Middleton's athletic department has become the bullies during a bullying investigation

Shhhhhh!

Keep quiet, don't talk to anyone. If you do talk, be prepared to face the repercussions.

This is the unofficial mantra of Middleton's athletic department in 2023, where A.D Jamie Sims, associate A.D. Brad Crandall and athletic assistant Amy McCall are playing the parts of Tony Soprano, Paulie Gualtieri and Christopher Moltisanti.

And just think folks — this type of leadership is **ONLY** costing the community \$263,000 a year — a price tag far higher than any other athletic department in the state. And that's before benefits are included.

In the wake of the bullying scandal inside Middleton's football program and the resignation of coach Jason Pertzborn, Sims and his crew haven't looked for solutions. They haven't attempted to solve problems.

Instead, they've become bullies themselves and tried



silencing anyone and everyone around Middleton High School. According to multiple sources, Sims, Crandall and even McCall have warned folks not to say a word to about the scandal. Instead of getting to the bottom of the problem, they've tried using scare tactics to muzzle building employees.

And it isn't winning a lot of points.

"The cover up is always worse than the crime," said one district employee. "And they're a lot more worried about keeping everybody quiet than they are about fixing the problems — and there's a lot of problems."

Bavery called to the Hall

Middleton's boys basketball coach earns ultimate honor

It was 10 a.m. Sunday, a time when much of society is at church, breakfast or simply lounging on their off day.

Not Kevin Bavery.

"I'm watching film of Baylor," said Bavery, Middleton's boys basketball coach since 2006. "I like some of the things they do offensively against certain zone defenses."

This, in a nutshell, Bavery. Energetic. Passionate. And always trying to stay one step ahead of the competition.

It's why Bavery has lasted four-plus decades in a business that chews up and spits out most coaches. And it's why Bavery recently received the ultimate honor when he was voted into the Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.

Bavery was one of 12 coaches voted into the Class of 2023, a group that will be honored during a banquet at the Glacier Canyon Lodge of the Wilderness Resort in Wisconsin Dells on Sept. 24.

"You look at some of the names of the guys that are in the Hall and it's pretty remarka-ble to think that you're going to be one of the guys, too," Bavery said. "It's a little over-whelming."

Bavery, who's leading Middleton to its best season in a quarter century, has a 439-272 career record, including a 223-141 mark with the Cardinals. He also held head coach-ing positions at Oregon and Cedarburg before coming to Middleton. Bavery is the second boys basketball coach in Middleton history named to the Hall, joining 2007 recipient John Boyle. Those that know Bavery best — like longtime assistant coaches Jerry Raffel and Tom Lesar — aren't the least bit surprised the Hall came calling. In fact, they're surprised it took this long.

"Kevin has always had vision," said Raffel, who's arguably Bavery's most trusted aide. "He's always looking for the newest ways. He always wants to be ahead of the trend, not behind the curve.

"He's just so innovative. The one thing about Kevin is he's always looking forward. He doesn't look back real often. He doesn't like to dwindle on

MHS swimmers roll at sectionals

Madoch sets a new school record in 50-yard freestyle

VERONA — Success in the 50-yard freestyle — the likes of which Jack Murdoch strives for — requires perfection.

Or near perfection, anyway. Two laps. One there, one back.

Any little slip-up can add precious hundredths of seconds.

There were none for the senior on Middleton's boys swimming and diving team at Saturday's WIAA Division 1 sectional meet held at the Verona Area High School Aquatics Center — to the tune of a near-state record first-place time of 19.86 seconds.

"I was amazed," he said of coming close to the time of 19.81 seconds that Emilio Perez of Greenfield/Greendale/Pius XI Catholic set as the state bar in 2021. "I did not think I would go that fast.

"I was hoping for a (personal) best time but to be able to go 19.8 - and that was my first time under 20 - it was lots of fun."

The Cardinals had plenty of fun, as well.

Paced by Madoch's schoolrecord time — which eclipsed his own mark of :20.42 first-place finishes almost across the board and a bold display of depth, Middleton won the meet with 387 points, easily outpacing runner-up Madison Memorial (312 points) and third-place Madison West (284).

Winners in each event at the six sectionals received automatic berths in next Saturday's state meet at the Waukesha South High School Natatorium, while the rest of the field will be filled by the 18 best times across the state, regardless of sectional.

