Stoughton secures spot in Badger East title game

Vikings use balance attack to take down Silver Eagles

Stoughton is headed to the Badger East Conference championship.

The Vikings claimed their spot in the conference title game after a 74-54 Badger East win

over Monona Grove on Tuesday, Feb. 14, at Monona Grove High School.

Stoughton (17-6, 10-4 Badger East) – ranked 10th in the Division 2 WisSports.net Coaches poll – will play Northeast Division winner Waunakee in the Badger East championship game on Thursday, Feb. 23, in Waunakee. The Warriors defeated the Vikings 71-67 on Feb. 10.

Stoughton is searching for

its first conference title since the 2019-2020 season when the Vikings won the Badger South.

“I think it’s going to be really fun to play in a true conference championship game,” Stoughton head coach Nolan Weber said. “That doesn’t happen too often. They’re a good team that beat us the first time. I know our kids will be excited.”

Stoughton sends five wrestlers to Division 1 state meet

Five grapplers for the Stoughton wrestling team are still chasing a gold medal after their performances at the WIAA Division 1 Waunakee sectional vaulted them to the state tournament at the Kohl Center.

“It means a lot and not many guys get to do it,” said Griffin Empey, a North Dakota State University football commit. “The goal is always higher than just making it there. It’s kind of an expectation I set for myself and the coaches set for

myself.”

The boys wrestling sectional champions who qualified for state on Saturday, Feb. 18, in Waunakee are senior Chance Suddeth at 132 pounds, junior Cole Sarbacker (145), junior Beckett Spilde (220) and Empey (heavyweight). Senior Claire Spilde qualified for the girls state tournament after winning a sectional title at 126 pounds.

“We are pleased we have a group of five going on to the state tournament,” Stoughton co-coach Dan Spilde said. “Going into state, our goal is to come out with five medals. We won’t have any No. 1 seeds. We will be the underdog in every single

weight class.”

Stoughton had 13 wrestlers in the sectional and seven earned top-four finishes. Junior Ethan Soderbloom (152) and freshman Gatlin Empey (170) both took third place. The top two finishers in each weight class advance to state.

“Sectionals is always bitter-sweet,” Dan Spilde said.

He said there are wrestlers who didn't perform up to their standards because of injury or illness and came short of qualifying for state.

Two thrilling matches that went down to the wire included Griffin Empey – ranked second in the Division 1 Wisconsin Grappler state rankings – and Beckett Spilde – ranked sixth at 220.

Entering the third period, Empey led third-ranked Madison La Follette senior Jackson Mankowski 1-0. Mankowski – a state champion at 220 pounds last year – scored on a reversal with about a minute left to take a 2-1 lead. Empey then turned the tables and pulled off a reversal late in the third period to clip Mankowski 3-2.

It marks the third time this season that Empey has defeated Mankowski.

“It was a great high-level high school match,” Dan Spilde said.

Empey opened the sectional by pinning Reedsburg's Isaac Henke in 51 seconds. In a semifinal match, he beat Waunakee's Jackson Lenzen-dorf by fall in 1:34.

Beckett Spilde (46-6) at 220 scored on an escape in the second period and then rode out Reedsburg's Jesus Gonzalez for a 1-0 victory in the title match.

“Both wrestlers were good with their defense and lower half,” Dan Spilde said. “I think Beckett wrestled an extremely smart match and that gives him momentum going into the state tournament.”

It marks the third time this season that Beckett Spilde has knocked off Gonzalez. He defeated him in an ultimate tiebreaker in overtime in a semifinal in the Badger Conference Tournament. Then, he beat Gonzalez 3-0 in a regional match.

Beckett Spilde opened the sectional by pinning Waunakee's Tyler Endres in 1:39. To reach the title match,

he pinned Mount Horeb/Barneveld's Garrett Waefler in 1:33 in a semifinal match.

Both Suddeth (132) and Sarbacker (145) breezed through in making a return to state. Suddeth (48-4) – ranked fourth – defeated Parker Olson of Sun Prairie United 9-2 in a title match. He opened the sectional, rolling by Middleton's Aiden Dowd in a technical fall in 2:52, 15-0. Suddeth then defeated Madison La Follette's Irie Jackson 7-1 in a semifinal match.

