



# Nature RV Resort promises relaxing getaway for adults

The Land O' Lakes Nature RV Resort is the perfect relaxing destination for vacationers. The age-restricted resort, for adults older than 25, has two lakes, observations towers, a kayak launch and miles of nature trails for hiking and biking.

The 215-acre property was purchased over 30 years ago by DuWayne Reek. DuWayne, his wife Karen, and their children, Matt and Rachel, enjoyed the property for years while DuWayne crafted his vision to transform the property into an exclusive escape for North Woods visitors.

After a brief opening in August of last year, a grand opening took place May 1. The Reeks are hoping for a successful first summer season at the resort.

"We've been blessed with wonderful guests and have received excellent reviews," said Matt who now co-owns the business with his father.

The father and son team continue to look for ways to improve their guests' experience and are looking forward to a successful first season at the resort.

As the name suggests, the main amenity is the natural beauty.

"We have miles of trails that are great for hiking and biking," said Matt. "Our main trail loop also gives guests access to the lake, the Enchanted Forest, and the two observation towers."

The main trail loops around Blue Diamond Lake with additional trail loops through the Enchanted Forest and to the South Observation Tower where you can enjoy views for miles.

The branching trails lead guests to the kayak launch, lake frontage

with picnic tables, as well as the North Observation Tower. There are also miles of other trails to explore off the main trail

Blue Diamond Lake is the larger lake on the property spanning 7.5-acres. It has a kayak launch with kayaks, paddle boards, and a rowboat supplied by resort for the guest's enjoyment.

The Enchanted Forest is a peaceful, more densely forested section behind Blue Diamond Lake with several trails winding through.

"My mom always loved spending time in that area, and she liked to call it the Enchanted Forest, so we decided to name it that in her memory," explained Matt.

A shorter walking trail leads around Peaceful Lake at the front of the property near the sites

and around the uninhabited part of the lake.

The Nature RV Resort has 25 spacious, pull-through sites around the smaller lake on the property, Peaceful Lake. Each site is equipped with a fire ring, picnic table, fullhook ups for water and septic, as well as 20-, 30-, and 50-amp service.

Guests also have access to free firewood and high-speed Wi-Fi while staying at the resort. Solar powered flame lights are posted at each site for the guest's convenience.

"The resort is big rig friendly. We've already had several guests with 40-foot travel trailers and Class-A RVs, and they've navigated easily and appreciate the pull-through sites," said Matt.

The sites are very spacious, but off-site

storage is also available near the nature trails if a guest would like to store a boat or other vehicle.

The resort is very pet friendly. The miles of trails are great for walking dogs, and there are plenty of open spaces for them to play according to the Reeks.

Direct access to the ATV and bike trails is available at Razorback Road. There are a wide range of nearby activities outside the resort for guests to enjoy for the outdoor enthusiast to explore.

"As my dad likes to say, Land O' Lakes is amenity rich," said Matt.

## Vilas County Fair to return to Eagle River, Aug. 10-13

The Vilas County Fair will return to the Vilas County Fairgrounds off Highway 70 West in Eagle River, Aug. 10-13.

The fair's midway, operated by Waupaca-based Sheridan Amusements, opens at 5 p.m Thursday, Aug. 10, and at noon Friday through Sunday, Aug. 11-13.

Vilas County Fair board members stated that they are excited to have Sheridan Amusements returning and new bands coming in for entertainment.

Daily wristband specials will include: Thursday, \$20, unlimited rides from 5 to 10 p.m.; Friday, \$25, unlimited rides noon to 10 p.m.; Saturday, \$25, unlimited rides from noon to 10 p.m.; and Sunday, \$20, unlimited rides from noon to 5 p.m. On Saturday receive \$2 off in exchange for the donation of two nonperishable food items to the Vilas Food Pantry or the Humane Society of Vilas County.

Daily attractions at the fair will include exhibits, several shows, chainsaw carving, face painting, a beer garden, and live music.

Sunday, from noon to 2 p.m., a variety of games will be staged for younger fairgoers including a water balloon toss, gunnysack races, and a watermelon-eating contest.