The state field hadn't yet been posted as of Saturday evening.

Other winners for Middleton punching their tickets to state without having to wait on pins and needles were senior Nick Chirafisi in the 200 freestyle (1 minute, 39.38 seconds) and 500 freestyle (4:34.00), freshman Sam Wolf in the 200 individual medley (1:52.62), Madoch in the 100 free (:44.52) and all three relay teams. The 200 medley relay team consisted of senior Theo Wolf, Sam Wolf and freshmen Caden Van Buren and Max Carter (1:33.14). The 200 freestyle featured Van Buren. Madoch, Carter and Chirafisi (1:25.06). And the 400 freestyle was made up of Theo Wolf, Sam Wolf, Chirafisi and Madoch (3:04.50). Needless to say, it was a great day for the Cardinals - the top-ranked team in the Wisconsin Interscholastic Swim Coaches Association D1 state poll ahead of secondplace Hartland Arrowhead, third-place Memorial and fourth-place West.

"The boys came to swim today," said Chirafisi adding that excitement over his own success was trumped only by that of his excitement watching his teammates turn in fast time after fast time.

No one came up bigger than Madoch, who owed credit for his success to an interesting routine.

"Diet Coke in the morning," he said of having one every day. "I just like my Diet Cokes."

All kidding aside, Madoch said everything just clicked.

"It was just a really good taper," he said. "It felt pretty fast. I was hoping for a best time when I looked up, but to have one that fast is amazing.

"I knew good results were coming, I just didn't know if it would be this week or next. I'm pretty tapered this week but I think I've got a little taper to go for next week."

He certainly made a statement in the season's penultimate meet, that's for sure.

"Jack breaking the barrier of 20 is a huge barrier. It really kind of separates (you) out and becomes a big-boy swim, so to speak, when you can break that 20 barrier," Middleton coach Weston Lagerhausen said. "Knowing the state record's only five one-hundredths of a second away — any time you're approaching things that have never been done before, that looks really good."

Madoch also anchored the 400 free relay team, joining Chirafisi, Sam Wolf and senior Theo Wolf in setting a school record in that event as well, eclipsing the old mark of 3:04.62 that Chirafisi and Madoch had a hand in on last year's state-title winning relay.

Middleton took fourth at state in 2022. But thanks in large part to a talented freshman class, the Cardinals have their eye on gold this time around.

"Coach Wes kind of described it as, 'We can't win state this weekend, but we can lose it,' " Van Buren said of



the team's attitude going into sectionals. "So we just tried to get everyone through and put up some fast times.

"Get to that state meet and then next week is when we'll do everything we can — leave everything in the pool."

Chirafisi agreed that Saturday was about moving forward and about making progress toward achieving an even bigger goal next week in Waukesha.

"We treat it as a stepping stone. We're one more closer," Chirafisi said. "Our confidence is where it needs to be. We're not cocky going in but we know we have the team, so we just have to go in there knowing we're meant to be there and swim as hard as we can."





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Swimmers take aim at state title

VERONA — The prep work is over.

Now, Middleton's boys swimming and diving team gets to put its training to the ultimate test at Saturday's WIAA Division 1 state meet.

When the Cardinals dip their toes into the pool at the Waukesha South High School Natatorium, they'll do so as the favorites. And with top seeds in three individual events, all three relays and 20 entries overall, Middleton hopes to leave the pool as champions for the second time in program history.

It's a target on their back that they're embracing.

"If we all come prepared and show up - at this point it's a lot mental so I think the way we get there and we win this is everybody's got to move up," senior Nick Chirafisi, the top seed in the 500-yard freestyle (4 minutes, 34.00 seconds) and the No. 2 seed in the 200 free (1:39.38), said following Middleton's first-place showing at last Saturday's sectional meet. "You can't be content with your spot. You've got to want more.

"I think that's how we win. You've got to want more."

Wanting more might be difficult when it comes to the rankings, as Middleton enters as the No. 1 team in the Wisconsin Interscholastic Swim Coaches Association D1 poll.

But the gap has closed considerably. Middleton is in the

driver's seat with 528 points, but Hartland Arrowhead is right behind with 527. A week ago, Middleton had 532 and Arrowhead was chasing with 495.

