In the spring, I will be launching my own vegetable farm, working 4 acres on my own. I plan to start by selling to area farmer's markets and hopefully in the future have some kind of a CSA/online ordering system for deliveries and a farmstand on the property. Additionally, I will be utilizing cover crops and pollinator plantings to help rebuild the soil and land that I'm so lucky to now steward.

In the meantime though, my focus will be on learning all I can about the communities within the *Record-Review*'s coverage area and helping to get the word out about what's happening in local government, schools and more. I'm happy to be here and get back into the swing of the newspaper world.
