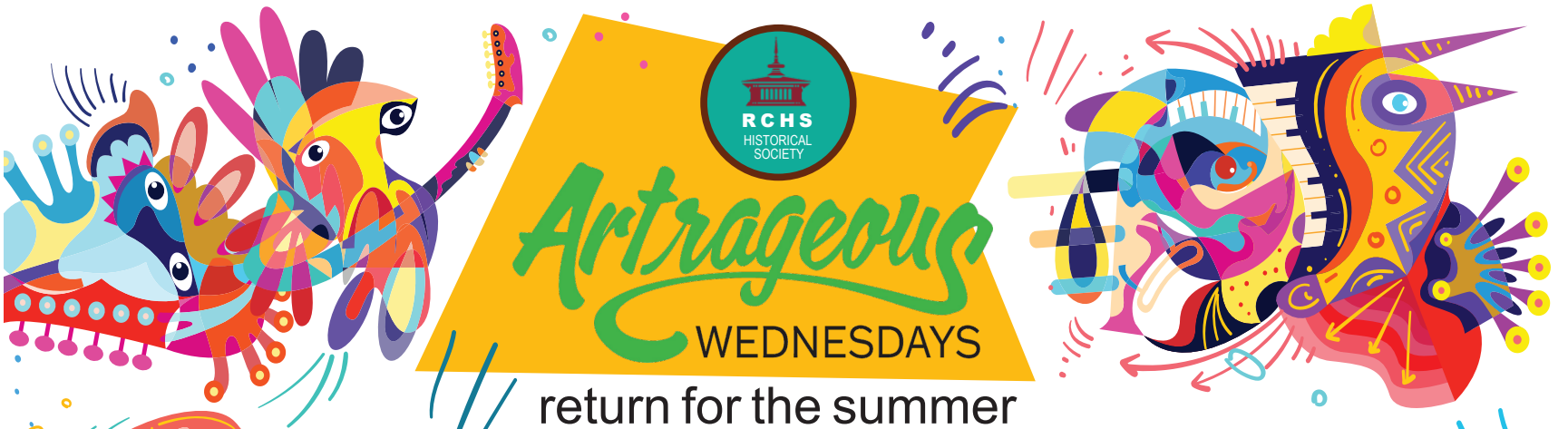

The middle of the week is about to become more lively and colorful due to the return of Rock County Historical Society's "Artrageous Wednesdays" this June. This event goes from 5-8 p.m. every Wednesday between June 21 and August 2, and held outdoors in the Tallman Carriage House, 450 N Jackson St, in Janesville and the RCHS grounds.

"Artrageous Wednesdays" feature art from local artists, live music, food trucks, and children's activities. Attendees may bring tables and chairs, and can use the available

picnic tables to eat.

The art series is on its fourth year, making it a fairly new addition to Rock County Historical Society's calendar.

It was created in 2019 because local and regional artists didn't have a way to feature or sell their art during the COVID-19 pandemic. This resulted in depression among the artists, which made it more difficult for them to keep creating.

"Artrageous Wednesdays are evenings designed for community members to stop in, visit local artists, hear live music, and enjoy a summer evening on RCHS' beautiful grounds," said Executive Director Tim Maahs in the

official press release. "We are pleased to be partnering with local organizations, artists, and musicians to make these events inclusive and diverse." "Artrageous Wednesdays" promotes a limited number of artists per event on purpose, so the featured artists can receive individualized attention and showcase their work.

The featured artists and food choices will be announced the week of each event by the Rock County Historical Society's Facebook page. Also available on the RCHS official Facebook page is a list of all the musical acts booked for upcoming weeks, including Jeremiah Fox & the Odd Company, Joymaker, Lunch Money, and

more.

The sponsors for "Artrageous Wednesdays" are Blackhawk Community Credit Union, Janesville Performing Arts Center (JPAC), McCann Floors, Diana Shadel, Tom and Arra Lasse, and Glen and Grace Disrude.

