Record high need for counseling at Cashton School District

There has been increase an ongoing students seeking in counseling for the past several years at Cashton Middle/High School.

This is unfortunately a common trend among surrounding districts, and likely many more. To combat the alarming increase, the Cashton School District hired a second guidance counselor, Jessica Lepak, who started in time for the 2021-2022 school year. This allowed Greg Stritchko of the Cashton Middle/ High School to split his work load and focus on the emotional counseling responsibilities that come

with his job, while Lepak focuses on most of the other responsibilities such as career and enrollment counseling. Despite the efficient teamwork, Stritchko continues to see more and more students every semester. Compared to the 2021-2022 school year, Stritchko is now tasked with helping more than double the number of students.

Although he is not able to diagnose anything, Stritchko has over 10 vears of experience as a counselor at Cashton, and finds the best ways to help students face their issues. Stritchko's work is what's known as "tier 1 counseling." Many students are able to resolve their issues at this tier, but

if their situation worsens, they are typically moved to "tier 2", which still involves Stritchko's counseling, as well as a referred counselor with necessary specialties.

Unfortunately, it can be very difficult to get a counselor in a timely manner and with the appropriate specialties partly due to the heavy influx of students seeking counseling.

The most dramatic influx took place in the Fall of 2020 once students could get in-person counseling again. It doesn't take a professional to surmise that the online learning environment took a heavy toll on many students and