Arrowhead has 17 entries overall, but only a pair of top seeds, both claimed by senior Lance Johnson (in the 100 breaststroke and 200 individual medlev).

Still, the Cardinals are solely focused on themselves and what they can do to claim gold Saturday. They're not worried about what's going on around the state.

Middleton thinks its best is yet to come, a feeling only reinforced by the results at sectionals.

Senior Jack Madoch won the 50 freestyle in 19.86 seconds, only .05 seconds off the statemeet record of :19.81, to carry the torch but it was a banner day all around.

Middleton's state qualifiers in individual events include:

• Madoch in the 50 free and 100 free (seeded first; 44.52 seconds).

• Chirafisi in the 200 free and 500 free.

• Senior Jack Madigan in the 50 free (21st; 22.15 seconds). • Senior Theo Wolf in the

100 backstroke (seventh; 52.10 seconds) and 100 butterfly (ninth; 51.87 seconds).

• Junior Jackson Esteves in the 200 free (10th; 1:43.60) and 500 free (third; 4:38.73).

• Junior Noah Dorn in the 200 free (22nd; 1:46.65).

• Freshman Max Carter in the 200 IM (18th; 1:58.94) and 100 free (17th; 48.12 seconds).

· Freshman Sam Wolf in the 200 IM (third; 1:52.62) and 100 breaststroke (sixth; 57.00 seconds). • Freshman Caden Van

Buren in the 100 butterfly (10th; 52.03 seconds) and 100 breaststroke (17th: 1:00.06).

• And freshman diver Dane Landretti, who was second in the diving competition.

"There were time drops everywhere, so I thought that was cool," Van Buren said of his team's showing at sectionals. "You feed off that energy and then you just get in and race.

"We had a lot of amazing swims," Madoch added, calling out Esteves in particular. "Pretty much everyone here that swam today had a really good meet. So I think we have lots of confidence going into next week and I think we can take it home."

The three freshmen have been particularly integral to Middleton's success this season, all lending a hand to the state title-contending relays in addition to their own individual efforts.

Sam Wolf joined older brother Theo, as well as Madoch and Chirafisi, on the 400 free relay that claimed the top seed with a school-record time of 3:04.50 at sectionals.

On the winning 200 medley relay (1:33.14) it was the three freshmen along with Theo Wolf, while on the winning 200 free relay (1:25.06) it was Van Buren and Carter joining Madoch and Chirafisi.

Wolf said camaraderie has played a big part in his success

- and he thinks in the success of the team overall, too.

"Having fun with my teammates is a big reason," he said. Toward the end of the season it gets to be a long season at least it feels like it - so I think being out there with my teammates and we're all doing it together is really helpful."

It didn't take long at all for him, or any of the freshmen, to jell with the seniors, either.

"I've been pretty lucky. The amount of input I've had to give into certain specifics to jell hasn't really been necessary," Cardinals coach Weston Lagerhausen said. "Luckily these freshmen have been competing at a high level both in club and in other sports. Their other coaches during the year deserve a lot of praise. I'm really happy with how composed they are in high pressure situations."

That was on full display at sectionals.

"They were super composed and did all the right things with warm-up, cool down, talking to their coaches for advice before their races and still having fun with their teammates and cheering them on," Lagerhausen said. "That breeds more success, especially at higher level meets. So for them to do all of that as freshmen, and have this experience as freshmen, I really look forward to what they'll be able to do in the future. It looks really bright."

The future is now as far as what Middleton hopes to accomplish this season, and the outlook on that is also bright.

Asked to highlight any notable swims at the conclusion of sectionals, Lagerhausen pointed out Van Buren in the butterfly and breaststroke, Theo Wolf's season-best 100 split in

the 400 free relay shortly after going hard in the backstroke and Doren dropping a shade under 3 seconds in the 200 free a week after shaving off 2 seconds at the conference meet.


But then the coach added, "and the list goes on.

"Little things like that speak volumes for everything that we've worked for this season. I look forward to doing the same again next week."

Chirafisi agreed.

The time is now, he said. And the Cardinals are flush with the kind of confidence they need to finish the job.

