Any state tournament, regardless of the sport, is going to carry a special weight to it. But there's something unique about state wrestling that makes it stand out.

From what I could tell, this allowed sessions to move along smoothly and there was plenty of space for the two extra mats.

A governing body like the WIAA will always be a lightning rod for criticism, and often deservedly so. But in this case? Props to them for successfully integrating the girls' tournament into the existing one and giving them deserved equal footing on such a grand stage.

West Salem co-op leads area teams to state meet

The West Salem co-op is no stranger to the WIAA state gymnastics meet.

The Panthers gymnastics program qualified for the state meet for the 18th time in program history last week after winning its own sectional. Unfortunately, the co-op was the only local team to advance to the last meet of the year. Viroqua's co-op was a couple points away from qualifying from the Platteville sectional

West Salem posted a program-record score of 141.6 in the Coulee Conference meet two weeks ago and will need to come close to that if they hope to compete for one of the top two spots in Friday's team competition at Wisconsin Rapids High School.

At sectionals last week,

West Salem posted a 139.75 and just edged out River Falls (139) for the sectional title.

West Salem's highest finish in the past decade was a third place finale back in 2019. The Panthers were sixth last year.

Leading the Panthers is senior gymnast Taliya Michlig. Michlig claimed the all-around title last week with a 36.425. Sparta's Ella Hemker was the runner-up.

Individually, Michlig will be joined by Kennedy Garbers and Camdyn Lyga on floor in Saturday's portion of the state meet.

Natalie Peterson also made it through on bars.

Competition for the team portion begins at 12 p.m. on Friday and at 10 a.m. on Saturday for the individual portion. Information on the order of events can be found on wiaawi.org.

For Morgan Siekert and Isabell Korn, the idea of making a return trip to the WIAA state gymnastics meet was always in question. The duo understands their scores depend completely on how each judge percieves a routine, but a return to state went beyond that as the Viroqua gymnastics co-op was close to folding prior to the 2022-23 season.

The co-op had issues finding a coach after losing Darcy McClelland, who had been in charge the 10 years prior, to retirement at the end of last season. It wasn't until the week before practice kicked off that Melissa Peterson and Lily Wiegand stepped up in order to ensure their gymnasts would have a place and reason to compete this winter.

The roller coaster didn't stop there, however.

On top of the daily grind of practice and preparation, injuries and illness, the Viroqua gymnastics team continued to go through changes. A small roster that started with seven was whittled down to five - the bare minimum to compete as a team - and Peterson eventually stepped away as a co-head coach to tend to family issues.

Still, the Viroqua area gymnasts pushed ahead.

Last weekend the team - the team of just five - nearly pulled off an improbable run to state after finishing third at the Platteville sectional on Friday, February 24. The top two teams, Reedsburg and Platteville, finished with scores of 136.375 and 134.35, respectively, while Viroqua was just shy of a second place finish with a 132.1.

Even so, the Viroqua co-op still finished with plenty to hang its hat on as both Korn and Siekert managed to advance in multiple events and will compete this weekend at the WIAA state gymnastics meet in Wisconsin Rapids on Saturday, March

"I'd say it's been crazy," said Isabell Korn. "It's been a lot of changes. A week before (the season), we didn't even know if we were going to have a program, we didn't even have a coach -nothing. So we just kind of got thrown into it; it was just such a big surpise, like, we are having a season now and getting enough girls together to compete as a varsity team. So, it's just been crazy so far, but we got through it."

Korn won the all-around at last week's sectional with a score of 36.15 and also claimed the beam title with 9.425. On the bars, the Cashton sophomore was second with a 9.05, fourth on vault (8.875) and finished ninth on floor with an 8.8.

This Saturday, Korn will compete in the all-around, beam, bars and vault at the state meet.

Siekert finished with a pair of second place scores after scoring a 9 on beam and a 9.075 on the floor at last weekend's sectional. The Cashton junior also took fifth on both the vault (8.75) and bars (8.55) and combined scores for a fourth place finish in the all-around (35.375).

This weekend Siekert will compete in all five events this weekend at the state meet

For Siekert, it will be her third trip competing at state. However, it'll be the third format change for the junior in as many years as the state meet will go back to splitting up teams and individuals for its competition.

Friday's portion of the state meet will be for the teams that qualify. The West Salem co-op, which won its own sectional last weekend, will be part of that. Saturday is set aside for the individual competition, which will include the both Siekert and Korn.

Other area gymnasts include Sparta's Ella Hemker and Gabby Bjorkman, G-E-T's Abby Miller, Onalaska's Emma Rudie, Reedsburg's Natalie Brunner and Emily Craker, Prairie du Chien's

Madilyn Fisher and Alyssa Schoepp and West Salem's Taliya

Despite all the changes, Siekert and her younger counterpart say that having a teammate along for the ride is one way to help

stay calm upon entering the state meet. Korn said, "Well, she (Siekert) knows how worked up I get,

so she knows how to comfort me. I don't really need to comfort Morgan, I just reassure her that she is good."
"It's more of a confidence boost," interjected Siekert.

"I feel excited because I get to have Isabell there and we get

to be with all of the people we've competed against for three years now.'

Siekert and Korn will be competing with the other state qualifiers from the Platteville sectional Saturday afternoon competitors they have competed against not just last weekend, but often earlier in the season by going to meets at places like River Valley, Dodgeville and Platteville.

The week leading up to the state meet is all about tightening up routines and cleaning up footwork or skills to reduce the number of deductions incurred during a performance.

The expectations for both are to have a good state meet and possibly improve on last year's showing. Korn took fourth on bars a year ago while Siekert was fifth on vault. This year the more veteran gymnast, Siekert, says she's entering with tempered expectations when it comes to final scores.

