Two dead in apparent murdersuicide in rural New Auburn

Two people died of apparent gunshot wounds at a rural New Auburn residence on Sunday, June 18, according to the Barron County Sheriff's Department.

At 6:47 p.m., the Barron County 911 Center received a call of two possible deceased subjects at a residence just north of New Auburn.

Initial investigation shows Jeremy Wittrock, 38, of Rice Lake, shot Beth (Ebler) Parker, 37, who resides at the location of the incident, 2942 First Ave. in the Town of Dovre.

Parker, a 2004 Chetek High School graduate, was transported to an area hospital with a gunshot wound and later died as a result of her injuries. Wittrock was pronounced dead at the scene from what appeared to be a self-inflicted gunshot wound.

A 15-year-old at the residence at the time of the incident was not

physically harmed.
At the time of the shooting, Wittrock was under a court order not to have contact with Parker.

Wittrock was charged in Barron County Circuit Court June 6 with disorderly conduct-domestic abuse, and one of the conditions of his \$1,500 signature bond was to have no contact with Parker.

According to the criminal complaint in that case, at 6:19 p.m. on Sunday, June 4, a caller reported a verbal altercation between a man and a woman, identified as Wittrock and Parker.

Wittrock allegedly blocked Parker from leaving the residence, and when she finally did get by him, he threw a beer can at her.

While speaking to Parker and the caller, a Barron County sheriff's deputy observed Wittrock drive away from the residence. The officer motioned for

Have a wine-derful time at first wine walk of season June 22-23

Chetek's first wine walk of the year starts this Thursday, June 22 and Friday, June 23. Shoppers will be able to sample wines at local businesses and have the chance to win several prizes including several

As a reminder to those planning to attend, only cash and checks will be accepted at this event. 16 local businesses will be providing wine samples, wine glasses, and coupon books including The Milkhouse, the event's major sponsor. The wine for this event is being provided by Clover Meadow Winery of Shell Lake.


The "Chetek US Out" Retail Group said they are excited to kick off the summer season with this event and look forward to seeing familiar faces and some new ones.

Chetek Police Department puts Therapy K-9 Program on hold

Chetek Police Department has undergone a tumultuous two months after Officer Emily Breidenbach was killed in April. Last week, the department had to say goodbye to another one of its own. Officer K-9 Grizz has been transferred to Wautoma Police Department, where he started his first day with the PD's school resource officer on Thursday, June 15.

Chetek Police Chief Ron Ambrozaitis said it wasn't a decision made light-

Wittrock to pull over, and he complied.

The officer observed a beer can in the vehicle's center console and detected the odor of intoxicants on Wittrock.

After repeated commands, Wittrock eventually exited the vehicle and stumbled several times, almost falling. He failed sobriety tests.

Wittrock allegedly said that he had been drinking since 8 a.m. and usually drank a 30-pack of beer per day.

Wittrock was subsequently charged with disorderly conduct-domestic abuse and operating while intoxicated-third

offense.

Wittrock was also charged and convicted in 2020 of violating a domestic abuse restraining order involving a different woman.

The Barron County
Medical Examiner Office
is conducting autopsies
of the deceased with the
assistance of the Midwest
Medical Examiner Office.

The Barron County Sheriff's Department is handling the investigation with the assistance of the Wisconsin State Patrol Reconstruction Team. The New Auburn Fire Department, Barron County First Responders and Chetek Ambulance also responded to the scene.

but after the tragic events of April 8, Officer Grizz has struggled with the loss of his handler. "Grizz is going to be okay, but he was severely traumatized by what he experienced."

The chief of police said the department did not have full ownership of the K-9, but had shared custody through an agreement with Blueberry Cottage Labradoodles. "Ultimately, the final decision did not rest with us but with the breeder who felt it would be best for him to be moved to a different department and a new pace of life," Ambrozaitis explained. "Grizz is fantastic with children, and we believe he will do well working in Wautoma schools where he can do what he loves in a

safe environment."
With the transfer of
Officer Grizz, the Chetek
PD has said its Therapy
K-9 Program is on hold.
"Emily was the perfect fit
for Chetek's Community
Officer and Therapy K-9
handler. There is no one
currently at the department who is able to fill that
position."

Chief Ambrozaitis met with major donors for the

crowdfunded Therapy K-9 Program. All donations made to the program were placed in a specific fund for the care, equipment and maintenance of the therapy K-9. The donors gave their permission to the police department to utilize the funds for its needs, including equipment and training.

The Wautoma Police
Chief Paul Mott, is a
frequenter of Chetek and
promised Ambrozaitis he
would bring Officer Grizz
to Chetek when he visits.
"Saying goodbye to Grizz
was difficult for everyone
at the department, but we
want what is best for him,
and we know Emily would
want him to continue to
offer support to those in
need," said Ambrozaitis.

The Wautoma Police Department said in a Facebook post, "Emily will always be a mentor for all officers with community service in their heart. We hope to make Grizz's momma proud of all he will accomplish in Wautoma. The Chetek Police Department and community will forever be our sister city. Grizz and WPD look forward to visiting Chetek as we blend our PD families."


