Martin scores 1,000 point at Loras, earns 1st-team **ARC** honors

WAVERYLY, Iowa — Loras junior Sami Martin scored 17 points and grabbed six rebounds to help the No. 19-ranked Loras College women's basketball as the Duhawks beat No. 24 Wartburg College 72–61 Saturday, Feb. 25 to win the American Rivers Conference Tournament and secure an automatic bid to the upcoming NCAA Division III National Tournament.

The Duhawks used a massive 27-point third quarter to pull away from the Knights (21-6) and hand the regular season champions their first home loss of the 2022–23 season. The title is the fourth for the Duhawks in program history and the first since 2016.

With her 17 points, Martin also surpassed the 1,000-point mark for her career at Loras.

Loras (24–5) went on to defeat Knox College (Ill.) 68-56 in the first round of the NCAA DIII Tournament Friday night at Loras' Lillis Athletic Center, before ending the season with a 60–54 loss to No. 14-ranked Trine University (Ind.) on Saturday.

Martin had nine points and eight rebounds in Friday's win and posted a team-high 20 points and 13 rebounds in Saturday's season-ending loss.

She now has 1,043 points through three seasons and finished her junior year averaging a team-high 15.6 points per game, while shooting 54 percent from the field (188 of 348), and a team-high 8 rebounds per game.

Martin also claimed her third-straight All-ARC first team honor after another season as one of the league's top players. Martin was twice named as the A-R-C Player of the Week during the season.

The Duhawks finished second in the ARC at 14-2 behind Wartburg (23-6,

Martin is a 2020 graduate of Platteville High School where she is the school's all-time leader in both points (1,571) and rebounds (1,002) led the Hillmen to a perfect 26–0 season as a senior.

POTOSI — With one mon-key removed from the back of Potosi coach Mike Uppena last Saturday night, there remains yet another that he and his Chieftains look to extract this Thursday night. With a 68–64 WIAA Divi-

sion 5 regional final victory over Southwestern, the Chieftains exorcised the demons of past losses to the Wildcats, and earned a date with Wauzeka-Steuben in Thursday night's sectional semifinal.

In the past six seasons, coach Uppena's team's have been eliminated from postseason action by Southwestern in 2018 and 2022, and by Wauzeka-Steuben in 2020 and 2021.

Saturday's regional title was the fifth for coach Uppena in his 21 years at Potosi, and gives the Chieftains a season record of 21-5 going into Thursday night's sectional semifinal at Prairie du Chien.

"There was a monkey on our back for sure the last few times playing Southwestern in key situations," said Uppena. "I guess you know you have a few games that you star and you hope you can get to them, especially this time of the year."

In the first half, the two

teams combined for three ties and nine lead changes, with Southwestern (18–8) holding their largest lead of the half at 12–7 with 13:56 to play, while Potosi's largest lead of the half was at three points multiple times.

With just under two minutes to play in the half, Southwestern held a 32-29 advantage, only to see Potosi close out the half with a 4-0 run, taking a 33–32 lead at the intermission.

"Right before the half we were down three, when Sam got a bucket and then found Logan Kruser under the basket on a set play," said Uppena. "I think that was a big swing,

from being down three to going into the half up one."

Southwestern came out of the locker room cold to start the second half, going 0-for-7 from the field and committing two turnovers before scoring their first points in the half at the 11:53 mark.

By that time, coach Uppena's Chieftains had already amassed a 42-32 lead, which they never relinquished despite a less than stellar performance at the free throw line.

"Defensively we turned it up in the second half," said Uppena. (Tyler) Brotzman was basically, in my opinion, keeping them in the game. He had 12 points in the first half, and we needed to find him better. In the second half we certainly did."

With Southwestern forced to foul throughout the closing minutes of the game, Potosi capitalized on just 11-of-24 free

Hillmen place 9th at state in D2

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WISCONSIN RAPIDS — The Platteville/Belmont/Lancaster gymnastics team closed its stellar season over the weekend at the WIAA State Gymnastics Meet at Wisconsin Rapids Lincoln High School.

The Southwest Wisconsin Conference champion and D2 Platteville Sectional champion Hillmen began the two-event with a ninth-place in Friday's Division 2 Team State Championships.

Led by seniors Brooke Von Glahn and Mackenzie Champion, PBL posted a combined team 132.35 to place ninth out of 10 teams in D2. Glendale Nicolet dominated the field with a score of 142.75 to win the Division 2 state title. The West Salem co-op finished second at 138.0, just ahead of Elkorn (137.9167).

We had a great team this year that worked hard through several setbacks to qualify for the state meet," said PBL head coach Jessica Hill. Glahn posted an 8.4 on the beam and a 7.883 on the bars.


The Hillmen then moved on the floor exercise.