"I'm not expecting to place, but obviously it'd be exciting, to again," said Siekert, "but you never know how anything's going to go.'

Despite qualifying in all four events individually as well as the all-around, Siekert says she's mostly focused on that all-around score. IT FELT AMAZING, HONESTLY.

"I think I'm an all-around gymnast. I **SEEING MY SCORE HELD UP** don't really excel at one event. If there was one, it'd be floor, but with how the judges see things, it's difficult to understand what score you'll get that time. I just hope that - ISABELL KORN, VIROQUA CO-OP all my scores will contribute to be a good score in the end. "

there. Confidence is also a big factor on beam and bars as she heads into the final meet of the year - case in point, her podium finish last year.

Korn says that realizing she was good enough to place on bars was one of the biggest surprises in her state debut in 2022. The fact that she jumped on the scene and made her way into

the top four in the state really caught her by surprise.

"It felt amazing, honestly," said Korn. "We were one of the first teams to go on bars. Seeing my score held up the whole

day was crazy. The pair will start on vault in the first round of competition which starts at 10 a.m. - at the WIAA state gymnastics meet on Saturday, March 4 at Wisconsin Rapids Lincoln High School. Korn will be the first to go while Siekert second. The pair will then head to bars in the second round before moving to beam in the third and floor in the fourth.

TEAM FIRST ATTITUDE LEADS TO INDIVIDUAL GROWTH

Bennett has known she's had a special athlete in Hemker for the past four years. For the first three of those seasons, Hemker was instrumental in putting Sparta gymnastics on the map with a trio of team state appearances. Though Sparta came up short of a fourth-straight team state berth this year, Bennett says Hemker was committed to helping drive the program forward.

According to Bennett, Hemker was a big proponent of helping the freshmen come along in their development this year. She said the senior was eager to help demonstrate skills and build routines for

Those areas of assistance helped Sparta grow as the season progressed. Team scores swelled as the season progressed. Despite finishing fifth at last weekend's sectional, the team scored a 130.8, which was nearly 10 points higher than the first

meet of the year. "Raising the skill level and execution were some of the things we've worked on

all year," said Bennett.

She said the turning point in the season was when the freshmen took the feedback from the coaches and actually worked to improve in their weak areas. Even though injuries and illness did slow some of the progress, Bennett said she was very happy with the team growth by season's end - and end that included an additional surprise to Hemker's fourth-straight trip to state as freshman Gabby Bjorkman also made it through after taking fourth on the

KEYS TO THE VAULT The vault may be the place for Sparta to make a name for itself this year. With Hemker and Bjorkman both competing for a place on the podium, it will be hard for fans not to recognize Sparta at this

weekend's state meet. All eyes, however, will be on Hemker, and rightfully so. The reigning D2 state champ will be considered the frontrunner

in the event until proven otherwise. It's a good thing the Sparta senior is confident in her ability to defend her title

from a year ago. "I feel strongest about vault because my vaults have been pretty consistent this year," said Hemker.

You'd be hard pressed to find a meet where Hemker didn't win the vault this year. However, she knows the level of her competitors heading into this weekend's state meet will be high. Three of the other four sectional champion vaulters scored better than Hemker last weekend. Rice Lake's Avery Ash, Elkhorn's Kaylee Frank and Prairie du Chien's Madilyn Fisher all managed to score better than the Sparta senior. However, that isn't a necessarily a great indication of what's to come this weekend as the entire lot will be scored by the same judges in Saturday's

Hemker's vault is a yurchenko layout, which translates to her cartwheeling onto the springboard, flipping backwards to meet the vault, then flipping backwards, heels over head without tucking into a ball before landing. The skill is worth a 10.0 if done right. Hemker won the event at last weekend's sectional, but still only scored a 9.35, meaning there's still room for improvement heading into this weekend's season finale.

Hemker said the deductions came from the post flight, not being in a full layout position and a step on the landing.

This week's preparation includes some extra focus on her vault. However, that means putting in some extra hours. The practice space that Sparta uses in the building across from the Barney Center on the northeast side of town doesn't have a long enough runway for her to safely practice such a vault. The park and rec building space isn't equipped for her needs on a floor routine, so instead, she works out at AMKM Gymnastics across town in Sparta once her high school

Hemker says she's also putting special attention towards bars this week as the event is one of the harder to score well in. She says that adding bonus skills are key to pushing her scores up, so adding those

and polishing her routine is important. Last weekend Hemker won the bars event with an 8.9 after beating Coulee Conference bars champ, Taliya Michlig

(8.8).The senior's floor routine lagged last weekend, despite scoring a 9.3. Hemker was tied for fifth in the event with West Salem's Camdyn Lyga (Bangor). The last two years, however, Hemker finished third and fourth place at state in the event, so it's concievable she could make her way back to the podium this weekend. On beam. Hemker tied for sixth last weekend and scored a meet-low 8.75. That score helped West Salem's Michlig win the sectional title in the all-around after edging Hemker 36.425 to 36.3.

Still, though, Hemker's combined scores are among the best in the state. The last two years are evidence after taking fifth last year and third in 2021 in the allaround.

LASTING LEGACY

There's more to Hemker than medals and trophies, however. The outgoing gymnast wants to improve the visibility and quality of gymnastics and is willing to help push it forward as a competitor or coach. As mentioned previously, Hemker's quick to help her current teammates by helping demonstrating and teaching. She also helps even younger athletes as an instructor at AMKM Gymnastics. Those roles, coupled with her success as a competitor has put her in a unique spot to be an ambassador for the

sport.
"It's a cool leadership role," said Hemker. "Knowing that some girls who maybe aren't in high school, maybe younger, than that will look up to and see that these things are possible. (Gymnastics) is a fun sport and it can be time and work to get here.'