"Wes is doing a great job setting us up for success," he said. "The timeline's been great training is exactly what it needs to be. We're right where we need to be. We work hard and we're ready to go."



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Seven wrestlers advance to sectionals

Falk leads way with title at 170

DEFOREST — When Bryce Falk sets his mind on accomplishing a goal, nothing will stand in his way.

Last fall, it was navigating his way into the end zone as an all-Big Eight Conference running back. During the winter, it's piling up points on a wrestling mat with the goal of winning a state championship.

A junior co-captain, Falk won the 170-pound championship at the WIAA Division 1 DeForest Regional last Saturday, overcoming his battle with asthma along the way.

That followed up winning the Big Eight Conference title a week earlier at Sun Prairie East High School.

"I have pretty bad asthma in the winter," Falk said. "For me to keep it easy and take breaks throughout the match really helps a lot. That's using the injury time out, to use my inhaler. I usually don't have any major injuries."

Reedsburg won the regional team title with 266 points, while Waunakee was second with 192 points. Both teams advanced to the team sectional, which was held on Tuesday. Sauk Prairie was third with 152 points, while Baraboo (145) and Middleton (123.5) rounded out the top five.

Falk (39-9) was the lone regional champion for the Cardinals, who advanced seven wrestlers to compete at a Division 1 sectional in Waunakee this Saturday.

"It was a good tournament," Middleton coach Joe Miller said. "But it's more of an individual portion of the season now. It's great to get to team state, but that didn't happen for us.

"Next week is now 100% an individual tournament. The goal is to get as many of the seven first or second and get them to the Kohl Center."



was a measure of revenge.

"He beat Bryce last year to go to state," Miller said. "That was the match Bryce got knocked out. He was up with about 30 seconds left, and the kid fell on his head and knocked him out cold. He ended up being DQ'd. To get a little revenge and win the regional final sets him up as the No. 1 seed to go to state. It was a pretty big day for him." Falk agreed.

"The key for me was taking things slower than I usually do," he said. "My asthma is a big factor in that. Just keeping a good pace, breathing when I need to, breathing when I can and just being as physical as I can.

"I have to remember to stay at a good pace. Don't over-



Leading the charge will be Falk, who received a quarterfinal bye and then routed Sauk Prairie senior Alex Katers, earning a 17-3 major decision in the semifinals. Falk then cruised to a 10-4 victory over Devin Judd of Reedsburg Area in the first-place match.

"You've got to love it. Such a gutty performance," Joe Miller said of Falk, who was a sectional qualifier a year ago. "He's had bad asthma attacks for about the last month. We've been trying to regulate and conserve strength.

"That semifinal and finals, those were two really good wrestlers. The kid in the finals, was ranked top-10 in the state and is a returning state qualifier and to gut it out like that was impressive."

For Falk, the win over Judd

Miller said while Falk was the Cardinals' only regional champion, he was impressed that Falk would have plenty of company at sectionals.

"We got seven through to sectionals, that was great. We improved on last year," Joe Miller said. "It's half the team. Certainly, anyone who finished in the top three will be right in the mix next week. The fourth-place kids will obviously have the other regional champ.

"But if they can win their first match, they've got a shot at state. Of our seven, five were third place or better, which means they're absolutely one or two matches away from going to state. I'm pretty happy it sets up real

nice for us next week."

Middleton had two runnerup finishes at regionals in freshmen Sam Zanton at 138 pounds and Finn Grauwels at 145 pounds.

"Out of the seven sectional qualifiers, four of them are freshmen. Unbelievable," Miller said.

Zanton, who missed the Big Eight Conference meet with an injury, was a meettime decision. But he won three of his four matches to continue an impressive debut varsity season.

Zanton (26-9) pinned Sauk Prairie's Torrian Ollie in 32 seconds in the quarterfinals before he was pinned by Reedsburg Area's Colton Herritz in 3:23.

But Zanton bounced back to defeat Mount Horeb/ Barneveld's Brooks Pernot 2-0 in their third-place match. Zanton then secured a 7-2 decision over Waunakee's Gabe Guralski in a wrestleback for second place.

Grauwels (32-13), who placed third at the Big Eight Conference meet, received a bye in the quarterfinals.

