Platteville duo qualifies for NHSFR

Vesperman defends state title in steer wrestling and wins Reserve All-Around Cowboy; Heer qualifies for nationals in three events

RICHLAND CENTER — Recent Platteville graduates Jesse Vesperman and Wyatt Heer are heading back to the National High School Finals Rodeo later this summer.

The Hillmen duo qualified for the NHSFR by capping top-four finishes in multiple events this season at the Wisconsin High School Finals Rodeo two weekends ago at the Richland County Fairgrounds.

Vesperman competed in six events at the state finals, qualified for nationals in four and finished as the Reserve All-Around Cowboy with 459 points. He was second to only FortAtkinson's JB Bound (521 points). Vesperman was the Wisconsin All-Around Cowboy a year ago as a junior.

The Platteville cowboy defended

The Platteville cowboy defended his state title in steer wrestling as the season-long champion in the event after he was the only cowboy to catch all three of his steers over the weekend at the state finals.

Vesperman finished second in trap shooting on the season with 144 points, after shooting 72 of 75 clay targets during state championship competition, Thursday, June 8.

He also qualified for nationals with third place finishes in the small bore rifle competition, and the tie-down roping competition.

Vesperman finished sixth in the boys cutting event — an event he competed in for the first time this year at the state finals — scoring 10 crucial points that helped him edge Justin Gukenberger (457) by just two points for the Reserve All-Around Cowboy title. He also teamed with Waunakee's Clare Burcalow to place 13th in the team roping event.

Vesperman, who made the difficult decision to sit out his freshman year of rodeo to save money for a horse, made another hard decision last year to forego his senior year of football at PHS so he could attend regional rodeo shooting events in the fall.

Its safe to save both decisions

have more than paid off.

Vesperman, who as a NHSFR qualifier in four events a year ago, and a national qualifier in the trap shooting competition two years ago, will finish his high school career as a three-time state champion (two-time steer wrestling, once in trap shooting), a two-time runner-up in trap shooting, an All-Around Cowboy inner (2022), a Reserve All-Around Cowboy (2023) and a nine-event NHSFR rodeo.

"It feels pretty good," said Vesperman, who will continue his

rodeo and educational career in the fall at Iowa Central Community College in Fort Dodge, Iowa. "I am excited for another chance to go to Wyoming."

This year, Vesperman will be joined by friend and teammate Wyatt Heer.

After qualifying for nationals two years ago as a sophomore in team roping, Heer just missed out on a return trip to the NHSFR after placing fifth in Wisconsin in both team roping and tie-down roping last year as a junior. The top four finishers in each event qualify for the NHSFR each year.

This year Heer is a three-event national qualifier, after placing second in the boys cutting (33.5), second in tie-down roping (202.5) and fourth in team roping with partner Trent Parr from Mondovi.

The NHSFR will be held July 16–22 in Gillette, Wyom.

After competing together one final time as prep Cowboys in July as part of Team Wisconsin, Vesperman and Heer will teamup again in the fall as Heer will also continue his education and rodeo career at ICCC.

"I haven't really thought too much about college rodeo yet," said Vesperman. "I am just concentrating on the national finals right now."

The back-to-back Six Rivers West champion Potosi/Cassville baseball team dominated this year's postseason conference awards.

The Chieftains (18–9, 11–2 SRC) swept the league's top two awards and earned eight all-conference awards.

Tony Leibfried was named the SRW Coach of the Year and senior third baseman Logan Kruser was named the SRW Player of the Year after leading the co-op to a second-straight conference title and a D4 regional championship.

Leibfried was also named the SRW Coach of the Year in 2022 when the Chieftains finished 17–7, 11–2.

Kruser earned the league's top player honor after batting a team-high .411 (37-for-11) with seven doubles, three triple, 18 RBI and 22 runs and four stolen bases. He also went 0–1 with three saves, a 5.63 ERA and 16 strikeouts in 13²/₃ innings as a reperior of the ERA.

Junior pitcher Eli Adams, (5–5, 1.98 ERA, 90 K, 56.2 IP; .297, 22 H, 2 HR, 17 RBI, 19 R, 11 SB), senior outfielder/pitcher Preston Steiner (.338, 23 H, 4 2B, 2 HR, 13 RBI, 27 R, 16 SB; 6–1,1.43 ERA, 62 K, 49 IP) and senior shortstop Sam Udelhofen (.337, 31 H, 5 2B, 13 RBI, 26 R, 18 SB) joined Kruser on the 15-player All-SRW first team.



After a successful 2023 season, five members of the Platteville baseball were named All-Southwest Wisconsin Conference by a vote of the league's coaches.