The Rock County Historical Society invites the public to experience good food and good art, as well as familiarize themselves with the beauty of their grounds.

"Give us an opportunity to show you a nice, relaxing Wednesday afternoon," Maahs said. "Bring your appetite and experience some local art that you can hang in your house or in your garden."

## Book Review:

### 'Owlsh' is a contemporary fable that feels like a vivid dream

As many of us learned in childhood, fables are simply short tales meant to teach moral lessons, often with animals or inanimate objects as characters. Dorothy Tse's entrancing and otherworldly debut novel "Owlsh" is a subversive, contemporary fable for adults.

She takes the familiar sub-genre of the campus novel — complete with a middle-aged literature professor/protagonist full of "self-recriminations over how he had ended up reduced to this, a hack teacher in a debased, culture-less little city" — and infuses it with new life by way of surreal touches.

Tse sets her story in Nevers, a semi-imaginary version of contemporary Hong Kong,

"built up by the kingdom of Valeria and ruled by her for over a hundred years," a place "where skyscrapers thrust upwards like lethal weapons." Like the formerly colonial Nevers, the main character, Professor Q feels past his prime. Rarely allowing himself a moment of passion, he goes through the motions of teaching classes and sitting in meetings. Yet "in his heart of hearts, he felt it was not really him participating," but "rather a suit-wearing, tie-sporting, flesh-and-blood-mannequin version of himself."

Even though his wife Maria is perfect, with a high-ranking civil servant job, the two of them fail to truly connect.

The one pastime that makes Q feel alive is collecting antique dolls. It's little wonder, then, that he falls for Aliss,

a music-box ballerina come to life whose body is "softer than that of any 'real' woman he had ever encountered." A kind of erotically desirable Pinocchio at first, unformed and seeming to fill a void in Professor Q's life, Aliss develops a mind of her own, and Professor Q, oblivious to the unrest in the city around him, begins to take increasingly absurd risks.

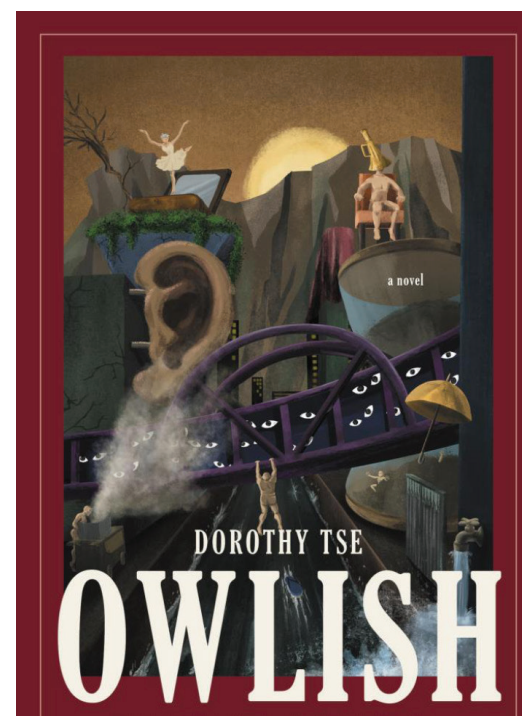
The title character, his odd friend Owlsh, is not an owl exactly, but a being with "a pair of long, slender, birdlike eyes, a mouth that was widening into a grin, and a pile of messy hair" who eggs on the Professor in his romantic misadventures.

Natascha Bruce, who translated the novel from the Chinese, captures Tse's subtle details and off-kilter humor, as when Q thinks of a sweater

from Maria: "It had called to mind a carefully arranged, cellophane-wrapped, odourless dog turd."

As engrossing as a dream, the novel uses the literal and metaphorical associations of waking and sleeping to explore the efficacy of political awareness. In her afterword, Tse writes of how, during the 2014 Occupy Movement, protesters chanted to get Hong Kong to "wake up" and, in 2019, 2 million people took to the streets.