But Grauwels earned a 6-3 decision over Waunakee's Gabriel Metzler in the semifinals before his day ended when he was pinned by Reedsburg Area's Drew Purifoy in 41 seconds in their first-place match.

"At 138, he's just a machine," Miller said of Zanton. "He's injured and makes it to second.

"And at 145, it's not a very common freshman weight. To make it to the finals, Finn

Middleton's girls not happy with No. 8 seed Cardinals open playoffs against Sussex Hamilton

Surprise. Disbelief. Shock.

Middleton's girls basketball team felt all of the above when the WIAA Division 1 postseason seeds were released Sunday afternoon.

The Cardinals (13-9) received the No. 8 seed — far lower than they expected and will host ninth-seeded Sussex Hamilton (8-14) in a regional semifinal on Feb. 24. The winner of that game would likely travel to topseeded Brookfield East (21-2) for a regional final on Feb. 25.

"They were upset," said Middleton coach Rashard Griffith, who had gathered his team together for a watch party. "And I think a lot of teams in our conference got bad seeds.

"But I told them, understand that this doesn't matter. The seed is the seed. We're in the playoffs. Now it's time to play the hand we were dealt."

Middleton had won five games in a row and seven of eight before losing at Sun Prairie West, 50-46, on Friday. The Cardinals' recent hot streak allowed them to jump into fourth place in the always tough Big Eight Conference with a 12-6 league mark.

But the computerized seeding system didn't think as highly of Middleton as many others did.

Brookfield East earned the top seed, followed by Hartland Arrowhead (18-4), Verona (19-2), Sun Prairie West (17-4), Oregon (15-7), Waunakee (13-10) Madison La Follette (12-8), Middleton, Sussex Hamilton, Oconomowoc (8-14), Madison East (8-13), Brookfield Central (6-15), Sun Prairie East (8-13), Madison Memorial (7-15), Milwaukee Bradlev Tech (6-11), West Allis Hale (5-17), West Allis Central (5-18) and Madison West (1-19). "Some of the seeds don't make a lot of sense," Griffith said. "I mean, how is Verona the (No.) 3? Our league didn't get a lot of respect and now we all have an opportunity to show we're one of the top leagues and top conferences in the state." The WIAA and Wisconsin Basketball Coaches Association switched to the electronic seeding formula in 2022, in large part to remove human biases. While there is certainly logic to that, the WIAA and WBCA have drawn the wrath of many coaches and fans because they haven't been forthright with just how the seeding formula is determined.

The criteria the formula uses to determine seeds includes:

• Team's win percentage

• Opponents' win percentage

• Defeated opponents' win percentage

• Defeated opponents' opponents win percentage

• Historical conference playoff win percentage

• Historical team playoff win percentage

• Strength of loss game value

• Computer random draw The WIAA and WBCA have refused to say what percentage each category is worth, though. That leaves coaches uncertain whether to schedule powerhouses, lightweights, or something in between.

Middleton believed it was in line for a much higher seed, but instead settled for the No. 8 seed.

The Cardinals are led by Loyola of Chicago recruit Audrey Deptula, who ranks second in the Big Eight in scoring at 25.2 points per game. Deptula has scored at least 30 points seven times this year, including a careerbest 39 points against Madison Memorial on Jan. 14.

While Deptula's terrific year is no surprise, a major reason for the Cardinals' improvement has been the growth of their role players. Senior forward Addy Gmur (8.1 ppg) has had a solid season, while freshman guards Brooke Michelotti (7.4 ppg) and Rowan Borne (5.3 ppg) have made dramatic leaps since November. Others such as forward junior Kenzie Zimmerman (5.4 ppg), senior wing Evin Jordee (5.0 ppg) and junior forward Stevee Kraemer (4.8) have made substantial jumps, as well.

"Honestly, the girls all knew how to play basketball," Griffith said. "It was just them having confidence in themselves and believing they can do some good things. They've gotten better and better and now they have a chance to show it."

Middleton's first chance to "show it" will be against a Sussex Hamilton team that's

struggled mightily down the stretch.

After a 5-3 start to the year, the Chargers are just 3-11 since. Hamilton lost five straight games recently and has dropped seven of eight overall.

The Chargers were one of the top programs in the Milwaukee-area from 2009-2020 under former head coaches Dan Carey and Bill Scasny. Hamilton went 187-77 in that time (.708), won four Greater Metro Conference titles and finished in the top-three of the league for 11 straight years.