Sarbacker (45-7) – ranked sixth – won all three of his matches to return to state for the third straight year. He defeated Oregon senior Brandon Liddle 8-2 in the championship match. Sarbacker dominated his first match, pinning Sauk Prairie's Austin Lankey in 56 seconds. In a semifinal match, he defeated Madison East's Mikel Myadze 7-2.

Claire Spilde didn't have to wrestle a match at the sectional in her weight class to reach state.

Soderbloom, who was battling an illness, took third. He finished the season 38-11. Gatlin Empey (170) also took third.

Soderbloom went 2-1. He opened the sectional with a pin against Mount Horeb/Barneveld's Ryan Errthum in 5:23. In a semifinal match, Madison West's Damiano Cappellini defeated him 7-3. Soderbloom bounced back and knocked off Madison East's Braxton Weisenburger in a major decision 9-0 in a third-place match.

Gatlin Empey went 2-2 and finished the season at 23-25 in his first season of high school wrestling. Reedsburg's Devin Judd defeated him 6-2 in a second-place match. Gatlin Empey won his first two matches to reach the title match. He edged Sauk Prairie's Alex Katers 2-1 in his first match. He then pinned Waunakee's Joe Kaney in 2:44 in a semifinal match. Middleton's Bryce Falk pinned Gatlin Empey in 2:32 in the championship match.

Freshman Danil Kostetskiy placed fourth at 160. In a first-round match, Kostetskiy pinned Madison Memorial's Ben Morrison-Phillips in 4:25. Reedsburg's Peyton Fry then clipped him 3-0 in a semifinal match. Sauk Prairie's Brason Ballweg then beat Kostetskiy by a fall in 40 seconds in a

third-place match.

Stoughton's Gabe Schneider (106), Lukas Hartberg (113), Victor Rivera (126), Will Hollister (138), Joe Wahlin (182), Kaeson Salonek (195) each lost first-round matches to finish the season.

Wahlin, who entered the season with no previous wrestling experience, qualified for the sectional at 182 and finished the season 8-13.

“I did not think I would get here,” Wahlin said. “It's a pretty big surprise. I came in here just thinking to do it because it would benefit me for football. It turns out I'm somewhat good at it.”

He said learning some of the moves was natural because it's similar to the skills he uses in football.

Wahlin plans to build on his wrestling foundation next season.

“I will definitely wrestle my senior year,” he said.

State preview

For three years Claire Spilde served as the Stoughton wrestling team's manager. That's until this year when she traded in a clipboard for head gear.

Spilde (9-2) – ranked ninth at 126 pounds – is the Vikings' first ever girls WIAA state tournament qualifier. The WIAA sponsored a girls state wrestling tournament for the first time ever last season and it was open to all girls. This season, girls had to qualify for state at the sectional like boys wrestlers.

“She wanted to come in and put her wrestling shoes on and give it a shot,” Dan Spilde said. “We want to build that

(girls wrestling program).”

Two signature wins for Claire Spilde this year are an 11-0 win over Neenah's Kylee Kurszewski, who at the time was ranked seventh, and a 4-1 victory over Amelia Adams of La Crosse Logan/Central, who at the time was ranked 10th.

Dan Spilde said one drawback for Claire is that she hasn't wrestled as many matches as other qualifiers this season and since she didn't wrestle last season, her criteria and resume for seeding is smaller.

“She will have it tough in the seeding and will have to earn her way,” he said. “She will be an underdog. Hopefully, she can prove some people wrong.”

While Claire Spilde will be looking to take in the moment in her first state tournament as a prep wrestler, four other Stoughton wrestlers are looking to medal. Griffin Empey has finished as the Division 1 state runner-up at heavyweight the last two years.

Empey is just the third four-time state qualifier in the history of the program. He joins Nicolai Rivera, a three-time state champion and Ron Pieper. Empey lost in the state title match to River Falls' Vito Massa 4-2 last year. Two years ago, he lost in the 220-pound state title match to Ashwaubenon's Nathan Moynihan, 2-1.

Suddeth took third at state at 120 last season.

