

Inaugural winter disc golf tourney supports veterans

On Feb. 4, Eric Hauge, owner and founder of Five Seasons retreat center near Willard, along with Jeanette Harley, tournament director, hosted their first-ever disc golf tournament fundraiser named Victory for Vets as a part of the Veterans for Vets program created by one of the leading disc golf manufacturers, Dynamic Discs out of Emporia, Kan.

The Veterans for Vets is a new event designed to meet three goals: First, it gives disc golfers a chance to play in an organized event during the winter months — and get exclusive discs.

Second, it provides an environment for a disc golfer without any tournament experience to play in an organized event. All are welcome, especially United States veterans.

Finally, it provides an opportunity for the local disc golf community to raise money for a local organization tasked with serving veterans.

Five Seasons chose Camp Victory to be the recipient of funds raised at this event. Camp Victory offers outdoor activities, retreats and relaxation for veterans and first responders suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder.

Jeff LeCount, camp director, was present to talk to the players about Camp Victory and its mission. All

proceeds from the entry fees and raffle were presented to LeCount at the end of the event, with \$550 raised. Prizes included discs and a Dynamic Discs Recruit Lite disc golf target.

Five Seasons also partnered with local venue Wedges Creek Hideaway to offer hot, stone-fired pizza at the event, and Wedges Creek donated \$120 from the pizza profits to Camp Victory.

This tournament was the first to be held at the new Five Seasons disc golf course in its unique winter layout. Forty-one players signed up to compete against the course, including eight veterans. Trophy discs and minis were awarded to those placing first, second and third in each division, with several divisions available. Junior divisions were open to anyone 18 or younger. U.S. veteran divisions included any veteran or active-duty military member. Players could also compete in the novice or advanced/pro divisions, depending on their level of experience.

The idea for a disc golf course at Five Seasons came out of Jeanette and Eric's enjoyment of the sport themselves. Jeanette had been playing casually since 2008 but had no idea how popular the sport was going to become. When she moved to Neillsville in 2015, she discovered a few local nine-to-15 hole courses, including the Loyal West Side Park, Sherwood Park and Schuster Park, all of which are beginner-friendly.

Five Seasons was founded in 2020 as the permanent home of Rushing Wind USA's youth deer hunt. Since then, many other youth and



family-centered events have been hosted including the spring turkey hunt, Serve Local and snowshoe hikes. In fall 2021, Eric and Jeanette discussed putting in a disc golf course to benefit their ministry, but did not put in much action beyond that. However, with the influence of Eric's oldest son, Jordan, both Eric and Jeanette became members of the PDGA last June.

"We began competing in tournaments all over the state and came to realize how welcoming the disc golf community is to new players. People from all different backgrounds, genders and ages come together for a day to try to 'beat the course,'" Jeanette wrote in a press release.

Eric's wheels began turning and he put together a plan to build a Five Seasons course for everyone to enjoy. It would be the first 18-hole course in Clark County. He put together a packet to market it to local business for sponsorship as a means of advertising for their business. The main costs to a course are baskets and concrete tee pads. Most of the labor has been on a volunteer basis.

The goal is to have multiple tees and basket locations to accommodate beginner, intermediate and advanced skill levels. Eric, Jordan and Jeanette each played a role in the design and construction of the course.

"A temporary layout is currently in play and has been vastly enjoyed by everyone who has come out for a round. Eric has the primary responsibility of maintaining the course, keeping it playable after each precipitation event. We welcome any support from the community to keep this project moving forward," Jeanette wrote.

The Five Seasons disc golf course is located on private property but is open to the public with permission. More about disc golf

Disc golf is one of the most rapidly growing sports in the world. The Professional Disc Golf Association (PDGA) took 41 years to gain its first 100,000 members. The next 100,000 members signed up in less than four years. Since reaching 200,000, in less than one year, the PDGA has already issued another 40,000 PDGA numbers. These are only the numbers for registered players so one can imagine how many casual players throw on courses every day. Disc golf, similar to ball golf, uses discs from a tee to throw into a basket, trying to beat par for number of throws to complete the hole. Its accessibility for all ages and skill levels and the ability to play casual or competitive has led to this explosive growth. You can play with a group (card) or individually. Most courses are free or charge a small greens fee of a few dollars. Starter packs of discs are typically \$25, making it largely affordable to jump into the sport.