Scasny retired after the 2020 season, though, and the program has fallen on hard times under current coach Craig Machut.

Machut is just 26-42 during his three years at Hamilton, a

dismal .382 winning percentage. And all three of Machut's

teams have had sub-.500 records.

Middleton hopes that works in its favor when the teams meet on Feb. 24.

"I think we have a golden opportunity to show who we are," Griffith said. "We didn't like the seeding, but there's nothing we can do about it anymore.

"Right now, it's time to start getting ready for the first game of the playoffs. And hopefully we'll get a date with the No. 1 seed after we play Hamilton."

• Sun Prairie West 50, Middleton 46 — The Cardinals fell to the host Wolves on Feb. 10.

Senior wing Audrey Deptula led Middleton with 20 points.

Sun Prairie's Antionique Auston led all scorers with 23 points.

Middleton led, 24-22, at halftime and 39-30 midway through the second half, but couldn't hang on.

When the teams met earlier this season in Middleton, Sun Prairie West notched a 77-55 win. "We're a much better team than back then," Griffith said. "The girls keep getting better and better."

Playoff magic?

Hockey Cards hoping to get hot this postseason

Middleton's hockey team is headed to the postseason with a full head of steam.

The Cardinals rallied from an early 2-0 deficit and defeated host Sun Prairie, 4-3, on Feb. 11.

Middleton finished the regular season 16-8 overall and in sole possession of second place in the Big Eight Conference at 9-3.

All of Middleton's losses came against teams with winning records, a group that combined to go 132-52-4 (.713). In addition, seven of those losses were by just one goal.

"We played a really tough schedule to get us ready for the postseason," said Middleton coach Dan Truehl, whose trying to lead the Cardinals to their first state appearance since 2011. "I wouldn't do anything different. Now, we hope it pays off."

That's what the Cardinals will find out beginning this week.

Middleton is the No. 3 seed in its sectional, which gave the Cardinals a first round bye. Middleton hosts either sixth-seeded Waunakee or 11th-seeded Onalaska in a regional final on Thursday at 7:30 p.m.

The top three teams in the 13-team sectional received opening round byes. If seeds hold, Middleton would face sixth-seeded Waunakee in the regional finals, then travel to second-seeded Edgewood for a sectional semifinal on Feb. 21.

The sectional finals are in Sun Prairie, where a date with Verona would likely await on

Trailing, 2-0, in the second period, Middleton's Charlie Jambor scored a power play goal at the 10:31 mark on assists from Brady Engelkes and Ethan Lam. Then at the 16:10 mark, Middleton evened things, 2-2, when Lam had a power play goal on assists from Engelkes and Drew Sjowall.

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Middleton rallies past Beloit

BELOIT - Middleton sophomore center Will Garlock looked at the scoreboard last Saturday afternoon.

The clock showed just under 12 minutes. The mighty Cardinals - ranked No. 2 in the latest WIAA Division 1 state poll - trailed host Beloit Memorial, 56-45.

And admittedly, Garlock was worried.

"Yeah, it wasn't looking real good," Garlock said. "But we kept fighting."

Boy, did they ever.

Middleton played some of its best basketball of the season, embarked on an 19-3 run and ral-lied for a thrilling 69-63 win at historic Barkin Arena. The Cardinals improved to 18-1 overall, 15-1 in the Big Eight Conference and are just one win away from clinching at least a share of the league title.

The Purple Knights, one of the most improved teams in the state since November, fell to 4-15, 2-14.

"They're clearly an upper tier team in the league in terms of talent," Middleton coach Kevin Bavery said of Beloit. "So we knew it wasn't going to be easy."

The 6-foot-10 Garlock, who seemingly improves by the week, led Middleton with 19 points and added seven rebounds. Jack-of-all-trades Kaden Fosdick had 12 points, six assists, two steals and a monstrous dunk that sealed the win late.

Senior point guard Gavyn Hurley battled through a rough shooting game and finished with 11 points, five rebounds, four assists and two steals. Senior sharpshooter Will Comerford had 11 points and senior forward Owen Cooney had six of his 10 points during the Cardinals' late run.

