

That being said, there isn't much in the way of a lead photo to draw the eye in to a specific story or package to get the reader started. There's an awful lot of photo space used by the teasers in the masthead, and the overall result is a front page that is probably just a little too busy. Writing is good throughout. June 19: Lead package is really nice. The story is heartwarming, and the photos are

both nice shots and played well on the page. The bottom story quote headline definitely gets my attention. The bottom story photo is a bit too small. It would have been better to have a more up-close picture if it had to run at this size. Good focus on local coverage. Aug. 23: Lead package is well put together and just a heartbreaking story. Bottom photo not really worth using at that size. A more upclose shot that could illustrate the story would have been better. May 22: Lead package is really welldone, both in terms of the story and how it is packaged and illustrated. Using old clippings as your lead art is very clever, and the headline treatment is also nice. The nuclear energy plant story is decent as well. Nov. 21: Lead package is nice design and done tastefully in proportion to the gut-wrenching story that it features. The headline definitely gets the idea across when coupled



with the photo illustration. The only downside is that it's not something that was produced locally, so that is unfortunate. The criminal justice system story is good, but the headline is probably one quote headline too many on the page. And the photo with that story is played so small that one can't make out any faces or expressions of the people pictured. If the photo is going to run this small, it really needs to be a more up-close shot.

Third Place: *The Freeman* - Shana Duffy.

Judge's Comments: July 1: Overall a nice page with lots of local news. Main package is interesting and looks really nice. The use of the smaller photos works well to showcase some of the business' work. Good on you to have some hard

news at the top of the page. For the Heinen photo, I think a closer crop might have worked better to show his face and the plaque better. You wouldn't lose much by cutting him off near the waist and filling your frame a little better. Bottom headline could afford to have that second line a little more filled in. As is, it doesn't match the look of the rest of the page with all that white space in just that one spot. July 16: Page looks pretty good. I wonder if the more statewise news at the top of the page would have been better below some of your local content. Local stories are well-written. Local centerpiece is nice given the art you are working with. Having a little better art on the page altogether would have been nice. The top photo is so small for a skyline shot that it isn't all that readable. July 23: Nice mix of hard news and feature news. Front looks nice, but some larger photo play for the lead picture wouldn't have hurt. Schedule with fair story is played well and is helpful to your reader. Honorable Mention: The Gazette -Tim Seeman, Shari Rampenthal. Judge's Comments: Sept. 3: Nice photos with lead package. Color choice on the screen isn't the greatest. Not sure what the point of the diamonds are other than to eat space. With the lead story, I'd like to see a mugshot of the murderer in addition to the victim. Good to see a nice mix of news that is all locally written. Nov. 29: Once again, a lot of well-written local news, so kudos on that. Lead package is very well designed using framing and white space in a way that draws in the reader but doesn't distract them. The photos are really good as well. A nice page all-around. Aug. 22: Lead

story headline is a great example of a quote headline. The treatment is nice as well. The photo with that story is pretty boring and could have probably been used on the jump page. The lead photo package is decent, and I think if those photos could have had some better play rather than use the building shot at 3 columns wide, then the page would look nicer overall. Good use of local content along with the state story. The stories are well-written. **Competition Comments:** A lot of good front page designs in this competition. A good rule of thumb for everyone would be to focus on locally produced content where possible. A little more hard news on some of these front pages would have been nice.

Judge's Comments: Sept. 30: A really nice front page. The photos in the photo package are great and draw in the reader's eye. The story about the school menus being impacted by supply chain issues is very timely and was no doubt an important read for area parents with children in the local school system. The bottom story was likewise very informative and some good news to boot. Jan. 13: Again, a great piece of lead art on this page, and you played it large, so kudos to you. The EMS story and the school district substitute story were both very well-written and informative. The story about the child dying was gutwrenching. A great example of good writing about a horrible subject. Aug. 11: The bees package is very nicely done. You've got a solid photo coupled with a fun headline treatment. It works well to illustrate the story, which is put together very nicely as well. It's good to see you talking about beekeeping at large in your area and not just one person who keeps bees. I appreciate you didn't take the easy way out on that. The election story at the bottom of the page adds some needed hard news to your front and keeps readers up to date on statewide issues of importance. If I had a criticism at all about the page, it would be that

you might have had more luck with a more colorful screen behind your main package. Gray is very drab, and given the content, I think you could have gone with pale orange, yellow or brown and had something that looked even better. But that is nit-picking. This is a solid page.