Was that, she wonders, "because they had woken up?" even though "more and more often you hear that protesters are 'dreaming.'" A protest fable that reveals many human truths, Tse's "Owlsh" poses questions of desire and freedom under a punishing regime. The story lingers like a vivid dream bleeding into conscious life.

## Movie Review: 'SPIDER-MAN: ACROSS THE SPIDER-VERSE' IS A STONE-COLD CLASSIC

What happens when a superhero gets grounded? In "Spider-Man: Across the Spider-Verse," that superhero does the things most teenagers might do: whines that his misstep wasn't his fault, retreats to his bedroom to listen to an emo James Blake song on his headphones — and then climbs out of his window to join a friend. The difference, of course, is that Miles Morales/Spider-Man is a crucial part of saving the world in the spectacular "Across the Spider-Verse." As in any superhero movie, there's

a villain (the Spot, voiced by Jason Schwartzman) with evil plans. Using his ability to slip into alternate universes, the Spot is creating trouble that causes arachnerd Miles and a diverse group of fellow Spideys — including, this time, one who uses a wheelchair and another who may be nonbinary — to activate a secret network of world-savers. If you've developed Superhero Fatigue Syndrome, the sequel to "Into the Spider-Verse" may be the cure. The plot barely matters because the movie has so much fun dishing out new Spideys, almost like a skilled comedian improv-ing

jokes. Some favorites are Spider-Man India (Karan Soni), who thinks he's a lot cooler than his parents do, Issa Rae's tough-talking (and pregnant) Spider-Woman and Daniel Kaluuya's hilarious Spider-Punk. The latter is as cool as he thinks he is, with huge dreads, a penchant for rhyming cockney slang and a look derived from British graphic design of the late 1970s. Visually, "Across the Spider-Verse" is an anarchic astonishment. As Miles slips into alternate universes, the appearance of the film evolves. One minute, it resembles an Impressionist painting, then

a stylized comic book, then a Sex Pistols album cover, then a Legos sculpture, then photo-realism, then a Roy Lichtenstein painting. Not that you'd want to but I suspect you could turn off the sound and simply delight in the beauty of this inventive film. Please don't, though, because there's also a different style of humor in each universe and because you'd miss the heart of the movie, which is Miles' relatable story, given depth and soul by Shameik Moore's lovely voice acting. Miles has all the teenager things — there's a sharply conceived sequence in which Miles gradually inches

his hand closer to would-be girlfriend Gwen Stacy's (Hailee Steinfeld), only to pull it back when the conversation takes a turn. But he also grapples with the loneliness that comes from not being able to tell anyone, including his folks, who he is. Most superhero movies have moments in which it's argued that the protagonists are not that different from the rest of us but this one starts with a kid who seems real, then complicates his life with the heroic stuff. As Stacy's narration indicates at the beginning of the film, "He hasn't always had it easy. And he's not the only one." So, if you're scoring along

at home, "Across the Spider-Verse" is a sweet story of parents and children (Miles' mom, voiced by Luna Lauren Velez, gives great pep talk), a believable romance, an accounting of adolescent woes and a grand adventure. Like "Into the Spider-Verse," it's also a bold technical leap that feels like it expands the storytelling and visual possibilities of animation. In short, it's a classic. No spoilers but I'll say that the ending does something I really do not like and, in this case, I didn't care one bit.

