Freddie Owens, an assistant on Ryan's staff, was named the interim head coach for the rest of the years by UWGB athletic director Josh Moon.

"I want to sincerely thank Will Ryan and his family for their contributions to the men's basketball program these past three seasons,' Moon said in a statement. "We wish him all the best in his future endeavors.

Ryan, who is the oldest son of former Wisconsin men's basketball coach Bo Ryan, posted a 15-61 record in his two-and-a-half seasons with the Phoenix, going 13-37 in Horizon League play. His best season came in his first season in Green Bay when the team went 8-17 (.320) and 8-12 (.400) in conference play in 2020-21.

The Phoenix are 2–19 this season, and 1–9 in Horizon League play.

Before joining in the Phoenix in 2020, Will Ryan spent one season leading Wheeling University (WV) a after serving as an assistant coach at Ohio University and at North Dakota State University.



Belmont/Platteville (8-7) finished 2–3 with wins over Richland Center in round one, 42–23, and Lancaster, 42–15, in round four of the conference round robin.

Prairie du Chien (25–4, 5–0), the top-ranked team in Division 2, swept all five of its duals to win another SWC duals title.

River Valley (14-5) went 4-1 to finish second, while Dodgeville (6-8) was third at 3–2. Richland Center (5-5, 1-4) and Lancaster (4-14, 0–5) finished fifth and sixth.