Second Place: Superior Telegram - Staff.

Judge's Comments: Oct. 15: A good mix of local and state news on the page. Lead package photos are really nice, and the headline treatment is great. Solid writing on the locally prepared content. Jan. 7: Nice to see you scrambled to cover the warehouse fire and did so with an informative story and nice art. You've really told the story well. Candidate story is also interesting. The overall look of the page is good. Given the seriousness of what is being covered, I'm glad you didn't try to employ a bunch of design or typography tricks with the main package and it's headline treatment. Aug. 5: National Night Out coverage is decent, but the packaging could have been done better, maybe be working in a kicker, some pull quotes or an additional piece of art with those stories, just a few more things to draw in the reader's eye. There is some interesting news at the bottom of the page, though it all appears to be coming from other sources.

Third Place: Oconomowoc Enterprise - Bill Yorth.

Judge's Comments: Aug. 18: Centerpiece package is nice and uses the submitted illustrations well. The story is good, and it's rarely a bad idea to offer your readers some alternative story forms such as this Q&A format. Bottom rail section is also a helpful addition for your readers, giving them some quick access to information about what kind of events are happening in the area. I appreciate the focus on local news and events throughout the page. June 16: Another page with a lot of good local content. It would have been nice to get some other content or context for the school board resignation story. It seems like this was basically a rewritten press release, and usually more than that can be done. The hail package is well-written and uses the photos nicely to help tell the story. April 28: Lead story is OK, but the deck head says it's a Q&A with the team, but it's really a Q&A with a team marketing official. The deck headline should have reflected that. Otherwise, readers might think they are getting into a story with comments from the team manager and players. Lead photo is OK for



One design pitfall to avoid would be doing design tricks like text on top of photos and drop shadows applied to various elements with no real purpose behind the treatment or when the treatment doesn't reflect the tone of the story. If a story is serious, the treatment on the page should be serious as well. When a story is more light-hearted or fun, that is the best time to flex



The thumbnail-style photos across the top are a little small even in this digital format, so I imagine they must have been a bit hard to make out in print as well, especially the one on the far right. Bottom half of the page is very basic, and the bottom story appears to be a rewritten press release, so nothing much to comment on there. Sept. 9: Top package is nicely designed, and the photos are great. I would have appreciated the photos being played a little larger

if possible, especially the vertical

image. The top story headline and the headline for the book column

Feb. 10: The most well-designed page of the bunch because you're not trying to get too many stories or separate elements onto a single page. The top package carries the page with a nice use of photos and multiple text entry points in the way of a pull quote, breakout info sections, a decent headline/deck headline combination and some subheads within the story text. And getting some historical and strategic context for a sport like curling. Some explanation of the rules of the game would have been nice, though. Book column at the bottom of the page is a nice touch and well-written.

Second Place: The Freeman - Dan Muckelbauer.

Judge's Comments: April 21: The top package is well-designed with plenty of good entry points for your reader. You've employed a nice use of pull quotes and a breakout info section for the package, and the headline gets the reader's attention. The submitted photos don't appear to be the best quality. It's a shame because one imagines they would have been really nice if shot with a better camera or by a better photographer. The list within the story is helpful to the reader, giving them a way to quickly glance at the bold text and get the description of that particular attraction. The stories on the bottom half of the page appear to be press release rewrites, but they are played well on the page, working with your ad stack nicely. May 12: I'm not sure why the photo framing is being done how it is. It looks like an error with all that

white space at the left side and bottom. I suppose it is intentional because they are all like that, but the question would be "why?" What is the purpose of that design technique being employed? What does it reflect about the story content? Not much, if anything, as far as I can tell. The story is well-written, and the subheads have a nice formula with the name of the place and then a quote pulled from the text. The breakout section at the bottom is very helpful to a reader wanting to get some quick information about the various attractions discussed in the story. The page design works well with your ad stack. June 30: Lifeguard story is



First Place: The Cap Times, 'Pixar's 'Turning Red' refuses to panda to young audiences; When the moon hits the sky like a big pizza pie, that's a 'Moonfall': This Madison's florist's dried flowers have real stamen-a' - Rob Thomas. Judge's Comments: The Turning Red headline employs a great use of pun with "refuses to Panda to young audiences" but it falls a little flat after reading the story and not seeing much in the writing that suggests the film doesn't pander to young audiences. It seems a bit like the headline writer had a good pun they wanted to work in and went a bit away from what was actually said in the column to make it work. The Moonfall headline is great! It's a solid reference to a well-known song, and I found myself singing it in my head as I read it and for a few minutes afterward. It is accurate in relation to the column and the plot of the movie, and gets the reader's attention in a fun, light-hearted way. The dried flowers headline is another great entry! You've employed a solid pun in "stamen-a" and it is fitting because these dried flower bouquets will last a long while, giving them more "stamina" than a traditional bouquet. Well done.