There will be Dan Kirk juggling shows on Friday, 2 and 4 p.m.; Saturday, 2 and 3:30 p.m.; and Sunday at 2 p.m.

The fair will also offer four days of live music from 7 to 11 p.m. including Burton Tyler, Aug. 10; 2 Miles South, Aug. 11; Still Reckless, Aug. 12; and Julien Kozak, Aug. 13.

The annual horseshoe tournament will begin Saturday and Sunday at 11 a.m., and Lena mini and modified tractor pulls start Saturday at 4 p.m.

Food and beverage concessions will be available for purchase at the fairgrounds.

Vendor product sales will be conducted in the Commercial Building, with 4-H exhibits and judging in the Exhibit Hall.

Parking will be available adjacent to the fair-grounds for \$5.

The Vilas County Fair has been a local tradition since the first fair was held in Eagle River on Sept. 7, 1916.

# Spang's in St. Germain offers top quality food and service

A business that started as a family affair more than 50 years ago has stood the test of time, with Spang's Pizza and Pasta in St. Germain still going strong in 2023.

Founders Ed and Ruth Reid vacationed in the North Woods for many years with their five children. During one of these trips, they decided to purchase a building for their vision of an old-school Italian supper club.

The pair purchased what used to be The Hearth Tavern in 1972 for the future site of Spang's. Soon after acquisition, the whole family moved to St. Germain from Evergreen Park, Ill., and when they arrived Ed, Ruth, and the children got to work.

After months of renovations, remodeling, and deep cleaning, the family-run restaurant opened its doors in June of 1972. The entire Reid extended family and loyal friends have made up the staff throughout the restaurant's history.

Ed and Ruth's son, Joe, who's worked at the Italian eatery since he was 14, took over the business from his parents in 1988.

"We'd like to thank our loyal customers, friends, and employees for their help, support, and patronage over the past 51 years," said Joe Reid.

The Reid family has also been active in the community by helping raise funds for community-driven projects in the St. Germain area. Various nonprofit organizations, in addition to the St. Germain Elementary School, have been aided through Spang's countless spaghetti and pizza benefit dinners.

For decades, the busi-

ness has seen success as one of the last remaining supper clubs in the North Woods. Nearly the entire menu is made by hand — a touch that has been lost by many of today's restaurants.

"Almost 90% of the menu is made from scratch and our pizzas are hearth-baked by the time-honored, slow-baked process," Reid noted. "The bread, the dough, sauces, pasta, and our meat are all made, processed, and seasoned in-house."

With this success, the business has also lived through tough times including recessions in the early 1990s and 2008, in addition to the Covid-19 pandemic. Full-service dining has been available at Spang's since last June, but after the 2020 government shutdown, Reid said things haven't been the same.

"I still get calls all the time asking if the dining room is open yet, and we've been open for almost a year," he added. "The pandemic really changed a lot, not just for us, but for all restaurants here in the North Woods." After keeping its doors closed in 2020, Spang's was open in 2021 for curbside and delivery orders, which brought them success. However, Reid noted that in 2022, when more businesses began to reopen their doors, the busy season at Spang's died down a little bit.

"We used to employ 25 to 30 people and now we run the day-to-day operations with about 12," said Reid.

This year, however, Reid has a feeling it's going to be busy. Two years post pandemic is a lot of time for people to get back to their "normal" patterns, and here in the North Woods eating out at a favorite restaurant is one of the many staples of the traditional family vacation, he said.

With new nightly specials and full drink service, Spang's Pizza and Pasta is ready to serve during the 2023 summer season, Reid said. New items like chicken kiev, seafood pasta, veal parmigiana, and a weekly Friday fish fry highlight a traditional Italian menu that Reid and his family have tweaked to perfec-

tion over the years.

"When we first opened in '72, my mom and dad had snowmobilers breakfasts. We tried brunch, we tried lunch, it's just a perception thing; most people perceive us to be open at night for dinner, so that's what we're sticking with," Reid added.