Middleton's starting five of Hurley, Comerford, Fosdick, Cooney and Garlock were on the floor for the majority of the Cardinals' late run. And each player had huge moments during Middleton's rally.

"That five we had on the floor, I think all of us were pretty huge during that run," Hurley said.

They were. But the fact Midleton needed a late run was

The Cardinals' 6-foot-6 forward scored on three straight possessions - knocking down a pair of 5-footers and converting a lay-up after a nifty feed from Hurley - to give Middleton a 60-59 lead, its first advantage since the opening moments of the second half.

"I was just trying to post up hard and I got a few to go in," Coonev said.

Added Bavery: "That's his game in there. He struggled a little bit early, but really came up big when we needed him."

The run continued when Fosdick dropped a 7-footer and Hurley got loose for a back door layup to make it 64-59 with 2:40 left.

Beloit pulled within three with 2 minutes left, then Fosfour with 17 seconds left. But that was the closest the Purple Knights came.





certainly surprising.

Beloit trailed just 35-34 at halftime. Then the Purple Knights opened the second half on a 22-10 burst to take a 56-45 lead with 11 minutes, 45 seconds left.

Beloit senior standout Rico Yarbrough put the Purple Knights on his back. Yarbrough had 17 first half points, then had 10 more during the Knights' second half surge and as Beloit raced to an 11-point lead.

'We made a nice run and were up 11 and I look up and see there's still all that time left," Beloit coach Todd Marks said. "You wish it would have been at the 5-minute mark because you just know they are going to crank up the pressure."

They did.

The first thing that keyed Middleton's comeback was it finally slowed Yarbrough down. an 8-minute stretch. Beloit also shot 1-of-10 from the floor during that period and had four turnovers.

"I mean, yeah, it wasn't looking good," Cooney said. "But I'm really confident with our guys and my teammates and just getting the job done. And that's what we did at the end."

Middleton's run started when Comerford drilled a 3-pointer from the Rock River that pulled the Cardinals within 56-48 with 10:30 remaining. Just 30 seconds later, Hurley had a steal and lay-up and Beloit quickly called a timeout.

"They're the No. 2 team in the state and you know they're going to come after you," Marks said.

They didn't stop.

A Garlock lay-up made it 56-52 with 9:10 left. And after a 3-pointer by Beloit's Christian

dick seemed to extinguish whatever re-maining life the Purple Knights had left.

The wirv, 6-foot-6 Fosdick curled across the top of the key, drove the left side of the lane and threw down a hammer dunk that gave Middleton a 66-61 lead. The play was reminiscent of Fosdick's dunk at Hartland Arrowhead last year in a regional final.

"Where does that come out of?" Garlock wondered. Bavery knew.

"He's as unselfish as you can possibly be," Bavery said of Fosdick. "He turns down open shots consistently to get other people shots. He rebounds both ends. He's willing to guard anybody and he does guard everybody at some point. He just frickin' brings energy and lifts everybody up."

Beloit crept back within

"Our offense wasn't the problem," Bavery said. "We'll take 35 points in a half. We just couldn't get a stop."

"When they're so worried about keeping us quiet, it makes you wonder what they're hiding?" the source continued. "And are they just trying to protect their own [tails]?"

Both ADs were big on communication, treated people fairly and with respect, and didn't use fear as a motivator. That appears to have changed with Sims & Co.

"The stuff going on now would have never happened with Bob and Luke," another source in the district said. "I can tell you, people aren't happy. We're going to lose a lot of good coaches if they keep

in addition to these salaries.

Despite having a bloated department, many agree that communication is dramatically worse today and more things have fallen through the cracks than ever before.

"There's just too many cooks in the kitchen," one source said.

For example, Middleton's boys basketball team did several hours of fundraising so they could afford a coach bus for a recent four-hour trip to northern Wisconsin to play in the prestigious 'Battle of the Border.' To the basketball Cardinals, this was their Super Bowl.

Instead, the paperwork was never submitted and Middleton's players and coaches spent more than eight hours round trip on a yellow school bus.

"It's sloppy," one source said of the department. "And things move slower than they used to

Jamie around. Heck, we already have."

Both Francois and Joers operated one-person departments and each had a secretary.

