Pumpkin Patch Preschool hosting ribbon cutting event June 3

As anyone with a green thumb can tell you, nothing grows quite like a pumpkin patch.

It turns out to be true with Pumpkin Patch Preschool, and staff can attest, as they're getting ready to celebrate 50 years in Stoughton next weekend, and host a proper public welcome to their "new" facility that opened during the middle of the COVID pandemic. The event is set for noon, Saturday, June 3 at the preschool, located at 1940 Jackson St. in Stoughton.

Molly Daniels, president of the board at the preschool, told the Hub last week the idea for a half-century celebration came up at a recent board

meeting when members realized it was coming up on that historic milestone. They decided to pair it up with an official grand opening for their facility that opened up in spring of 2020, during the COVID shutdown.

We felt like we really didn't get to properly celebrate that by having the community come and see the building and have a proper ribbon cutting and a dedication of the school and acknowledgement of all the hard work it took to own the property and build the school," she said. "A lot of acknowledgement to the previous board members who did all that work.'

Pumpkin Patch had been working with the Stoughton Area School District for several years to provide care at district schools, but when those closed down during the pandemic, it prompted the daycare to find a permanent home, said board member Sara Simon.

was shut down for those two months, April and May, which allowed us to basically move out of the school at that time, because kids were not coming to school,' she said. "But then no one really got to see our school, because when school came back in session in fall, it was, 'You can't come in the school any more, you can't visit their classroom.'

We're trying to be fair to our customers in what we're charging them and give them the quality education that we believe our kids should have," she said. "And with that, to be able to finally purchase a property, call it our own, have our name on it, it's just amazing that we've been able to do

Daniels credited the hard work and dedication of parents and community members over the past 50 years.

'We get community donations and other businesses help us and are willing to donate things for us to help our teachers," she explained. "Without the community, we wouldn't have been able to do this, without caring parents of their children and wanting to care for their education, and the type of school they're going to. Being a small community,

The preschool's board of directors is 100 percent volunteer parents. Simon said the board manages the oversight of how the school functions, in conjunction with the director.

"We're unique in that we're managed by parents, instead of paid employees," she said. "When Pumpkin Patch started, it was organized by a group of parents, and that's how it became the parent co-op. We rely on parent volunteers to help us to do things, whether that's help coordinate a fundraiser, donate supplies, come in and read to the children, run to get milk for the children, or help with other activities that we hold. It helps us keep the cost down and run

"It's wonderful when you're just asking around, and it's 'my granddaughter or grandson goes to that school, sure I'll help out," Simon said. "You meet people in the community and they're, 'Oh yeah, I went to Pumpkin Patch when I was a kid.' It's really great to see that community depth that we have an impact on, that now 50 years later there are kids that have gone to the school that are 30, 40, 50 years old, and they have a grandchild that goes to that school. That's pretty cool to

Daniels said staff and parents are looking forward to the community event, and showing off the new

"We've got lots of fun stuff going on, a bounce house, face painting, a magician, a raffle, a little bit of food to sell," she said. "This is for people to come out and see the school and see how well we're still thriving 50 years later.