Second Place: *The Journal Times*, 'An itsy bitsy solar-powered, phone-charging little library; Get your cluck on; Mr. Duncan's Opus' - Rachel Kubik, Adam Rogan, Alex Rodriguez, Brenda Wishau. Judge's Comments: Well, the "Get your cluck on" headline definitely

got my attention! It might a be little too risqué of a reference for a lot of readers, though. Mr. Duncan's Opus headline is a great reference to a well-known movie, and it immediately puts the reader into a mindset of a music instructor and his impact on his students and community. A deck headline to give the reader a bit more of an idea of what the story was going to be about would have been helpful, though. The phone-charging little library headline is a good reference to a well-known song. It slightly misses the mark on the number of syllables in the song lyrics, so it's not one of those headlines that you can actually sing to the song, but it definitely is a fun way to get the idea across about this novel addition to a little free library.

Third Place: *The Freeman*, 'M-V-(re) P(eat); Pool's Gold; Unbreakable' - Michael Grennell.

Judge's Comments: M-V-(re)
P(eat) is a clever pun, and the main headline and deck headline each reflect the column content well.
It grabs the reader's attention and lets them know what to expect when they read the piece. Pool's Gold headline is a good pun. Deck headlines are simple, but let the read know what to expect when reading the stories. Unbreakable headline is good, but lacks some punch as a power head given how small it is. It's also a little bland being just one word.

Honorable Mention: Daily News, 'Downhill thrills with no skills; Tap into your German side; Fresh, local, plentiful' - Dan Muckelbauer. Judge's Comments: Downhill thrills with no skills is a great use of rhyme and in keeping with the fun theme of the story. The deck headline,

however, includes "participants of all ages" which isn't quite accurate because neither place allows people to ride together with really small children. A substitution for that line of the deck headline that would have been more accurate and would have filled basically the same space would have been "for young and old alike." On the Oktoberfest headline, the use of the phrase "Tap into your German side" is a very clever nod to the beer aspect of these celebrations. Fresh, local, plentiful is not a bad

One thing I'd recommend to all entrants is to remember that writing a catchy headline shouldn't be more important that being accurate about what the story says. A headline's main function is to give the reader a clear idea what they are about to read. When we falter in that goal, we run the risk of making our r judgment or

Guns blazing: A very clever play on words and it does reflect the story well when played with the deck headlines and photos.

Judge's Comments: CUP: on target and written with direct action suggested. However, having the "legal" aspects attributed to a state source would support the edit's contentions and conclusion. Transparency: A bold, critical, scolding reaction to the municipality's closed-meeting vote; well written, though some elements repeated. Thankful: Lot's of thankfulness, but a rambling unlinked essay. Needed a conclusion before the wishfulness. Keenly focused, mostly, on community. First two samples had purpose and direction. Decent writing, but some

aggressiveness could have been "softened" to preserve the intent of the message.

Honorable Mention: Courier Sentinel, 'Community support needed for fireworks display; Use the right tool for the job; Balance needed on Lake Holcombe' - Brian Wilson.

Judge's Comments: Fireworks: Last 'graph should be at top, maybe the second 'graph. Took awhile to figure the targeted message. Tools: Again, the last 'graph should be up front, number 2 at least. Lake Holcombe: Still again, final 2 'graphs should be 3 and 4 in this edit. Now for the messages' evaluation: Excellent focus on issues critical and relevant to the local community and neighborhoods. Good writing, good analogies, good anecdotes. The "Editorial Board" message should be at end, not at top of edits. Get the message out first, then let readers know who to challenge.

Competition Comments: Each entry focused on community, with some exceptions tossed aside, Probably the most impressive

messages were narrations directed to readers. First-person accounts failed to lead readers to conclusions, and analytical essays would send readers on to other epistles. Leadership is essential in editorials, not just excoriating essays to satisfy an objection. Write for/to readers. Give them a message that leads to THEIR action/reaction. Leave storytelling to other sections of the newspaper.

in a container they cannot open and use the locker to open the patches as they leave school. Complete story and strong with sentences and quotes to show how things work. Grades are running higher now, bullying is down, students talk to each other, a teacher says students talk to him, etc. As the writer reports, no phones make the school better. Clearly this is a significant story and clearly written.