Sarbacker went 2-2 at state last season and is looking to improve after getting knocked out in the second round in the consolation bracket after a quarterfinal loss.

Fernholz joins the 1,000-point club

Junior guard averaging 20.7 points per game, second in the state in made 3-pointers

On a day that celebrates love, it's only fitting that a player that loves the game of basketball as much as Ty Fernholz was honored.

The junior guard joined Stoughton's 1,000-point club during a 74-54 win over Monona Grove on Tuesday, Feb. 14.

Stoughton head coach Nolan Weber called Fernholz a special player.

"I haven't coached anybody who can put the ball in the basket the way he does," Weber said. "He has a knack for it. The amount of hours this kid has put into basketball to get to where he is – you wouldn't believe it."

Fernholz entered the game with 990 points. He scored his 11th point of the game off a 3-pointer with just over a minute left in the first half to eclipse the 1,000th-point milestone. Fernholz celebrated with a large Stoughton contingent after the game.

"As a kid growing up, I was the youngest brother in my family," Fernholz said. "I went to a lot of high school basketball games. Never really became a thought of mine until around the eighth grade. I had all these goals I wanted to accomplish and that (1,000 points) was one of them. It's a dream come true, it's awesome. It feels kind of surreal right now."

Family first

Fernholz's family played a big part in the accomplishment

– specifically his father. Fernholz – who has a Division II scholarship offer from Michigan Tech – said he and his dad spent many hours in the gym over the years.

"Me and my dad, we get gym time and he runs me through footwork – he spends many hours watching videos on different types of footwork I can work on," Fernholz said. "We just spend hours in the gym perfecting it. Can't thank that man enough. He's really helped me through the years."

Fernholz also played two seasons with his older brother Luke.

"He's always been my mentor, my role model," Fernholz said. "We've always been close, we're close in age. Playing with him last year was also a dream come true."

Stoughton's sniper

Fernholz has been the premier 3-pointer shooter in Division 2 and one of the best in the state this season. Fernholz sits second in the state in made 3-pointers with 96, according to the WisSports.net database. His 96 3-pointers is the most in the state by a Division 2 player – by 22 makes.

"It's pretty amazing," Weber said. "To make over four 3s a game with the amount of pressure teams put on him – sometimes I don't know how he does it."

Everything earned

Fernholz – listed at 6-foot-2 – is averaging 20.7 points per game and is shooting 45.3% from beyond the arc.

He's scored in double digits in 22 of 23 games this season and has scored 29 or more points four times this year.

"It's really special for him because he earns all of it," Weber

said. "He's not a freak athlete going and getting dunks or anything. He has to work his tail off for everything he gets."

Postseason prospects

With Fernholz leading the way, Stoughton looks to be in prime position to make some noise in the upcoming Division 2 tournament – which will start Feb. 28.

"We have to keep in our minds that we can do this, we've done it all year," Fernholz said. "We're one of the teams to beat. We just have to have that mentality."

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Basketball: Vikings beat Fort Atkinson, but defeated by Newman Catholic

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2 seed in the WIAA Division 2 tournament and will host the winner of No. 7 DeForest and No. 10 Fort Atkinson in a regional tilt on Friday, March 3.

Junior guard Ty Fernholz scored 18 points to lead Stoughton past Monona Grove. He also reached the 1,000-point milestone with a 3-pointer with just over a minute left in the first half.

The Vikings never trailed in the game. Back-to-back 3-pointers from junior guard Sawyer Schipper gave Stoughton an 11-5 lead with 13 minutes, 23 seconds left in the first half. Sophomore wing LeShawn Brown had putbacks on consecutive offensive possessions to extend the Vikings' advantage to 22-15 with 9:52 until halftime.

With 6:25 left in the first, an offensive rebound by senior forward Michael Turner led to a Fernholz 3-pointer to give Stoughton its first double-digit lead at 28-17.

The Vikings led by as much as 30-17, but an 8-0 Silver Eagle spurt cut the lead down to 30-25. Another Brown putback stopped the run with just under three minutes until halftime. That score was followed up with a layup from Brown to give the Vikings some breathing room at 34-25.

Brown – along with Turner, junior forward Ben Harman and sophomore forward Carter Sullivan controlled the offensive glass to give Stoughton extra possessions throughout the night.