Some new features at the restaurant include online ordering and pamphlet QR codes that bring up the menu on cell phones or mobile devices.

Reid even ships pizzas all around the country.

"A couple guys took a bunch of pizzas back to Poland with them one year and that was pretty cool, but the longest distance I've shipped a pizza was out west to Seattle," said Reid.

Spang's Pizza and Pasta will be open Tuesdays through Saturdays from 5 p.m. until close.

"We hope to be able to serve you and your families for many more years to come, and also hope you will visit Spang's again very soon," Joe added.

# WalkAbout Apparel & Paddle provides service with a smile

WalkAbout Apparel & Paddle first opened its store on Wall Street in Eagle River in 2001, and they have been outfitting customers with a smile ever since.

With lakes and rivers abounding in the North Woods, WalkAbout offers great watercraft variety: kayaks, canoes, stand-up paddleboards, utility docs, and the all-new electric Lift eFoil hydrofoil boards.

WalkAbout features kayaks from Wilderness Systems, Perceptions, and Eddyline, all made in America. Also, the store carries canoes from Souris River and Pelican.

Souris river canoes are available in Kevlar, and Pelican canoes are stocked in rotational molded plastic. Walk-About also sells a wide variety of stand-up paddleboards from Boardwalks, Gray Duck, and Lifetime.

According to store manager, Alice Krueger, paddleboarding works for both exercise and relaxation, and is an activity suitable for all members of the family.

The newest addition

to WalkAbout are battery-powered hydrofoil boards from Lift, which come in several sizes.

"Hydrofoil surfing is not a flash in the pan," said David Eibner. "It's here to stay and it is available to surfers of all ages, from kids to 70-year-olds."

The eFoil gives riders the experience of a combination of surfing, flying, and deep-powder snowboarding, and the staff at WalkAbout can confirm this experience firsthand after demonstrating the eFoil with the store's owners.

Handmade in Puerto Rico, Lift boards are shipped by a family-run business that has developed the eFoil, a hydrofoil board that incorporates technology found in smart phones, drones, and even electric vehicles.

The boards propel their operators forward and above the water using an eFoil fin, relying on electric power instead of manual power or wind. They run on a rechargeable lithium battery and create no emissions or noise. Speeds are controlled by a Bluetooth-connected hand remote and riders can go upwards of 25 mph on a two-hour charge.

"It's a new and exciting way to experience the North Woods," said Eibner.

She said WalkAbout's trained and experienced staff is ready to assist guests.

"We are committed to providing our guests with the best customer service! We'll find the right boat and paddle to fit your needs, as well as your favorite comfort leisurewear or footwear that fits just perfect," said Krueger.

The store is open 7 days a week from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.



# Big Stone Golf Course offers more than just nine holes

Over the past few years, Big Stone Golf Course in Three Lakes has implemented numerous improvements, and with head PGA and LPGA Professional Patti Marquis at the helm, a hidden gem awaits golfers in the North Woods.

Currently under the ownership of Three Lakes residents Ed Jacobsen and his wife Sue Sadowske, the course is open to the public and welcomes walkers or cart riders at any time.

Improvements to the course in recent years include the planting of nearly 2,500 saplings and 30 mature trees, the addition of seven new tee boxes and the introduction of an environmentally friendly fertilizer program. All of which have brought renewed life to Big Stone's greens and fairways.

Located at 847 Golf Course Loop Rd. in Three Lakes, a scenic view awaits golfers, guests and everyone in between.

"The course is so beautiful thanks to the grounds crew and it gets better every year," said Marquis. "Superintendent John Schultz, course manager Linelle Sergent, and Bobby Schneider are the three hardest working people I've ever worked with. You could give John a coat hanger and he could fix anything."

Some of the course holes have been lengthened, and with tree trimming and grass management completed, average golfers can challenge their skills and have a chance to score well. Players of all abilities will appreciate the casual atmosphere, smooth consistent greens and enjoyable nine-hole layout.

The PGA has rated the course to a slope of

Marquis has been giving lessons at Big Stone Golf Course since 2020. She has been teaching golf for more than 45 years, and has won numerous awards.