Third Place: Leader-Telegram, 'Momentous day" - Eric Lindquist. Judge's Comments: When you achieve what you never of doing, you have a lede that stands out. In reading how this came about, readers will find a story written with strong sentences and which tie together the story. Strong quotes are used and ample information is provided. Aside from the information, the significance of the story is evident – a \$70 million donation from one family. The coming development is mentioned in the story.

Honorable Mention: Kenosha News, 'Hard Rock returns: Menominee tribe to partner with international brand in casino effort' - Daniel Gaitan.

Judge's Comments: The reporter knows how to get information and how to relate it throughout the story. He is a good writer. His lede brings the reader into the story and reader can follow the information being provided. Quotes are solid and help the story. Sentences help hold the story together and they are constructed without being long or wordy. Obviously a significant story. If I still owned a newspaper, I would hire the writer.

Competition Comments: Before reading the entries, and checking

back to the instructions while during the reading, I had to keep in mind these instructions: strong emphasis placed on sentence structure and lede, excellence in reporting, and significance of subject, writing quality, and thoroughness. Some quality stories in the entries, but some lacked the level of the items to be judged. Sentences and lede in the winners as well as in others caught attention. Note that sentences and excellence in reporting went well together. Many stories had significance of subject, including citizenship and phones in schools in the winners. I was amazed by the sad and unusual stories and reacted to them. Picking winners required reading more than once and looking for small things. Thanks for the stories.

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



Living in a war zone

A former Cambridge High School exchange student from Ukraine shares his experience with the ongoing war in Ukraine, fundraises with local support

A former Cambridge High School exchange student from Ukraine has partnered with a fellow CHS alum to raise more than \$10,000 for medical supplies and ambulances in Ukraine during the ongoing

assian invasion. Kyrylo Beskorovayny, "Ky," was one of four exchange stu-dents to live in Cambridge in 2011 for a year-long residency as part of the Future Leaders Exchange Program. Now, Ky is living in a war

Now, by is living in a war zone, following the Russian invasion of Ukraine that began in February 2022. After the start of the inva-sion, Ky began fundraising for medical supplies to support his hometown of Chernihiv, in the northern part of Ukraine. In addition to working with a group of alumni from his exchange program who studied in the U.S., Ky teamed up with former CHS classmate Augie

McGinnity-Wake of Cambridg The group has fundraised for two ambulances, night vision scopes and countless medical supplies, totaling more than \$10,000.

The former exchange student has shared memories of his time in Wisconsin, and his experience with the early Cambridge News/Deerfield

The pair kept in touch after Ky moved back to Ukraine, visiting

moved back to Ukraine, visiting each other in Cambridge, Wash-ington D.C. and Kyiv. After leaving Cambridge, Ky founded a Ukrainian popular science media company, Kunsht, accessible at kunsht.com.ua/. It accessible at kuisht.com.ag. it began as a print magazine and migrated online in 2019. When Russian forces invaded Ukraine on Feb. 24, Ky was liv-

ing in Kyiv. "We woke up on the 24th of February because we heard bombs," Ky said. "We heard some news that the war might break, but we didn't believe unti the end that it (would), Just in

case, we had our emergency backpacks ready."





GREEN BAY – Police sought a felony child abuse charge against a man who now serves as a Wisconsin legislator after he was accused of leaving 4-inch bruises on his child and told officers the Bible commanded him to strike his children as punishment, according to newly released records.

The Brown County District Attorney's Office never charged the lawmaker, Shae Sortwell, and did not explain its decision until eight years later in response to a Green Bay Press-Gazette inquiry.

The police investigation took place in January 2013, before Sortwell was elected to the state Assembly, but by then he was active in state and national politics and had served on the Green Bay City Council.

Police were made aware of the alleged abuse after a relative discovered the five bruises while giving the child a bath. The relative took the child to a hospital in Two Rivers, according to 35 pages of documents obtained by the Press-Gazette through an open records request with the Green Bay Police Department.

Competition Comments: Second and fourth place are, arguably, more important stories than first and third in this competition, but first and third are more interesting to read and show more enterprise.

