# **Gruen sisters lead Royall, Roehling W-C at Cashton**

Marah finished second in both the long (15-10.5) and triple (32-00) jumps and was third in the 1600 meter run. Bria was third in the 55 meter hurdles.

Other top 10 finishes included Laya Wainwright in the triple jump (10th) and shot put (9th). Malory Knudtson tied for 10th in shot put.

For the boys, Rodrigo Garcia scored all five of the team points after taking fifth in the 400 (57.00) and eighth in the long jump with a leap of 18-01.5 Saturday. **WONEWOC-CENTER** 

Like clockwork, Wonewoc-Center's Danny Roehling continued to show his prowess around the oval at Saturday's indoor track and field meet hosted by Cashton at UW La Crosse.

Roehling finished second in both the 55 and 200 meter dashes Saturday to lead the W-C track program.

## Britzke, Jackson lead charge at Cáshton indoor meet

Hillsboro senior Savannah Britzke did the heavy lifting for the Tiger track and field team last weekend at Cashton's annual indoor invite at UW La Crosse.

Britzke posted a trio of top ten finishes and scored all 14 of HHS's team points.

The senior sprinted to a second place finish in the 55 meter dash prelims, then went on to claim second in the final with a time of 7.91 seconds. However, Britzke went on

to show off her range of ability with a fourth place finish in the 800 meter run (2:36.09) and seventh place finish in the long jump with a distance of 14-08. Britzke's fourth event was

the 800 meter relay. The team finished 16th with a time of 2:10.57, but Lauren Auel was tripped up just ahead of the exchange zone. Auel bounced off the track and finished her leg of the relay, despite the setback.

Like Britzke, Russell Jackson accrued all of Hillsboro's team points after taking fourth in the 55 meter hurdles.

Jackson was seeded second after posting a time of 9.23 in the prelims, but ran a time of 9.27 in the final to finish fourth overall.



Richardson and Falkenstein tied for 10th in the high jump after successfully clearing 5-02.