In 2022, Marquis was named one of the Top-50 LPGA Teachers in the country. She offers individual lessons and clinics, in addition to classes for new golfers. Classes are available for women, men and juniors.

"Mondays with Patti" is open to all women golfers, regardless of ability. Classes are \$25 per person and run on Mondays from 5 to 7 p.m. Monday, July 3, will be the only date this summer when this class

will not run.

Additionally, a junior camp will run July 5, 12, 19 and 26, from 10 a.m. until noon. The cost is \$125 per student. Six different golf leagues are also available for the public to join, including men's and women's leagues, men's and women's senior leagues, a couples league and a men's individual senior league.

With seating available for people inside the air conditioned clubhouse and out on the patio, golfers can meet up with family and friends before or after a round of golf. A late afternoon setting affords many deer sightings of the numerous fawns born on the course, according to Marquis.

The clubhouse patio has views of the course, the local wildlife and Big Stone Lake. A new pavilion, added in 2021, compliments the patio. It can be utilized for special events; or sim-

ply to keep golfers dry during rain, or cool on hot days.

## Ask the Lake Guy

Dear Lake Guy, why are water weeds important to lake ecosystems?

**Answer:** On land, weeds are, by definition, plants growing where humans don't want them. Like dandelions in the lawn or burdock in the garden.

But what of the plants that grow in our lakes? Why do we call them weeds? After all, they are essential to healthy lake life as trees are to forest ecosystems, as grasses and forbs are to prairies.

It's true that some water plants are invasive, like Eurasian water milfoil, or are natives that can grow to nuisance proportions.

For the most part, though, water plants promote healthy and diverse fisheries and all manner of aquatic life. They help infuse the water with oxygen. They provide cooling shade and shelter for fish. They can dampen wave action and help prevent shoreline erosion.

Water plants fit into four basic categories; emergent, floating-leaf, submersed, and free-floating.

Emergent plants are those we see along shorelines like cattails, arrowhead, pickerelweed, and various sedges and rushes. Their spongy leaf tissue makes nesting material for muskrats and waterfowl. Their interlocking root and rhizome systems help keep the sediment stable.

Floating-leaf plants, like water lily with white flowers and spatterdock with yellow flowers, grow in slightly deeper water, sending up flexible stalks topped by broad leathery floating pads.

Submersed plants, like cabbage weed and coontail, are the ones anglers look for when seeking places to cast a lure or suspend a bait on a bobber. These plants are diverse in height, leaf structure, root system and lifecycle. Being buoyant, they don't need sturdy stalks. Spongy leaf tissue latticed with air spaces helps with flotation.

Free-floating plants are represented mainly by duckweed, with one to three leaves less than one-eighth inch in diameter that simply drift on the surface. Duckweed is a favorite food for waterfowl and marsh birds.

So when we see these plants in the water, we should remember all the good they do. And then maybe we'll think twice before labeling them as weeds.





## Naturalist presentation slated in Boulder Junction

The Boulder Junction Public Library presents both award-winning weaver Mary Burns, and local author, naturalist and educator John Bates, Thursday, Aug. 10, at 7 p.m. at the Boulder Junction Community Center.

In this joint program, Burns will tell the stories of the women from one of her exhibits. Her husband, John Bates, will highlight the water issues the world currently faces, which may grow if individuals don't change the way water is perceived and conserved. He will share stories of both massive challenges and positive solutions.

Burns will speak about "Women and Water: A Global Exhibit," which celebrates and honors water by portraying women who work with it, protect it and advocate for it. In many traditional cultures, water is imbued with feminine roles and symbolism, with women serving as the protectors of water.

Her jacquard weavings will be showcased at the David R. Obey Northern Great Lakes Visitor Center in Ashland until Oct. 16. Featured are 39 women from 20 countries, including scientists, water walkers, teachers, farmers, activists and healers, all who hold deep connections with water and have remarkable stories.

It is Burns' hope that this globally-inspired exhibit will help develop and strengthen our own ties with water, and inspire actions to further protect our waters.

