End of the road

"We call that person who has lost his father, an orphan; and a widower that man who has lost his wife. But that man who has known the immense unhappiness of losing a friend, by what name do we call him? Here every language is silent and holds its peace in impotence."

For a professional wordsmith, it's been one of those unnervingly awkward times of late, my being utterly at a loss for words.

When death comes calling in your circle of friends, it has a tendency of leaving you speechless — a maelstrom of feelings and a wealth of stories inside and so few words to adequately express them all.

And death came calling in my circle Nov. 19 with the passing of friend, former colleague, traveling partner and kindred spirit partner-in-crime Frank William Keeler, 52, of Watersmeet, Mich.

Frank's funeral was last Friday, Dec. 2, in Menomonie, with a large crowd from the North Woods in attendance, including active and retired colleagues and students and alumni of Lakeland Union High School in Minocqua, where Frank was an excellence-demanding social studies teacher for the past 19 years and a

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dedicated and tireless man of 10,000 well-worn hats, including Teen Court, Mock Trial and Model United Nations advisor to name just three, in addition to his famed role as the game-on teacher duct-taped to the wall in support of a good cause.

Rumors ran rampant at LUHS that "Keeler," as he was affectionally known, was a covert CIA operative — mild-manned social studies teacher by day and cloak-and-dagger spy by night, a claim that Frank, an intensely private man who played his cards close to his chest, neither confirmed nor denied, adding to the mystique of "Frank Keeler: The Man. The Myth. The Legend."

Over the span of chaperoning three intensive weeklong 24/7 Model United Nations trips with Frank to New York City, Washington, D.C. and San Francisco, enough strange things happened along the way that really made me wonder myself sometimes. A CIA baseball hat was among the items decorating the tribute table at his funeral luncheon.

Like a made-for-TV spy thriller, a part of me, not wanting to say goodbye, held out a small glimmer of hope walking into the funeral that Frank's death was faked as part of some secret CIA spy operation.

While that notion would have earned me a wry Keeler smirk, the reality of the funeral, which patriotically ended with our singing "America, the Beautiful," grounded me in the serious reality of history that was Frank's laser-focused life's calling as a passionate, dedicated educator mentoring the next generation.

"This isn't going to be here forever," Frank would often say.

And now Frank isn't here anymore. And yet he still is. His impact lives on in those of us who crossed paths with

him — family, friends, colleagues, students, parents. And a bit of each of us lived in him during his all-toobrief time with us.

As Mark Twain once famously noted, "You meet people who forget you. You forget people you meet. But sometimes you meet those people you can't forget. Those are your friends."

Over the course of a dozen years, Frank played a lot of roles in my own life — teacher of my two children as a district parent, work colleague during my time at LUHS and Lakeland STAR School/Academy, and fellow traveling companion and partner-in-crime on our three shared Model U.N. travels across thousands of miles. But his most treasured role in my life was the enduring friendship that was forged out of those various associations.

Frank was one of those friends that I won't forget, but, admittedly, the road ahead will be a bit lonelier.

As ancient Greek comic playwright Aristophanes once noted, "Our lost friends are not dead, but gone before, advanced a stage or two upon that road which you must travel in the steps they trod."

It figures. Frank was always a few car-lengths ahead on our Model U.N. trips, seeking out educational adventure just a little bit faster around every bend in the highway.

While the loss remains raw and it's still hard to wrap my head around a world without Frank Keeler in it, I take some comfort in the words of famed English playwright, poet and children's book author Alan Alexander (A.A.) Milne in celebration of the friendship I was so blessed to have had.

"How lucky I am to have something that makes saying goodbye so hard."

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
