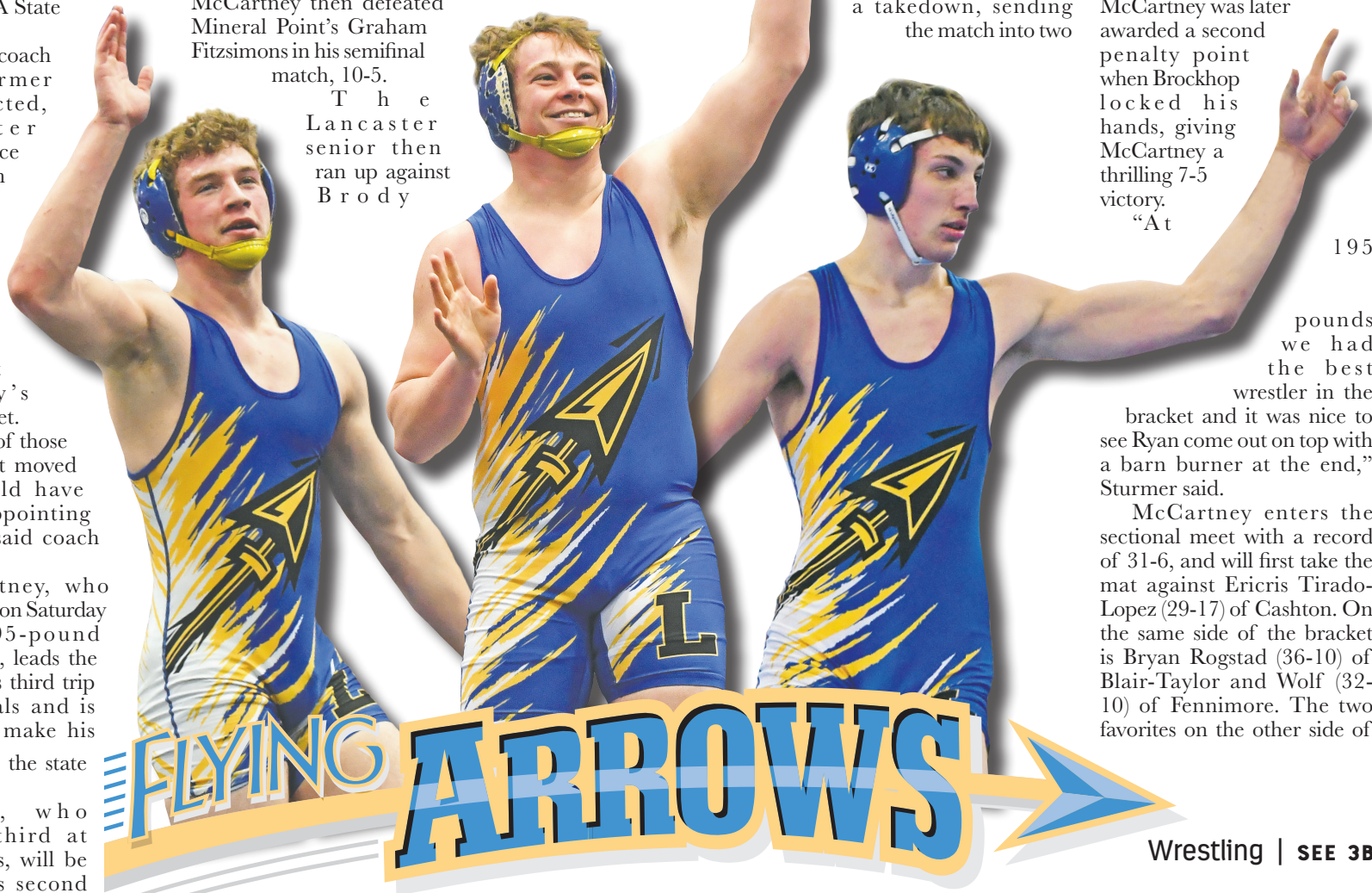
In the one-minute overtime session with both wrestlers starting out on their feet, neither wrestler scored a takedown, sending the match into two

30-second tiebreaker periods, where again no one scored in the first 30 seconds.

