Tomah outguns River Falls in shootout for regional title

As expected, goals - even scoring chances - were at a premium in Saturday's WIAA Division 1 regional final match between Tomah and River Falls.

Despite the fact that Tomah had earned a 1-0 win over the Wildcats just three weeks prior, there was an understanding from both teams that the other was a respectable foe.

The game lived up to its billing, and then some as both teams played to a stalemate through regulation overtime, eventually dueling in a shootout in which Tomah outshot River Falls 5-3 for a 1-1 (5-3) win on Saturday, October 22.

River Falls came out looking to make a statement by scoring early. Tomah's defense held up and kept the home team from lighting up the scoreboard.

The two teams were deadlocked at 0-0 at halfitme and the score remained the same at the end of regulation, forcing overtime.

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
