

Superintendent eager to welcome students, teachers back to school

Focus will be on literacy, delivering on approved referendum

OCONOMOWOC — In a little less than two weeks students will be walking through the doors of Oconomowoc schools and Superintendent Michael Sereno is eager to welcome



School District, said he wants students to

come to school and find a place where they feel comfortable and are able to grow and learn. 'I feel really blessed to have landed in a community that

is so supportive of the schools," Sereno said. He started his tenure as superintendent on July 1, 2022,

replacing Roger Rindo, who left in 2021. Previously, Sereno was assistant superintendent of teaching and learning at Elmbrook Schools.

A focus for the 2023-24 school year across the district will be on literacy, which has been a priority of the district already. Recent state assessments of literacy in the OASD have been strong and Sereno wants that progress to con-

City adopts resolution deeming golf course, ski chalet sites blighted

Declaration a pivotal part of redeveloping area adjacent to Olympia Fields

OCONOMOWOC — With the era of a golf course and ski chalet far in the rear view mirror, Oconomowoc officials took an additional step Tuesday in declaring an 88acre site blighted and ripe for future redevelopment.

The Community Development Authority reviewed and gave a favorable recommendation in deeming the land that once housed the Olde Highlander golf course and Olympia ski resorts blighted property.

The Common Council, on a 7-1 vote, followed a similar course with the designation at Tuesday's meeting in deeming the high-profile land on the west side of State Highway 67 an ideal area for redevelopment.

Bob Duffy, economic development director, reviewed with the council a report that outlined why the land meets the statutory definition of "blighted."

Council confirms Herzog as DPW director

Also approves repealing overlay districts

OCONOMOWOC — After a lengthy search process, a new head of the Public Works Department was officially named at the culmination of a confirmation hearing Tuesday.

The Common Council appointed Jason Herzog to the position during the regular meeting. Mayor Robert Magnus presented Herzog to the council with a favorable recommendation.

"He brings to the position a wealth of experience," Magnus said. "We're thrilled that he had submitted for the job. He fits everything that we're looking for."

Herzog currently is in Brookfield's employ, working as a project manager of construction and roads in the engineering department. His resume also includes a stint working for Racine.

In presenting Herzog to the council for confirmation, Magnus said his engineering background is a strong asset. Oconomowoc currently outsources for much of its engineering work, and officials have been seeking candidates to bring some of those duties in-house.

"We felt that Jason is the perfect person for this position," Magnus

Alderman Charles Schellpeper was among the council members who spoke favorably of adding Herzog to the municipal payroll.

"You found us, and we found you," Schellpeper said to Herzog. "I look forward to you being a part of the community.

Herzog, who brings two decades of experience to Oconomowoc, said he was drawn to working in the community because he, his wife and four children call the city home.

"We're excited to be here and to be a part of the community," Herzog said.

Herzog's start date Oconomowoc is slated for Oct. 10.
