When I had been editor

in Fennimore previously, I had just entered my 20s after graduating from UW-Whitewater. People thought I was much older than I actually was. In the last 20 years, a lot of things have changed. I've had a family and my son is now a junior at UW-Whitewater. I've slowed down preferring a good nap to just about anything else. My main hobby is listening to old-time radio shows and I like to walk.

I've always been a staunch community volunteer. I served
