# Communities mourn loss of officers

## Two officers shot during Cameron traffic stop Easter Weekend

The two police officers and a man have been identified by officials after a shooting incident took place during a traffic stop Saturday, April 8, in Cameron.

At approximately 3:38 p.m., Chetek Police Department Officer Emily Breidenbach and Officer Hunter Scheel of Cameron Police Department stopped 50-year-old Glenn Douglas Perry of New Auburn, based on a report law enforcement received. "The officers were conducting the traffic stop based on a warrant and to check the welfare of the driver

following a notification of concerning behavior," according to Justice Department officials.

The Barron County Sheriff's Department Dispatch Log indicated that Breidenbach notified dispatchers she would be conducting a traffic stop with Scheel in Cameron. Breidenbach and Scheel stopped Perry on CTH SS and Hwy. 8 near a utility pole plant.

The dispatch log stated that Breidenbach and Scheel positioned their squad vehicles to be in front and behind Perry.

At 3:38 p.m., Breidenbach said Perry had a gun. Shortly after she

said Perry had a gun, Officer Scheel said shots had been fired and there was an officer down. Further shots were fired and the dispatch report said Scheel was down.

It was reported that Perry had used a rifle to fire at the officers.

Officer Scheel and Officer Breidenbach were pronounced deceased at the scene, and Perry was transported to an area hospital where he later died.

CTH SS was closed to traffic until the scene could be cleared by law enforcement and vehicles

transported to a secure impound facility. First responders requested at the scene included: Cameron Fire Department, Cameron Police Department, Mayo Clinic Ambulance, LMC Ambulance, Chetek Fire Department, Life Link Helicopter, Barron County Sheriff's Department, Wisconsin State Patrol and Barron County Highway Department.

Therapy K-9 Officer Grizz was in Officer Breidenbach's K-9 equipped squad car during the incident and eye witnesses reported him wandering near the scene. Though K-9 Grizz was on scene during the incident, he was not harmed. Grizz

was picked up shortly after the incident by Justin Larson, volunteer firefighter for Chetek Police Department and his family. The family looked after Grizz until his Chetek PD family picked him up and has been looking after him ever since.

Perry, a 1992 Chetek High School graduate, had two charges in 2020 for domestic violence. A complaint filed in March of 2020 alleged a quarrel had taken place between Perry and two members of his family that escalated into a physical confrontation. The complaint said Perry was seen with a rifle.

## Scheel remembered for leadership, desire to help others

Hunter Scheel, a Prairie Farm native and one of two police officers who were killed April 8 in an incident at Cameron, was remembered this week for his accomplishments in school and the ways in which he prepared himself for a career serving others in law enforcement.

Wendy Dallmann, who coached the 2017 Prairie Farm High School graduate in track, cross country and ice fishing, said Scheel "was an amazing student athlete who always worked hard no matter what he was doing."

A state qualifier as a sophomore in the 3,200-meter run, Scheel "was instrumental in creating Prairie Farm's Cross Country team; he was the driving force behind adding this sport," Dallmann added. "He was a born

leader and was passionate about helping others."

Scheel became interested in the National Guard while he was in high school, and he served in that capacity until he recently trained to become an officer.

"I had the chance to speak to him recently," Dallmann said. "You could see and hear the excitement about being an officer [for the Cameron Police Department] and having the opportunity to serve the public in yet another capacity."

Dallmann said she was proud to have coached, taught and influenced Scheel.

"He was one of a kind and will be missed greatly by all those that knew him," she said. "My sincerest sympathies go out to Hunter's family and also Emily Breidenbach's family and friends."

HEATHER A. FISHER

I worked with Hunter at Kwik Trip in Cameron. He was always positive and had a great personality. He really set the bar high as far as work ethics go. One of my favorite memories was when we had to fill a 500 piece fried chicken

order for a customer. It was a very stressful event but I couldn't have asked for a better partner. Our running joke was calling each other "silly goose" when we made mistakes. After he left Kwik Trip and became an officer—fulfilling his life long dream—he still looked out for me and checked in to see how life was going. My dog was lost in December 2022 and he helped look for him all night and made sure he was found. Hunter had a heart big enough for the world! He will really be

When I recently spoke with Emily, she was still talking about the craft the kids made. She loved it. Last Halloween, Emily was there with Officer Grizz, one 6-year-old boy on the spectrum was a little overwhelmed and scared, so Emily talked to him and showed him where Officer Grizz liked to be skitched. Of course, when the boy found Grizz’s tickle spot, the boy received a lick on his face in appreciation. The boy was excited but he asked Emily what he should do if somebody was mean. In typical Emily fashion, she told him, “If anyone is ever mean to you, just tell me. Officer Grizz and I will take care of it for you.” We all remember her big heart, her infectious laugh, her smile, and yes, her sass. I was proud to call her my friend. Our hearts are broken and the tears still fall but our memories and our love for her goes on. We miss you Emily. Rest in peace.

### JUSTIN LARSON

Chetek is a family town, and the moment Emily moved up here, she became everyone’s family. Friendly, funny, energetic, down to earth, understanding, and compassionate—she was the perfect recipe for what a small town officer should be. Someone like that is irreplaceable.

### ANONYMOUS

A few weeks ago, I was sitting at home struggling with grief, and there was a silence in my house that was deafening. I decided to go to a Rice Lake grocery store to buy some ice cream to make myself feel better. On my way home, just outside of Cameron, the red and blue lights lit up behind me. I thought, “So much for enjoying my decadent ice cream.” The officer came up to my car, identified himself, and told me that I had a burned out tail light. We talked for a bit, and somehow, it came up that I was a widow, trying to find my way through grief.

He asked me some questions—he wanted to make sure I had a support system. I told him yes and explained my situation.

He shared his grief with me, and an analogy he used to work through difficult seasons.

During our conversation, I expressed concern for him standing outside my vehicle, while other cars were driving by. He said, “Not to worry.” I was amazed at the amount of wisdom, compassion and empathy this young man had. He talked about his mom. He talked about his dad. He told me about walking across the stage when he graduated the academy. I told him his family must be so proud of him. He smiled. He told me that when I arrived at home, I should give my dog a hug and have my tail light fixed.

His parting words to me were, “We will make it.” As he walked back to his squad car, I watched him in my rear view mirror, convinced I was watching an angel. When I heard the news, it broke my heart. But I have learned

something—I have an angel. I know exactly what he looks like and Hunter is his name.

### CHETEK WEYERHAEUSER SCHOOL DISTRICT

Officer Emily Breidenbach was not simply a law enforcement officer when it came to her work with the Chetek-Weyerhaeuser Area School District—she was a member of the school community. Officer Breidenbach was often seen at sporting events—amping up the student section by leading the “Roller Coaster” or simply chatting with other students and cheering on the Bulldogs with them. Most recently, she was known to stop in the buildings with K-9 Officer Grizz and loved bringing him in to hang out with the students.

Many can speak of her joyous spirit, smile, and friendship. It is that positive impact on the community and its youth that we will miss the most here at CWASD and what will surely be Emily’s lasting legacy.