Judge's Comments: Good job explaining what could have been a tedious subject - the ownership and taxation of an abandoned (or is it) railroad track. Reporter took the extra step of visiting the site, taking photos and using them to explain the situation.

Second Place: *Ripon Commonwealth Press*, 'We're losing a generation" - Joe Schulz.

Judge's Comments: The lede needs work. It takes several paragraphs to

get to the meat of the story. Drug abuse has impacted many families. Good job explaining the effect addiction has on loved ones.

Third Place: The Edgerton Reporter, 'Social Justice' - Tristan McGough. Judge's Comments: The reporter covered a meeting held at a local library. A subject as intense and important as racism surely deserves a few follow-up interviews from those in attendance. Perhaps would have scored higher in a general news category.

Competition Comments:

Reporters who go the extra mile always score higher in the enterprise/interpretive story category. Those stories have more impact short-term and long-term. Ledes need work across the board. We cannot keep the reader's interest if we make them work to get to the

meat of the story.

Judge's Comments: This is how you write about climate change: make it real to people who care about wildlife habitat. Superb writing and crystal-clear explanations about the impact of warmer water on Wisconsin's cold-water fish populations highlight this excellent story about walleye, trout and bluegill. It comes complete with

warnings about dire consequences as well as all-too-human wildlife authorities who teeter between accepting the climate-induced habitat changes and fighting against them. The best of a competitive field.

Second Place: *The Journal Times*, 'The bees are back at Pritchard Park' - Adam Rogan.

Judge's Comments: It sometimes seems as though environmental issues are too big for a single person or community to tackle, but through the leadership of one volunteer, native plants gradually replaced invasive species and native wildlife returned, including a much-needed pollinator – the rusty-patched bumblebee. Rogan's stories and the accompanying photo essay deliver a mood altering experience and a positive lesson for readers weary of doom and gloom and feelings of impotence when it comes to the environment.

Third Place: *The Post-Crescent*, 'As Wisconsin's climate gets warmer and wetter, beloved winter activities could be in jeopardy' - Madeline Heim.

Judge's Comments: A well-written story on another threat posed by climate change in a traditionally cold-weather state: the possible damage to winter outdoor activities from shorter periods of heavy snow and thick lake ice. It's not just fish that suffer.

Competition Comments: This was a competitive field of solid reporting on many aspects of the environment. I looked for strong enterprise, good narrative, solid science and clear statements of why the story mattered to a broad readership.

Judge's Comments: As far as translating technical detail into readable, accessible prose, this reporter is exceptional. The complexity of this situation is simplified into clear causes and consequences, laid out in plain detail without losing sight of the nuance. The story has many layers, and each is addressed with care and importance according to the needs of local readers.

Third Place: Vilas County News-Review, 'DNR requires more testing before issuing CWD plans' - Michelle Drew.

Judge's Comments: Every column inch of this story is accountable to the public good. The situation poses dangers to humans, wildlife and the local ecosystem, and the reporters have opted to cover the story in a way that centralizes the need for the public to become informed and to act on that knowledge. It's no doubt

that this reporting helped make change in this community.

Honorable Mention: *The Lakeland Times*, 'Crescent allocates assistance to PFAS-affected family' - Kelly Holm.

Judge's Comments: When it comes to water pollution, people tune out – but this story refuses to allow it. By focusing on a single local family and the impacts of PFAS contamination on their personal lives (including their dogs), readers get a snapshot of this environmental concern. In this story, PFAS becomes not just a far-off threat, so small you can't see it, but a real and pragmatic challenge in people's everyday lives. The writer makes pollution tangible and holds local authorities accountable.

Islanders learn how to help pollinators

By Winifred Bird

For anyone who doubts the power of pollinators, Island beekeeper Sue Dompke, owner of Sweet Mountain Farm, suggests a simple thought experiment: Imagine planting three watermelon seeds in a 10-square-foot area. Without pollination, you might harvest three or four melons. With pollination, you'll get 10 or 12. The same goes for hundreds of the world's most beloved and important food crops.

Recently, Islanders had a chance to learn practical strategies for supporting pollinators at a lecture by Donna Stine, eastern Wisconsin apiary inspector with the state Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP). Stine was on the Island to inspect Dompke's hives, and Dompke partnered with the Art and Nature Center and Gathering Ground, an agriculture-focused nonprofit on the Island, to host Stine's event on June 6.