Junior third baseman/ pitcher Riley Donahoe was named first team All-SWC as a utility player. Sophomore shortstop Lucas Ludlum joined Donahoe on the 11-player first team. Sophomore pitcher Trent

Mumm and sophomore outfielder Jonah Vorwald were named to the 13-player second team, and junior catcher Cam Key received honorable Donahoe hit a team-high .455 (25-for-55) with seven

doubles, two homers, 19 RBI, 17 walks and 12 stolen bases to earn first-team All-SWC for a second-straight year. He also went 2-0 with two saves, a 3.15 ERA and 27 strikeouts in 13¹/₃ innings pitched.

Ludlum finished second on the team with a .286 (20-for-70) batting average with one double, one triple, eight RBI, 18 runs scored and a teamhigh 24 stolen bases. Ludlum received All-SWC honorable mention last year as a fresh-Mumm went 1-5 with a

3.73 ERA, and a team-high 31 strikeouts in a team-high 35²/₃ innings pitched this year as the Platteville ace. Mumm also batted .200 (12-for-60) with one double and six RBI.

Vorwald hit .273 (15-for-55) with two doubles, six RBI, nine runs, seven walks and nine stolen bases. He also went 1–1 with a 1.88 ERA and 20 strikeouts in 182/3 innings

Key batted .241 (13-for-54) with one double, seven RBI, three runs scored, 14 walks this year. He also went 0-1 with a 9.88 ERA and seven strikeouts in 11¹/₃ innings



It was a long wait, but the first fawn ran toward the house, tucked in behind several ferns and hostas, then waited to be disturbed before running back into the forest.

The peak fawning period is late May, but not being in the right place at the right time delayed seeing a day-old deer. This fawn was already traveling short distances by itself, even though the doe may have been in sight or smell of the venturesome, tiny youngster.

A female muskrat made a home of a kitchen-size, spring-fed farm pond to raise her two kits. Just after first light the three were swimming about, gathering fresh vegetation from terrestrial environs and taking it underwater and under bank for eating later or construction of a matted den.

Their dark color and rounded shape made them appear bolder-like while sitting on the pond's shore. Within seconds of coming above water the young muskrats' fur appeared as if it was velvet.

A cluster of pale purple coneflowers, all members of the same plant, showed no purple at all, a palest of purple heads stood among numerous compass plants opening their first blooms of hundreds of tiny ray and disc flowers.

The first nuts, hazelnuts in this case, are open enough to show a glistening nut.

Birds have made short work of the Juneberries and are doing the same on mulberry

Fishing is very good with warmer water and new green weeds helping anglers catching smallmouth bass and walleyes particularly in the Madison Lakes, according to Wally Banfi, fishing guide and sales clerk

at Wilderness Fish and Game in Sauk City Half night crawlers, crank baits, and jigging have all been working. Some of the smaller waters including Blackhawk Lake and Yellowstone Lake have been good, too.

"Usually early and late in the day are best," Banfi said.

Trout anglers, too, have been doing well on Black Earth Creek, with its larger system. Cloudy afternoons and evening are best. "The fish seem to be looking up to the surface every day that is like this," said Bret Schultz, an everyday trout angler. "It's a bit too early for crickets and hoppers, but that will come.

Bugs have not been insurmountable but a little Biggins or vanilla extract seem to take care of the bothersome few. Icy Hot works on gnats.

Crowds have not been a problem with larger waters (trout streams) but small streams might necessitate moving a bit to stay clear of others.

'Richland County doesn't seem to be a problem with plenty of water and fish, too," Now that the spring turkey season is

over, Wayne Smith, in Lafayette County, says seeing toms and hens, even out the windows has picked up. Hens calling to chicks is a noticeable change in turkey talk.

The spring turkey season showed a seven percent jump, with 42,439 birds registered. Youth hunters jumped their registrations 28 percent, to 2,972 birds. Preliminary ruffed grouse spring drum-

ming counts continues to drop with the bot-

tom of the 10-year-cycle several years away. Walleyes have been off and on in some

waters, according to Doug Williams, at DW Sports Center in Portage. Those insistent on catching fish might turn to sheephead or catfish, using night crawlers, Doug said.

Corn and soybean crops are taking a hit from little precipitation and turkeys and deer are feeding on the small plants. Hay and pasture crops have taken a smack, too.

Butterflies and other pollinators have moved into some areas where a few blooms have opened.

Bird feeding and providing a bird bath have kept birds coming, even wild turkeys.

Humming birds at Jill and Tom Scharter's place, up in Bayfield County have found their 16 feeder stations need filling each day, Jill said. "I usually go through 350 pounds of sugar during a summer.

Providing more feeders has helped Jill with dominant, territorial hummers pushing other birds away. She also helps birds accommodate abrupt cold snaps in in the year by using some chick brooding lights. Prior to this she had picked up as many as 34 dead birds one morning. She has confirmed having more than 100 birds at one time with photography.

It's a wait and see for walnuts and hickory nuts. Red and white oak acorns look good at the moment.