"That was huge for us," Weber said. "We talked about how we thought they were susceptible

to giving up offensive rebounds, but they also transition well. I thought our kids did a good combination of going and getting it on the offensive glass, but still getting back well enough to take away their transition."

Fernholz scored his 11th point

of the half and his 1,001th of his high school career when he made a 3-pointer with 1:02 left in the first half. Stoughton took a 37-30 lead into the break.

The Vikings raced off to a 6-1 run – capped by a Fernholz turnaround – to take a 43-31 lead to

start the second half. Monona Grove cut Stoughton's lead down to single digits at 49-40 with just under 11 minutes to play – but an offensive rebound from Sullivan led to a 3-pointer from senior guard Mason Marggi to make it 52-40.

"We've done this a few times where things don't go perfectly for us, but I felt like every time we needed a play, we made one," Weber said. "It wasn't always pretty."

Schipper scored 12 points, while Sullivan also broke double digits with 10 points. Harman and Marggi both had nine points, while Brown chipped in eight points.

"I thought our balance was good," Weber said.

"We haven't always had that this year. It's nice when we have balance."

Stoughton 59, Fort Atkinson 53

Stoughton overcame a six-point halftime deficit to earn a Badger Conference East win over the Blackhawks on Friday, Feb. 17, at Stoughton High School.

Fernholz led the way with 20 points, while freshman guard Jacob Hibner netted 15 points. Schipper added 11 points.

Newman Catholic 58, Stoughton 55

The Vikings nearly rallied to win a nonconference game against Newman Catholic on Saturday, Feb. 18, at Stoughton High School.

Stoughton trailed 36-21 at the half, but outscored Catholic 31-16 to send the game to overtime. The Vikings were outpaced 6-3 in the overtime period. Fernholz scored 18 points off six 3-pointers. Harman added 13 points.

– appearing in the state finals seven times.

Stoughton defeated Badger East Conference foe Waunakee 49-22 in the semifinal, while Reedsburg – the defending Badger Conference and Badger West champions – rolled by Sun Prairie United 57-19 in its semifinal.

Reedsburg 48, Stoughton 27

The first five matches of the dual all featured pins with Stoughton earning three of them to take an 18-12 lead. Stoughton's Chance Suddeth (132) tied the dual at 6-6 with a 50-second pin against Brogan

Mittlesteadt.

After a Reedsburg pin at 138, the Vikings got consecutive pins from Cole Sarbacker (145) and Danil Kostetskyi (152) to take an 18-12 advantage.

The Beavers reeled off four straight wins – including a pair of pins at 182 and 195. Stoughton's Ethan Soderbloom lost a 3-1 decision to Peyton Fry – ranked No. 10 in Division 1 at 160 by Wisconsin Grappler – in the 152 bout.

Reedsburg's four straight wins from 160 to 195 gave the Beavers a 30-18 lead. Stoughton's Beckett Spilde beat Reedsburg's Jesus Gonzalez for the second time in three

weeks with a 3-0 decision.

Spilde – ranked No. 6 at 220 – also defeated Gonzalez – ranked No. 7 – at the Badger Conference meet.

Spilde's win was followed by a 51-second pin from Griffin Empey at 285 – who is ranked No. 2 in the weight class. That cut the Beaver lead to 30-27.

Reedsburg closed out the dual with three pins at 106, 113 and 120.

Stoughton 49, Waunakee 22

The Vikings edged the Warriors 33-30 in a dual meet earlier this season, but the rematch wasn't nearly as close

in the sectional semifinals.

Stoughton captured seven of the first eight matches to race out to a 31-5 lead. Claire Spilde got the Vikings on the board at 120 with an 8-3 win over Payton Schutz.

After a Waunakee forfeit at 126, Suddeth – ranked No. 3 at 132 – found a pin late in the first period (1:53) against Coltan Nechvatal.

Waunakee won at 138, but Stoughton responded with a Sarbacker pin (3:37) against Gabriel Metzler at 145.

Soderbloom (152) picked up a 12-4 major decision, while Kostetskyi (160) and Gatlin Empey (170) won via 8-2 and 7-2 decisions, respectively.