Choosing the bottom position to start the final 30-second tiebreaker, McCartney was at the point where he was about ready to score on Brockhop, who responded by pulling him out of bounds, giving McCartney one penalty point.

McCartney was later awarded a second penalty point when Brockhop locked his hands, giving McCartney a thrilling 7-5 victory.

Lady T-Wolves beat Shullsburg in overtime

Belmont avoids upset to maintain top spot

PATCH GROVE – Coach Veronica Zinkle's Lady Timberwolves of River Ridge had a challenging week to say the least, taking the court against two of the top three teams in the Six Rivers West in a span of four days.

The Timberwolves started off last week with a 71-63 overtime victory against visiting Shullsburg last Tuesday night, and followed up with a 55-29 loss to league-leading Belmont on Friday.

With one conference game remaining, the Timberwolves sit second in the league standings with a league record of 7-2, just behind Belmont (8-0), but ahead of Shullsburg (6-3).

Coach Zinkle's Timberwolves will conclude the regular season with a home game against visiting Benton this Thursday night.

Last Tuesday night against the visiting Miners, River Ridge let a commanding 31-17 halftime lead slip away, and were outscored 38-24 in the second half to force four minutes of overtime.

In the overtime session, coach Zinkle's squad got things rolling again, outscoring their opponent, 16-8 to claim an eight-point victory.

Sophomore Reghan Zinkle, who has been turning it on late in the season, scored a team-high 19 points for the Timberwolves on 6-of-15 shooting from the floor and 6-of-8 from the free throw line.

Zinkle also pulled down a team-high 11 rebounds and dished out a team-high five assists in the win.

Close behind her with 16 points was junior Shayna Graf, who went 9-of-13 from the free throw line. She also dished out five assists to go along with a team-high six steals and pulled

Wunderlin advances to state

Junior qualifies in 50- and 100-freestyle

PRAIRIE DU SAC – Not since Dan Istin in 2017 has a member of the Platteville/Lancaster boys swim team qualified for the state meet.

Platteville/Lancaster junior Titus Wunderlin snapped the co-op's six-year absence from the state meet with a standout performance at Saturday's WIAA Division 2 Sauk Prairie Sectional.

Wunderlin advance to the 99th Annual WIAA State Championships in both the 50-yard freestyle and the 100-yard freestyle.

The winner of each event at each of the four D2 sectionals, as well as the next 12 fastest times advance to the D2 state championships, which will be held Friday at Waukesha South High School.

Wunderlin opened his sectional meet with a lifetime-best split in the 50-yard butterfly while swimming the third leg of Platteville/Lancaster's 200 medley relay. The Hillmen quartet of Wunderlin, sophomore Clement Duve, junior Owen Fritz and freshman Mazin Plumb placed eighth in the medley relay at 1:57.08.

Wunderlin went on to place fourth in the 50 free with a time of 22.54 seconds, behind McFarland senior Patrick Zabawa-Lodholz (21.85), Sauk Prairie/

Wisconsin Heights' Sam King (22.07) and McFarland's Shane TeBeest (22.12).

Two events later, Wunderlin came back to place third in the 100 freestyle with a time of 49.89, behind Zabawa-Lodholz and Mount Horeb junior Angus Best (49.66).

Wunderlin enters the state meet seeded 12th in the 50 freestyle and 11th in the 100

free. "Titus looked fast during the warm up," said Hillmen coach Matt Wunderlin (also Titus' father). "Then he split a lifetime best butterfly time in the medley relay. The 50 is so quick that anything can happen, and even a little error can cost you the race, but he

Lady Arrows down Richland Center, 63-43

LANCASTER — With a 63-43 victory over visiting Richland Center last Friday night, coach Courtney Feller and her Lancaster girls' basketball team improved to 3-6 in Southwest Wisconsin Conference action.

