He received a bone marrow transplant in 2004.

A fter being cancer-free for 15 years, he developed lung cancer in 2019.

"He taught me how to drive a boat. He taught me my left from my right. He taught me to stand up for m yself and fight for what I believe in . He taught me so m any valuable things in life and I am so glad that I got him for a teacher," said Rose. "I cannot put into words how much Im iss his sm iling face and contagious laugh. He will be greatly m issed but not forgotten."

In the late 1980s, Ciccantelli started his career with Conley Publishing Group at the Beaver Dam Daily Citizen, working in sales and advertising. He worked with Founder Jam es Conley Jr.as