Francois, who was also an Associate Principal, was a man ahead of his time, a gifted problem solver who brought groups of people together. He left in July, 2011 to become the Superintendent at Mineral Point and is the Superintendent at Waterford today.

His departure is still being felt more than a decade later.

Joers was Middleton's athletic director from 1995-2004, left to run his own business, then stepped back into the job when Francois moved on. Joers was a man of the people and was a staple at events — no matter how big or small.

athletics, died on May 15, 2020 of pancreatic cancer. Things haven't been the same since.

Sims was hired in June of 2020, Ben White was named associate athletic director and Mindy Ripp was hired as the athletic assistant. It marked the first time Middleton had a three-person department — two athletic directors, as well as an athletic assistant.

White, Middleton's longtime boys volleyball coach and a trusted confidant of Joers, knew the inner workings of MHS and seemed like a natural choice for the A.D. job. But after settling for second place, White eventually went looking for greener pastures and resigned after 18 months.

Ripp lasted one month less than White in a department that was beginning to trend downward. Sims replaced them with Crandall and McCall.

Several coaches said they didn't trust Crandall, and two called him the "Mr. Smithers" of the department in reference to "The Simpsons" character. McCall is widely seen as intrusive, and someone who continually oversteps boundaries.

Sims himself was set to jump ship and accepted a principal position at Sun Prairie West in March, 2022. But the Middleton-Cross Plains School District gave Sims a substantial raise to stay in a job he had held for just 21 months.

The logic of that is currently questionable, at best.

Most athletic departments across Wisconsin have one single A.D. There is no associate. Roughly half of the state's athletic directors have an athletic assistant.

Middleton has a threeheaded monster with the largest payroll of any athletic department in Wisconsin. Sims leads the way with a hefty contract of \$125,640, while Crandall earns \$89,291.30 and McCall makes \$48,318.40.

They receive various benefits

because you have people getting in each other's way now." What has many coaches more upset than anything,

though, is an athletic department that's tried solving a bullying issue by becoming bullies themselves.

As Alanis Morissette once sang, "Isn't It Ironic?"

Just 10 months ago, Sims resigned his position as A.D., had one foot out the door, cashed in on a hefty pay raise and told the Times-Tribune: "What's been great is 100 percent of the coaches, 100 percent of the community members that I've heard from have told me they're happy I'm staying."

Today, those opinions have changed.

And many wish Sims would have kept walking when he had the chance.

losses and is always looking to the next day."

Lesar, who coached with Bavery in Oregon and is on the Cardinals' current staff, agreed with Raffel.

"As a coach, he has all the qualities you look for in a leader," Lesar said of Bavery. "He's hum-ble, gracious, a relentless competitor, but grounded in the things that really matter when the game and seasons are over.

"Lifelong lessons of what it means to be a good teammate and accepting responsibility when life gets a little tough. Overall, he's been a great mentor of kindness, which is one of the greatest attributes any person can pass along."

Bavery got his start as the sophomore coach at Watertown High School in 1982-'83 under the leg-endary Eli Crogan, who went into the Hall of Fame himself in 1996.

Bavery went to Oregon High School in 1985 and spent five years coaching the lower levels there, then was named the Panthers' head coach in 1991-'92. Bavery went 184-107 with Oregon over the next 13 seasons, and led the Panthers to the WIAA Division 2 state tournament in 2000.

"We've put in a lot of hard work throughout the year," he said. "A lot of our guys are new. It's pretty cool to see them work and get rewarded for it and go to sectionals."

Joe Miller said the future does indeed look bright for the youthful Cardinals' program,.

"We had four freshman advance and a sophomore at 126 and a sophomore at 152 and a junior at 170, they will all be back," Joe Miller said. "The future is very, very bright. We also had three fifth-place finishers, who were all sophomores. I couldn't be happier with the team."

Middleton will have an additional three wrestlers competing next week at Waunakee when sectional competition will be held for the second annual WIAA girls' individual state tournament.

"When you factor in that we will have three girls wrestle next week, we will have 10 at sectionals," Joe Miller said. "Jessica (Bristol) is at 132, Mattie (Papenthien) at 138 and Katrina (Clark) at 170. All three of them could go to state.

"Combined, I don't know the last time Middleton has had 10 kids at sectionals. It will be busy and fun day."