Stine said both domesticated and wild bees are crucial pollinators in Wisconsin. The state has over 400 species of bees, many of which nest in the ground or in hollow stems and do not form large colonies like domesticated honeybees.

"Your yard may be a bee's whole world," she told an audience of

for Biological Diversity found that over half of native bee species in North America with enough data to assess were declining. In Wisconsin, declining species include the rusty-patched bumble bee, yellowbanded bumble bee, and American bumble bee.

"Bees dying reflects a flowerless landscape and a dysfunctional food system," explained University of Minnesota entomologist Marla Spivak in a TED talk on pollinators. With fewer farmers planting flowering cover crops like clover and alfalfa and more applying large amounts of herbicides and pesticides, much of rural America has become an "agricultural food desert" for bees, she said.

Stine shared many strategies for Island residents to reverse that trend on their own land: leave things a little messy so pollinators have places to nest, plant native flowers, let herbs and even weeds burst into bloom, and choose less-toxic pesticides. Since many pollinators rely on specific host plants for food, she recommends checking the Great Lakes pollinator plant list created by the Xerces Society for Invertebrate Conservation (available at xerces.org) as you plan your

it habitat.

"A sign is sometimes all it takes to let people know you're not neglecting the landscape, you're making a choice," she said.

That's not to say pollinator gardens can't be attractive. Dompke

Until recently, the college graduate called a bush near the railroad tracks in downtown Green Bay "home."

The drop in temperatures prompted Madee to seek shelter at St. John's Homeless Shelter, and he's been staying there on and

off since it opened at the beginning of November. Madee is homeless.

He joins dozens, if not hundreds, of other individuals in Brown County who are or have experienced homelessness.

For many, homelessness may seem like a foreign concept – something that could never happen to them. It can be easy to pretend not to see the guy sleeping in the park, or to ignore the woman standing at an intersection holding a handwritten plea for help.

Terri Refsguard, New Community Shelter chief executive officer, said there is no "typical" homeless person. She said the reasons someone is homeless vary drastically – but something all those experiencing home lessness have in common is it doesn't define who they are

Refsguard said she uses the phrases "people finding themselves homeless" or "experiencing homelessness, because it's not a permanent situation."

There is no such thing as any person or department working alone. There is only one rule that never changes: teamwork.

That is Hayward Area Memorial Hospital & Water's Edge.

On March 13, 2020, at 3 p.m. the hospital and senior living facility locked their doors. Most of America did, but few businesses, organizations or groups of people faced what health care workers across the country had to: a pandemic that tested the professional and personal limits of every health care worker, no matter what their title, no matter what their experience, no matter what their job.



DPI reports can be dry, but this was nicely done.

Judge's Comments: Good variety of school issues represented here. Nice writing.

Homeless students story exceptional, though limited to mostly "official" sources; those directly involved, such as the students, are not represented here. The writing/ reporting remains excellent considering the primary story focus.

Second Place: Sun Prairie Star, 'Sun Prairie teachers ask school board for pay increase; Sun Prairie School Board approves referendum question on November ballot; Federal court rejects Sun Prairie families' claims over Patrick Marsh slavery assignment' - Jeromey Hodsdon.

Judge's Comments: While "depth" is shallow in some areas of these stories, the reporting is clear and relevant. Especially noted is the story on court review of a classroom assignment on slavery: excellent writing leads to clear understanding of underlying issue and the court's decision. Not many comments from those affected by these stories, but the writing/reporting remains contextually solid.

Again lots of project detail and revealed survey results, but no direct community engagement or comments. These stories are packed with detail.

ballot; Mask policies are changed'Charley Preusser.

Judge's Comments: A refreshing,

casual account of a student dronemaking competition. Heavy descriptions lightened by reporter's adjectives (subjective, but readably creative and on point). Student comments included. School board meeting story recounts mascot name selection and COVID-19 mask policy. Good writing/reporting. Masking issues packed this school board story. Anonymous comments were unattributed-reporter should have secured commentators' names. Lots of detail packed this story. **Competition Comments:** In this judge's view, several entries focused on political/administrative stories rather than the accomplishments of students and the education process. Even stories focused on the latter missed opportunity to include related students', teachers', parents' and general community responses/comments. Writing/ reporting ranged from exceptional to adequate. Generally, we looked for stories that engaged readers. These were mostly absent.

Educators use report-card data to modify teaching and learning strategies

During the bad old days of the No Child Left Behind Act, state and federal governments judged public schools almost entirely on standardized test scores.