She is the creator of the handwoven jacquard exhibit "Ancestral Women: Wisconsin's 12 Tribes" as well as her current exhibit "Women and Water: Woven Portraits from Around the World."

The portraits for these exhibits are crafted on her unique hand-operated jacquard loom from Norway. She is one of only 30 individuals in the United States who currently owns such a loom and works professionally with it. A 124-page color book illustrating the exhibit was recently published and will be available for purchase after the program.

Burns' love of weaving began in high school art class, and for many years she wove rugweight wall hangings, which reside in private homes across the country. She also creates and teaches tapestry weaving, felting, and eco-printing.

She has received many awards, including the Best of Show at Wausau's Festival of Arts in 2008 and 2012.

Bates is the author of 10 books and a contributor on eight others, all of which focus on the natural history of the North Woods.

He has worked as a naturalist in Wisconsin's North Woods for 33 years, leading an array of trips and giving talks all designed to help people further understand the remarkable diversity and beauty of nature, and our place within it.

### Scenic waterfalls of Upper Peninsula in Michigan not far from Vilas County

Scenic waterfalls of the U.P. not far from Vilas

The Upper Peninsula (U.P.) of Michigan is home to more than 300 waterfalls, with several located about an hour or less from the Eagle River


Five U.P. waterfalls that are a short drive from Eagle River include Bond Falls, Agate Falls, O Kun de Kun Falls, Gorge Falls and Potawatomi Falls.

Bond Falls is in the western U.P. on Bond Falls Road east of Paulding, Mich., on the Middle Branch of the Ontonagon River.

The main drop is 40

feet high and 100-plus feet wide. Above the main falls are a series of cascades and rapids that must drop a total of 20 feet. The water level is controlled by a dam and a steady flow over the falls is maintained for scenic reasons.

Bond Falls is a Michigan State Scenic Site. The site was renovated about 2003. The old parking area was upstream of the falls and a steep concrete stairway (still used by many) led to the base of the falls. The new parking area is near the base of the falls and a level boardwalk leads hikers to prime views of the falls.



O Kun de Kun Falls is one of many waterfalls adventurers can enjoy in the North Woods. Waterfalls can provide entertainment for the whole family in the summer.

Agate Falls, also on the Middle Branch of the Ontonagon River, is another Michigan State Scenic Site located 6.5 miles east of Bruce Crossing, Mich., on Highway 28.

There is parking at Joseph F. Oravec Roadside Park just past the bridge over the Ontonagon River. This is one of the largest and most impressive waterfalls in Michigan, dropping about 40 feet.

O Kun de Kun Falls, named after an Oiibwe chief, is one of the largest of the waterfalls in Ontonagon County and is located on the Baltimore River.

The trailhead to the falls is located on the east side of Highway 45 about 8 miles north of Bruce Crossing. There are signs for the parking area. The trail to the falls is part of the North Country Trail. It is a mile-plus hike to O Kun de Kun Falls and there are no fences or signs.

While it is not as large as Bond or Agate falls, it is just as scenic and far wilder. It drops about 25 feet. The waterfall is also unusual in that it is an actual plunge falls.

Before hikers reach the main falls, they will see a smaller 10-foot plunge upstream, but should keep going as the real falls is just a short distance downstream. The trail crosses a suspension bridge below the falls.

Gorge Falls is named for the deep and narrow gorge above and below the falls and is part of Black River Scenic Byway waterfalls. It is also one of the easier waterfalls to visit, being only a short distance from the parking area. There are a fair number of stairs to the falls overlook. It is only a short walk upstream to see Potawatomi Falls.

The Black River Scenic Byway starts north of Highway 2 near Bessemer, Mich. There are signs on Highway 2. Gorge Falls is about 14.5 miles north of Highway 2. The scenic area is on the right and is clearly marked.

Potawatomi Falls drops 30 feet and is just upstream of Gorge Falls, and is reached from the same parking area. Potawatomi is the name of one of the native tribes. This waterfall is wheelchair-accessible.
