OAF founder, former Enterprise owner Joan Brown dies

Remembered for her commitment to community

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OCONOMOWOC — Joan Brown, one of the founders of the Oconomowoc Area Foundation, former owner of the Oconomowoc Enterprise and a well-known community philanthropist, died on Nov. 20 at the age of 89.

She died on what would've been her 66th wedding anniversary with her late husband Bruce, who died in 2014. C.W.