## the 4 DISHES reviews your favorite local eats

### 808 HAWAIIAN-STYLE POKE: CARRYOUT SIGNATURE BOWLS, OR CREATE YOUR OWN

JANESVILLE — 808 brings a little bit of Hawaii to 608 and we're here for it. Sharing the same address in downtown Janesville, 808 Cheesecake is accessed on Milwaukee Street and features cheesecake, macarons and other delicacies. 808 Hawaiian Style Poke can be found on the back side, with an entrance off the alley. There is an eye-catching mural of exotic flora that will help you spot it. Once inside, the theme continues with a mural of an aquatic scene featuring fish and a boat outfitted with fishing poles. Plan to walk in, place your order, browse and go. There are no seats for dining in, but thanks to the colorful decor, you can enjoy breezy island vibes while you wait. According to their Facebook site, they were first established in 2010 in Kailua-Kona Hawaii. They opened a second location in Roscoe, Ill. in 2017. When 808 first came to Janesville as a pop-up, I was right there for the cheesecake. Then

they opened a shop on West Milwaukee Street, and I went for the macarons. Now they bring another Hawaiian treat, poke. Pronounced poh-KAY, it originated in Hawaii and over time melded with all the Japanese sushi influence. It has been popular, at least by that name, since the 1970s. There is an annual poke contest in Hawaii. Fun! For first timers, ordering may seem a little daunting so let me explain — there are two-sided plastic menus where you make your choices. One side has signature bowls with a few options and the other side is for creating your own. It is really simple. I wanted something easy and not fishy, so I picked their signature tofu bowl (\$12.99) and topped it with wasabi ginger sauce. I am a sauce person and this one was spectacular. It hit the nose but mellowed out in a creamy base and a hint of ginger-so good. There was just the right amount of sauce over warm white rice and an abundance of fresh, healthy vegetables: soft edamame, thin sliced cucumbers, crunchy red onion

chunks, topped off with avocado. The whole thing was a wonderful surprise. Helene started out ordering the tofu signature bowl and then wanted to add salmon but didn't want the cucumbers so she was gently told she might want to create her own. She opted for the mixed greens base and then for her three toppings she added seaweed salad, smashed avocado and sweet onions. For protein, she picked half tofu, half salmon. For sauce she added garlic aioli and then topped it off with green onions and toasted sesame seeds. A small bowl with 2 half proteins (\$11.99) was the perfect meal size for her. The tofu was soft but not mushy and held the sauce perfectly. There was a taste of soy sauce along with it and the salmon had a hint of saltiness. The lettuce base with the seaweed made it essentially a salad, which allowed her to feel good about herself after she also got some macarons for dessert. Yum! The four-pack consisted of orange cream (think orange sherbet ice cream), lemon lime (tart), chocolate b-day cake

and fruity pebbles (sweet). Like me, Jennifer shies away from uncooked fish, so she decided on a medium bowl (\$14) with brown rice as her base and the 808 chicken salad as her protein. It was delightful, made with moist all white meat chicken, crunchy celery and with no detectable mayo flavor. The toppings she chose were cucumbers, onions and crispy onions. Garlic aioli was a flavorful sauce which she was glad she picked.

She also decided to give the seaweed salad a try. Vibrantly green, the sweet and tangy salad had somewhat of a strong flavor but it was the chewy texture she couldn't get past. All in all, she was quite pleased with her meal. Nikki tried the signature tsunami bowl (\$17.99) with spicy ahi on a base of white rice. It came with seafood salad, sliced cucumber, green onions, crispy onions and white sesame seeds. The house aioli was her

sauce of choice. Flavors and textures combined perfectly: warm rice, crunchy vegetables and savory fish. The dish was filling but fresh and light, even with the creamy seafood and aioli. Wow, I didn't know what I was missing. If you are a sushi novice or a wimp (like me!) there is something to enjoy here. My adventurous colleagues raved over theirs, so I will push myself next time and return for something fishy.

Protein choices are ahi tuna, salmon, seafood salad, chicken salad, and tofu. There is a long list of topping choices like tobiko, carrot, radish, pickled ginger, wontons and edamame. Sides, sold in half-pound increments, include seaweed salad (\$5.99), kimchi cucumbers (\$6.99), and crab rangoon dip (\$9.99). Don't forget to pick up a sweet treat for dessert from 808 Cheesecake.