The Flying Arrows will close out the regular season Thursday night at Prairie du Chien (9-0), who has already captured this year's SWC title. Against the Hornets last Friday night, coach Feller's squad did most of their damage within six feet of the basket, where they made 18-of-20 shot attempts to score 36 of their 63 points.

From inside the 3-point arc Lancaster was 22-of-25 (88%), and from outside the 3-point arc was 4-of-16 (25%). Senior guard Laine Burks led the Arrows with 17 points on 8-of-12 shooting from the floor. She also dished out a team-high five assists to go along with four rebounds and three steals.

Chipping in 12 points and a team-high nine rebounds was senior forward Jenna Wolf, while fellow senior Rose White added 10 points, five boards and two steals in the win. Lancaster also got nine points and a team-high five steals from junior Eden Bowen, and seven points from sophomore Jessica Morgan, who also had six rebounds.

In non-conference action, the Arrows defeated visiting Potosi/Cassville, 59-43, last

Tuesday night.

Burks netted a team-high 26 points on 11-of-24 shooting from the floor, while also dishing out a team-high five assists and coming away with a team-high four steals.

Morgan added 15 points and a team-high eight rebounds in the win, while Wolf finished with seven points. The Arrows outscored their opponent 38-14 in the paint, while making 24-of-62 (39%) total shot attempts, including 5-of-19 (26%) from downtown. They were 6-of-14 (43%) from the free throw line, committed nine turnovers and were out-rebounded 42-41.

used the pressure to lower his best time.

"I told him prior to the 100 that he has the speed and endurance to go under 50 seconds, and again he put forth a great effort, showing that he truly is one of the fastest swimmers in the state," coach Wunderlin said.

The Hillmen also had four other sectional entries.

Fritz placed 22nd in the 50 freestyle at 25.87, while Plumb finished 25th in the event at 26.66. Fritz also placed 17th in the 100 breaststroke (1:15.42) later in the meet.

Wunderlin, sophomore Rusty Wruck, Plumb and Fritz teamed up to place seventh in the 200 freestyle relay at 1:40.33. The Hillmen scored 77 team

points in their seven events at the 11-team sectional.

McFarland won the sectional team title with 401.5 points, while Sauk Prairie/Wisconsin Heights (332) finished second.

"All season long our athletes improved. They were diligent in their technique and worked hard. It was a lot of fun to be at the meet and see the times continue to go down," said coach Wunderlin.

LANCASTER – Coming down to the final seconds, coach Brian Knapp and his Lancaster boys' basketball team couldn't get the basket they needed to avoid a 61-58 loss to visiting River Valley last Friday night.

Sent to the line with 51.4 seconds showing on the clock Gildersleeve made one-of-two attempts at the line, pulling the Arrows to within 59-58.

With two fouls to give, Lancaster eventually sent River Valley's Kaleb Esser to the charity stripe with 30.2 seconds showing on the clock, where he missed the front end of a one-and-one.

Lancaster pulled down the rebound, raced the ball across half court and called a timeout with 24.3 seconds to play to set up a play.

Coming off a screen, a 15-foot jumper by Lancaster freshman Taylor Williams bounced off the rim with 4.3 seconds as Esser gathered the rebound for the Blackhawks and was immediately fouled with 2.1 seconds showing on the clock. Esser made both ends of the one-and-one, sealing the victory for the visiting Blackhawks.

Shooting just six free throw attempts the entire night, River Valley made three, while Lancaster was 20-of-29 (69%) from the charity stripe.

From the field, the Arrows were 18-of-49 (37%), including 2-of-14 (14%) from 3-point range. They committed 13 turnovers to River Valley's 15, and were outscored 32-22 in the paint.

Netting a team-high 12 points for the Arrows was Taylor Williams, who was 4-of-12 from the field and 4-of-5 from the line. He also pulled down seven rebounds in the loss.

Lance Reuter chipped in 10 points, while Brennen Gildersleeve added nine, to go along with seven boards. Mitchel Wolf led the team in assists with three, to go along with seven points.