That's no longer the case. The Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction (DPI) issues school report cards as part of its accountability system for every publicly funded school and district in the state. Those reports weigh four categories — Achievement. Growth, Target Group Outcomes and On-Track to Graduation — and based on those ratings, an overall score is calculated that places entities somewhere on a five-point spectrum ranging from "fails to meet expectations" to "significantly exceeds expectations."

On the recently released report cards, all five Door County districts received a rating of "exceeds expectations" based on the 2020-21 school year. Even if the DPI and federal government still focused almost entirely on standardized test scores, local districts all did better than state averages in the Achievement category on tests.



REEN BAY - The Interstate 41 corridor is a lot of things to a lot of people. It's a connection between communities that allows travelers to easily get from Green Bay to Appleton, to Oshkosh, to Fond du Lac and all the way down to Milwaukee. It's easy access to local businesses and chain restaurants, or its advertising drawing people to motorcycle dealerships, casinos and diners.

In Green Bay, the interstate also means access to Lambeau Field, encouraging tourists to visit the city and support the green and gold.

However, not everything the interstate represents is positive. Some see Interstate 41 as a combination of steel and concrete that pulls vital traffic away from the downtowns along its route. Whatever Interstate 41 is to you, it's clear that Green Bay wouldn't be what it is today without the connection the roadway provides.

The road named '41' shifted its path twice before settling in current arrangement

Interstate 41 began as U.S. 41 when the federa highway system was created in 1926. The original highway joined existing roadways to create a route with a unified sign system linking downtowns and community centers from Chicago, Illinois to Mari-

A little faith

In the wee hours of Thursday, Feb. 10, the worst kind of phone call came that no one ever wants to get. My husband's grandpa, "Pa," had had a heart attack and it looked like the end was near. My husband's grandma, "Nan," and his cousins Christopher and Roger raced through the dark night to get to the hospice facility. The

My husband was able to call Pa and say his final goodbyes while Christopher held the phone to his ear. Pa couldn't respond, but he could still hear. He died about an hour later, gently and quietly, with family surrounding him.

As we gathered around Nan's old kitchen table Friday night reminiscing and grieving, Christopher and Nan had an amazing tale to tell. It will give you chills, and hopefully a bit of comfort.

First off, you need to know that Pa was an avid trout fisherman. He grew up in Shawano County where you trip over a trout stream every five feet. Sometimes they're tiny and barely visible from the road, but Pa knew where all the good spots were, whether it was standing on a culvert near the road as icy water poured through into a deep hole, or back through the brush to a secret, hidden pool. The streams there tumble and churn over millions of stones. He passed his love of trout fishing onto my husband and his cousins. If you've never seen anyone fish a trout stream, it's truly a delicate and visual art. The movements are distinct and precise, knowing exactly when to jig, the line flowing through fingers, the casting and reeling. Somehow they all know how to do this in the tightest, brushiest quarters with precision. When we go to Shawano County, I just watch my husband fish because it's beautiful to me.

As Nan, Roger and Christopher sat in Pa's room toward the end, Pa, barely able to speak, told Nan just exactly where his ice fishing tipups are so the boys could find them. Many he crafted himself. Soon, his speaking ceased and he stopped responding. His chest rose gently with each breath, but they became shallower each time. Soon, they noticed his arms moving in what seemed an erratic fashion. Was this something that happens when death is about to pounce? But as Christopher watched, the movements Pa's arms were making took on a familiar rhythm. He was tying a line, casting, letting the fishing line flow through his fingers, his right arm extended. Soon the jigging started. His fingers and arms moved through the familiar dance, without a tremble, through the precise dance of trout fishing. He was trout fishing. Oh, he hit a snag! Dang it, the line broke. He had to retie the lure. Pop the line into the mouth, tie the line, good as new, the dance begins again. This went on for quite some time.

As Christopher told this story around the old kitchen table, tears streamed down our faces. While we hated that we'd lost Pa, there was comfort in knowing he was doing what he loved best as he passed from this world to the next. He was trout fishing.

My husband teaches psychology and told me later that most likely, the movements were due to buried memories in a part of the brain called the hippocampus. That may well be, or maybe it was because he was already in the next life, with his foot lingering in this one, doing the one thing he loved most as he transitioned to his heavenly reward. Sometimes, you just got to have a little faith. I believe Pa was really and truly trout fishing.
